
Graham and Patsy Beckett were inducted into the club by President Greg.

Club Assembly

The following reports were presented:

International – Alex Jonson explained that:

- Stage 2 of the Sustainable Farming Project in Andhra Pradesh has now been approved with thanks to Chandra.
- RAWCS assistance was provided by Colin Schirmer and Ken Haines to deliver computers from an Unley business to DIK. Another container is being prepared for East Timor. A further \$1000 was donated for a shelter box
- OSSAA had again been supported.
- The Cambodian 2H project is now complete with \$2,500 spent on training materials for trainee midwifes.
- CWA in Victoria has requested assistance to send baby clothes to East Timor.

Vocational Service and Youth – Vera explained that she had received a number of funding requests relating to youth leadership, Whitelion and child care support for a student.

Stephen Westgarth provided an update on Police Officer of the Year. The Fire Brigade has been included with a range of other organisations in the advertising of POOTY. Nominations close on 28 March. The ceremony will be held on 20 May with the Police Band at the Unley Rotunda and later at the Glenelg Golf Club. Group 6 clubs have been included.

Secretary – Stephen Westgarth, on behalf of Mavis Martin, asked members to update their contact numbers, to delete Anne Wehr from email lists and for directors to provide the CA reports to her for the historical record. ANZO Rotary meeting pocket books are still available for \$2.50. There will be a vocational visit to the Veterans' War Museum at Daw Park Hospital on April 22 and members are requested to suggest other venues for our next visit planned for June.

Membership – Stephen Baker announced that the Board had approved a new Friend of Unley Rotary arrangement to attract and engage potential young members. Next Tuesday there is to be a get together organised by Jerry to plan future involvement, and they will join us for our meeting. **SB asked all members to make a special welcoming effort.**

Rotary International News from another planet

Anchorage Light Speed Planet Walk

The Anchorage Rotary chose Eli Menaker's Lightspeed Planet Walk as its Centennial project to commemorate Rotary International's 100 years of community and international service. In 2005, Eli was given a Spirit of Youth award for making an outstanding contribution to the community. In 2006, the Anchorage Rotary Club and Eli were presented with the "Heart of Anchorage" award by the Anchorage Downtown Partnership.

The Anchorage Rotary Club began working with Eli in the fall of 2003. In the summer of 2005, the completed portion of the Anchorage Light Speed Planet walk was formally presented to the Municipality. Eli researched and wrote all the text for the interpretive signs for the sun and nine planet stations and worked with graphic artist Charles Marshall on the sign design. He also worked with artist Julie Matthews to make sure the sun spots on the tile model of the sun are represented as accurately as possible.



The Anchorage Light Speed Planet Walk is a scale model of our solar system. Taking the walk, you experience the relative size of the planets and their distance from the Sun. The scale was chosen so that a leisurely walking pace mimics the speed of light. On this scale, each step equals the distance light travels in one second (300,000 kilometres or 186,000 miles).

It should take you about 8 minutes to walk from the Sun station at 5th and G to the Earth station at 5th and K, just as it takes 8 minutes for a light beam to travel from the real Sun to the real Earth. Similarly, it takes you and a light beam 5 1/2 hours to reach Pluto at Kincaid Park.

Of course, you can hop on your bike, roller blades or skis, and travel the distance at warp speed!

Begin at the sun station, a tiled representation of the Sun (weighing close to 6,000 pounds) to learn about the evolution of our solar system and discover interesting facts about our star, the Sun. Then navigate the planet stations along 5th Avenue and the Coastal Trail to experience the scale of our solar system and unique features of each planet.
