Guest Speaker - Mark Chellew: Sherlock Holmes in Adelaide



David & Sherlock Mark

Chairman David Middleton introduced Mark who is a resident of Colonel Light Gardens, works in the funeral business, is a lay preacher and celebrant, and joined the Sherlock Holmes Society in 2001.

'Imagine 1920' demanded Mark – because this was the year Sir Arthur Conan Doyle visited Adelaide at the invitation of Australian spiritualists. Doyle was fascinated with the para normal and spirit world. Connecting with dead relatives was a big deal back then. An English PM was even a President of the Society for Psychical Research. Adelaide had previously been cited as the setting of two

of Doyle's entertaining stories.....in particular Penfolds at Magill and the Humbug Scrub.

The main aim of his trip was to convert Australians to spiritualisms and to this end had 5 presentations at the Adelaide Town Hall, and in other cities interstate. Australian journalists generally regarded him as somewhat of a nutter despite the popularity of the Sherlock Holmes series. He also visited South Africa in 1928, spreading his spiritualism message, and died in 1930.

Conan Doyle was knighted in 1901 for assisting British wounded during the Crimean War. He wrote prolifically - poetry, novels, short stories and historical records. Despite his pre-occupation with futurism and the para normal as demonstrated in many of his writings, he resisted the temptation to include this in his Sherlock Holmes novels. He is regarded as one of Britain's greatest writers and has spawned Societies for Sherlock Holmes across the world. He was renowned for his patriotism (particularly as a war correspondent), love of family and cricket, and collaboration with other writers of the day.

Rotary News

District 9520 Conference in Ballarat

Unley's finest representatives namely Jerry and Briony, Graham and Patsy, Janet and Rohan, Sheila, Heather, Mavis, David, Joan, Stephen W, Stephen and Beverley, meandered down to what is one of the nicest spots in Australia..... Warrnambool. In what was a very well organised Conference, we were treated to a smorgasbord of interesting and exhilarating speakers.

Proceedings opened with a local school choir and DG Wendy Gaborit launched the conference.

Mark Scott AO the Managing Director of the ABC reflected on the dramatic changes in radio, TV, newspapers and other forms of communication that had taken place over the past 50 years, and the key role played by the ABC in the introduction of new technology. Two suggestions were made – do not buy a TV for another 6 months until the new digital storage device becomes available......and in a humorous vein, 'Take a tablet (I-Pad) and go to bed'. The National Youth Science Forum was well publicised by Tuck-weng Kok.

Author Angela Goode related her transformation from an ABC journalist to a farmer. She lamented the disconnect between country and city, and the inability of activists to appreciate sound animal husbandry. Her story of killing a fox (humanely) evoked wrath from the liberationists. Farming is utterly dependent on rain, which appears to be little appreciated by city dwellers.

Professor David David AC provided an insight into the genesis of cranio facial surgery and the formation of The Australian Cranio Facial Unit. The first breakthrough came when a surgeon developed a technique to peel back the skin and scalp to allow surgery on the bones underneath. From modest beginnings in 1975, the ACFU has conducted over 11,000 operations and has training and surgery links around the world.

Dr Daniel lerodiaconou from Deakin University displayed pictures of the fascinating underwater topography garnered by the latest remote sensing devices...he was preceded by story teller Trevor Kuchel with a bushy tale.

Dr Guna Fernandez who joined CBM (formerly Christian Blind Mission) in India 30 years ago is a passionate advocate for disabled people, particularly those in developing countries. She explained how difficult it is for disabled children to receive a decent education (and be mainstreamed in local schools), often through lack of water and sanitation.....and provided examples of successful improvements. She had established a Braille class at the Tamil Nadu school.

Perhaps the Long Term International Exchange Students should have been fined – they each presented and then sang a few bars of 'We are one' from *I am Australian*. And then Unley's answer to the Vienna Boys Choir, namely the Little Gems Primary School Choir, also sang *I am Australian* to promote next year's conference in Ballarat which has as its theme 'We are one'. Our little gems did a far better job.

John Rothwell CEO of the Royal Agricultural and Horticultural Society recounted the history and evolution of the Society and the Adelaide Showgrounds. There had been a few difficult times which they had managed their way through.....and his philosophy in such situations is 'Don't waste a crisis'.

Cameleer Russell Osborne took us on an energy charged 2 year epic camel journey from north to south across Australia with its stunning landscapes and extraordinary night skies. This journey allowed him to think about the many issues facing people in developing countries. He continues to raise money for charities (as he did for the Moira Kelly Foundation on the long trek) through camel expeditions.

Dr Jean-Jacques Decoster from Peru had provided a history of the rise and fall of the Inca Empire at the early morning breakfast. In the plenary session he dwelt on the need for income redistribution. Peru is quite a rich country but far too many live in abject poverty. His Rotary Club of Cusco is working with indigenous tribes to provide dental care, reliable and safe water, literacy and blankets.

D'arcy Lunn, well known to Unley, provided a power packed presentation on his adopted role as a 'Global Citizen'. Over the last 13 years he has worked in 64 countries - the two main thrusts of his efforts have been at alleviating poverty and as an advocate/coordinator for the End Polio Now campaign. He showed a video of the outstanding achievements of Judith in Uganda who had been crippled with polio at a young age but who now ran her own business and fostered 3 children. We need to set ambitious goals for 2014.

Sean Smith was something different. He had suffered two serious car accidents, the second of which could have left him in a wheelchair for life. He succeeded through sheer willpower to regain his health but another medical scare forced him to recognise that 133 kilos was a tad overweight. He decided to canoe his way to a leaner body and established FatPaddlers.com. His canoeing adventures took him across the globe, including icy Alaska. A spectacular video was produced of his scary experience with the Le Morne run. He raises money for designated charities during each gambit. Associate Professor Felice Jacka, a mental health expert from Deakin University, presented evidence of the harmful impacts of poor dietary habits on mental health. Studies looking at physical aspects of poor diet had indicated that for example in India, obesity is becoming such a problem that eventually 1 in 2 children may become affected by type 2 diabetes. Worldwide, obesity is now killing more people than infectious diseases and smoking combined. Correlations were being found in the studies of many countries that healthy diets contribute significantly to sound mental health, and vice versa with poor diets. Overweight children suffer from increasing levels of anxiety and depression. The ARH was thanked for sponsoring the research, but Rotary needs to do more in terms of prevention and tackling the multinational manufacturers of harmful food.

Dr Cristian Birzer, a lecturer in Mechanical Engineering at the University of Adelaide, described how he is teaching engineering students how to use the most basic of materials to reduce carbon footprints. He related how his students had examined the utility of various types of animal poo for heating and fertilisation - basically all good! Windmills can be readily constructed from discarded materials. The skills being imparted have application in many parts of the world.

The Saturday 'Hollywood Glamour' evening was a cheerfully chaotic affair. Our lot were left unrewarded for some of the best rags worn....but far worse was the inability of the organisers to draw out a winning Unley number from the attendance lottery...shades of the evil infernal squares.
