# Guest Speaker - JAMES MORRIS: "The Unley Road"

Chairman David Middleton introduced James who is the chair of the Unley Road Association (URA). He studied architecture and environmental psychology and has worked for the Commonwealth Government. He is now involved in community affairs and as well as being Chair of the URA he is a member of the Unley City Council Economic and Business Development Committee.

James explained that he was born in Unley, has a passion for the local environment and has been chair of the URA for much of the last 12 years. The theme of his speech was 'Sustaining the High Street'. The URA was established to support the traders and the development/sustainability of Unley Rd precinct. Unley Road' businesses employ about 1800 people and have an annual turnover of \$200m - \$500m each year; 20% of Unley Council rates come from local businesses. URA is a non-profit volunteer organization funded by a small council levy – it has a part-time paid coordinator. As well as being proactive on issues important to its members, the

URA supports networking and group advertising, events such as SALA (and on one previous occasion our club's Carols at the Rotunda), and organizations such as the Sturt Football Club. He lamented the fact that it was very difficult to achieve significant change in the local urban environment. Big retail organizations like Westfield carry disproportionate weight in achieving their aims. The council appears to be ineffectual. He cited Barcelona and a number of other European cities

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where the incidence of high population densities enabled local roads to become vibrant shopping environments, serving the local communities and attracting tourists. The development of Australia with its preoccupation with the urban block had contributed to the significant sprawl and spread of cities. This trend needs to be reversed. High densities along and near our main roads had to be encouraged to revitalise the inner urban areas. People should have the choice of living in apartments close to shopping and entertainment. He wants good planning and good design....the strip shopping with many shops over 100 years old is not working. By lifting densities the local community will be invigorated as has been the case in many European cities. James wants to see the Unley High Street happen.

James was thanked by acclamation.

### Ravindran is choice for 2015-16 RI president

K.R. "Ravi" Ravindran, a member of the Rotary Club of Colombo, Western Province, Sri Lanka, has been selected by the Nominating Committee for President of RI in 2015-16. Ravindran will become the president-nominee on 1 October if there are no challenging candidates.

Ravindran said his top priority for Rotary will be to increase membership, which he called the bedrock of any organization.

"The emphasis on membership has to continue with focus on the younger generation," Ravindran said. "Additionally, we must seek to attract the just retired and experienced people into Rotary."

Creating regional membership plans and realizing that "one size does not fit all" has been a move in the right direction, he said.

"Albert Einstein defined insanity as 'doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results.' In many ways this has been the story of Rotary's poor membership advance," he said. "Thankfully, our approach this time has been studied and

altered. We have created 22 different membership regions so that each region would develop and execute a plan that would suit that particular region."

Ravindran said it's important for Rotarians to share their stories, especially through social media, so others can see the impact Rotary has had in their lives. He said it's also important for the organization to speak with a consistent voice. "Our identity must remain simple and be based on our core values. It must be clear and straightforward to both our internal and external audience."

Ravindran holds a degree in commerce and is founder and CEO of Printcare PLC, a publicly listed company and global leader in the tea packaging industry. He also serves on the board of several other companies and charitable trusts. He is the founding president of the Sri Lanka Anti Narcotics Association, the largest antinarcotics organization in Sri Lanka.

As his country's PolioPlus chair, Ravindran headed a task force with members from the government, UNICEF, and Rotary and worked closely with UNICEF to negotiate a cease-fire with northern militants during National Immunization Days.

A Rotarian since 1974, Ravindran has served Rotary as a director and treasurer of RI and as a trustee of The Rotary Foundation. He has also served as an International Assembly group discussion leader, district governor, Council on Legislation representative, and zone institute chair. He chaired the Schools Reawakening project, sponsored by Rotary clubs and districts in Sri Lanka, which rebuilt 25 tsunami-devastated schools, benefiting 15,000 children.

Ravindran has been awarded The Rotary Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service and Distinguished Service Award and the Service Award for a Polio-Free World.

He and his wife, Vanathy, have two children, and are level 4 Major Donors to the Foundation.
