Guest Speaker - Sue Dansie: "Labs 'n Life Program"

Mavis Martin introduced Sue Dansie who is the Manager of Labs 'n Life and who had Labrador Sequoia with her. She is a Labrador lover and breeder, inspired to establish Labs 'n Life after

experiencing on a number of occasions the positive impact dogs can have on at risk children. She recounted when as a teacher at Heathfield High a very difficult student had calmed dramatically by simply taking a dog for a walk, and similarly while working at the Cavan Secure Care facility when she took her puppies there.....some of the toughest juveniles really enjoyed the opportunity to play with them.

From the initial pilot in 2007 of one three-hour programme per week, Labs 'n Life currently offers 20 programmes each week covering schools in the Northern, Western, Southern and Country school districts. Core programmes provide a wide variety of young people with the opportunity to experience success and gain confidence whilst learning how to build relationships. Targeted students from a school, work with the same dog over a term, semester or year. Generally the selected students are experiencing difficulty at school. Work with the Labs 'n Life "magicians" - the dogs - has consistently produced an increase in attendance and improved learning outcomes for the students.

Labs 'n Life use future autism companion dogs in core programmes and schools, to acquaint them with young people. The dogs become accustomed to spending quality time with young people, and working positively with them. Generic training includes basic obedience, food refusal, working in harness, and

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anchoring. Play activities, such as finding treasure, catching food, bowing, etc, are used by the autistic child to give them the confidence associated with being listened to. All of these activities are essential learnings for the young dog as they develop their intuitiveness with young people.

Sue believes that the effectiveness of the program is underlined by the motto – Enjoy Success. Kids from autistic and difficult family backgrounds can readily relate to the highly intelligent and loving Labradors, and can get a kick out of building a relationship, teaching new tricks and meeting milestones. Before a Labrador is placed with a family as a companion dog, assessment and training of the family is undertaken. Some potential clients are clearly unsuitable, e.g. the parents may dislike animals.

Sue was thanked by acclamation.

Couple's \$1.1 million gift boosts push to eradicate polio

Rotary member Terry Caster and his wife, Barbara, announced a \$1.1 million gift to Rotary to help eradicate polio. What's more, their gift will be matched two-for-one by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, resulting in \$3.3 million in new funding for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

The Casters' gift is one of the largest-ever individual contributions to Rotary for polio eradication. In addition to supporting our No. 1 goal of a polio-free world, the couple gave \$750,000 to the Rotary Peace Centers to fund a peace fellow's studies every other year. Both gifts were made to The Rotary Foundation in December.

"Barbara and I are blessed to be fruitful in our family business, A-1 Self Storage," said Terry, the company's founder and a member of the Rotary Club of La Mesa in California. "We've always felt it is important to give back and help others, so we are involved in numerous charities.

"But as a Rotarian, I can think of no cause more worthy than Rotary's work to end polio and promote peace," said Terry, who received Rotary's Service Above Self Award in 1993 for his humanitarian work.

Since the 1960s, the Casters have actively supported humanitarian efforts in San Diego and across the border in Tijuana, Mexico. They founded Serving Hands International in 1982 to help the poor in Baja California. After meeting Mother Teresa, the couple were inspired to expand SHI's work in Mexico.

Rotary is a leading partner in the fight to end polio. Through our advocacy, fundraising, and public awareness efforts, Rotary has helped reduce polio cases by 99 percent worldwide. The End Polio Now, Make History Today fundraising campaign makes contributions work three times as hard with matching funds from the Gates Foundation.

The announcement of the Casters' gift was made in San Diego at Rotary's International Assembly, an annual training event for the incoming class of governors who represent Rotary's 537 districts worldwide.
