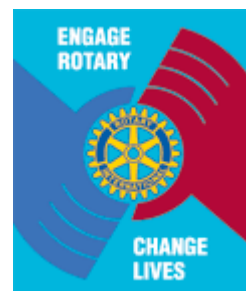


Happy Birthday Unley Rotary: celebrating 79 years of service

Club History - Bob Mills

The Club's Charter was granted on 17th April 1935. There were 18 Members with the last of them passing in 1976.

The first President was Walter Edwin Sims, a partner in the Ro-Bern Dried Fruit Company located at 25 King William Road, North Unley. These premises eventually became a wine shop and now a discount pharmacy.

The Club abounds with achievements and stories:

- Members since charter totaling in excess of 450
- Six District Governors from our Club
- Nine Members who became Mayors of Unley
- Our seven daughter, 15 granddaughter, 10 great-granddaughter and three great-great-granddaughter Clubs
- Our Thrift Shop that has raised in excess of \$1.3 million, and
- Our three-year sponsorship of Jean Kikedo, a Papuan girl, so she could study in Adelaide to become a qualified Social Worker. On her return to Port Moresby, Prime Minister Michael Somare immediately placed her in charge of women's affairs for the entire territory. She was subsequently head of the Polynesian South Pacific Area Women's Group, represented her Country at the United Nations and became Ombudsman for Papua New Guinea. She was awarded an MBE for her outstanding contributions.
- And there's the story about the Club's visit to the Rotary Club of Port Lincoln in 1950 when 20 Members chartered a light plane. It rained the entire weekend and was very stormy. The Australian Fleet was anchored in the harbor and several of the Officers came ashore to play golf. It was too stormy to return to their ship so the two Clubs invited them into the combined Meeting after finding them some dry clothes and then provided them with a bed for the night. Next morning the Admiral of the Fleet invited the Rotarians to be his guests on his flagship, the HMAS Sydney, and they were transported to and from the Sydney in the Admiral's pinnace.

Some Members who were well known around Unley were Past District Governor Ferg Ballantyne and Ian Ballantyne (Folding Furniture Manufacturing), PDG Fred Claridge (Holden dealer – passed away in this year), PDG Alan Clarkson (GP), Don & Ray Emmett (Builders), Alick Haddad (Chemist), Murray James (Funeral Director), Les Matten (Saddlery),

Maurie Paternoster (Plumbing), George Payne (Unley Town Clerk), Don Pynor (Dentist), Gordon Sellick (Furniture), Laurie Simon (NOMIS – Sound Amplification) and Dr Joe Whitehouse (GP).

Achievements:

- **Fundraising:** Total \$16,000, including; \$6,100 from the Thrift Shop on Glen Osmond Road, Eastwood; \$3,400 from the Arts & Craft function held in the Civic Centre, opened by the Governor of SA with 406 paintings hung and 94 sold for a total of \$13,112; \$2,600 from the Fun & Fancy Fair held in Heywood Park with cake, barbecue, plants, books and a white elephant stalls plus train rides, a bouncing castle and the one and only Humphrey B Bear and \$2,200 from the Saturday Bingo Nights run by two rostered Rotarians at the St Raphael's Hall in Young Street, Parkside.
- **Local Projects:** \$12,000 expended and included another installment on the purchase of a blood cell separator machine for the QEH, a new gas range for Meals on Wheels and a donation towards a spindle drill for the Phoenix Society.
- **International Projects:** \$4,000 expended including support for an Eye Camp in Bangladesh, Tube Wells in Bangladesh and Agricultural Training in Papua New Guinea.
- **Youth Exchange:** Kate Gordon went to the Philippines and Grant McGinnis arrived from Canada.
- **Vocational:** Careers Nights were held at Concordia and Walford and the POOTY was awarded to Senior Constable John Bennett from the dog squad.
- **Youth:** The Rotaract Club was in danger of winding-up due to dwindling membership but following an injection of 15 new Members after a membership drive the Club continued. \$600 was given to the SA Oral School to assist in the purchase of a 'Sennhuser' Radio Hearing Aid for a young girl. A skeleton was purchased and presented to the Unley St John's Ambulance Cadet division for use in training.
- **Speakers:** Without doubt the most memorable speaker was Dr David David from the Cranio-Facial Unit at the RAH. When he had finished showing the very graphic and gruesome slides of his work and the lights came back on a number of Members were either a shade of green or had left the room for a glass of water!
- **Fellowship:** Organised events included the very popular Garden Party at the home of Alan and Nan Clarkson; there were official visits to the Berri Rotary Club over a weekend as well as to Tailem Bend, Noarlunga East, Strathalbyn and Murray Bridge Rotary Clubs – we were visited by Adelaide, Glen Osmond and McLaren Vale Rotary Clubs; a Sons & Daughters Night; hands-on projects included the Fun and Fancy Fair at Heywood Park, a drinks stall at the Home for Incurables (later Julia Farr and now Disability SA) and the barbecue at the St Joseph's Centre Fete. The annual bowls match against the Rotary Club of Mitcham had the same result as we have had for the past few years – a loss.
- **By Members:** Past President George Payne joined a Fourth Avenue in Motion (FAIM) team that assisted in a building project in Papua New Guinea and a Paul Harris Fellowship was awarded to PP Tom Barlow for his outstanding service to the community and Rotary over a period of 36 years - he joined the Club in 1945, 10 years after it was founded.

Moving doctor's office rescues women from breast cancer

In Tamil Nadu, India, two doctors, both members of the Rotary Club of Srirangam, discovered an alarming trend in the remote city outskirts of Trichy, women dying of breast cancer.

Drs. K. Govindaraj and K.N. Srinivasan knew that much of the death and suffering could be avoided, and both were motivated by their personal experiences with the disease. Govindaraj watched his mother die of breast cancer a decade earlier, and helped found the Dr. K. Shantha Breast Cancer Foundation in her memory. Srinivasan, an oncologist, witnessed unprecedented growth in the number of younger patients coming to his clinic with advanced stages of the disease.

According to the National Cancer Registry of India, 20 to 40 women per 100,000 are suffering from breast cancer. And because many women lack the resources to travel to the city, or the \$50 fee for proper screening, the doctors needed a unique approach. During a trip to South Korea, Govindaraj saw a large van outfitted with X-ray equipment parked outside a mall, and thought a moving doctor's office and lab -- or "mammobus" -- could overcome the challenges they faced.

Through a Rotary global grant, the men were able to buy and outfit their own bus. Since April 2012 the Shantha Foundation's mammobus, supported by local Rotarians and the Rotary Club of Rockville, Maryland, USA, has administered 2,500 free breast cancer screenings. Early stage cancer has been detected and treated in six women, and thousands have been taught how to conduct regular self-exams, an important means of early detection.

"Women have started feeling that they have easy access to health without compromising their day to day work and earnings," Srinivasan says. "Women come out to our health workers with their health-related problems and discuss freely about various aspects of health and diseases, not just about breast cancer."

The mammobus cost \$34,000 and is equipped with a mammography machine, an ultrasonogram, and materials that teach the method and importance of self-exams. The Shantha Foundation maintains the vehicle and reaches out to nongovernmental organizations, women's groups, and employers to arrange visits. The bus stops anywhere a large group of women congregate, with priority given to rural areas. The Srirangam club also helps line up visits and widely promotes the bus through various media.

"More and more clubs and NGOs want to participate and are booking the mammobus well in advance," says Srinivasan. "We are already booked until the end of May."

Govindaraj says if something is detected during screening, the woman is given the choice to get a biopsy at the Shantha Foundation's affiliated hospital, or to have the foundation arrange a biopsy with a local radiologist.

If a biopsy proves malignant, the woman is advised to undergo treatment in a hospital in her own city or, if willing, to receive treatment at the Shantha Foundation hospital. Either way, the procedure is covered by government insurance. The foundation provides follow-up support and counseling for patients and families.

Dr. Chenguttai Dheenani, a retired surgeon and member of the Rotary Club of Rockville, Maryland, USA, became involved in the project after he met a member from Tamil Nadu at Rotary's international convention. In addition to convincing his club to support the project, Dheenani, a lifelong member of the American Tamil Medical Association, secured a \$5,000 donation from the association.

"In many cases, this will be the first doctor these women have seen," says Dheenani. "This venture is bringing life-saving detection right to their doorsteps."

Rotary members have also been lining up volunteers to ride on the bus and talk to the women about HIV/AIDS awareness and other health issues.

Meanwhile, the doctors have been gathering medical data that will benefit universities in India and other countries, data that up to this point had not been available.

"I wish and pray for many more mammobuses in our country," says Srinivasan. "Healthy women are the backbone of a community."

Niki Vincent has led the Leaders Institute of South Australia and its renowned programs for over 10 years. She has a background in psychology, public health and leadership development, including studies at Harvard University and the Integral Institute in Colorado. She has received many prestigious awards in her career (including Telstra Business Woman of the Year State Finalist (2005) and an Australian Leadership Award (2007)) and is currently undertaking a PhD in adult consciousness and leadership development.

Dr Lynn Arnold AO is an Anglican deacon and a former Australian politician, who was the Labor Premier of South Australia between 4 September 1992 and 14 December 1993. After leaving politics, Arnold worked for World Vision from 1997 to 2007, and for Anglicare SA since March 2008. In November 2013 he was ordained a deacon of the Anglican Church. On 8 December 2007 the Anglican Archbishop of Adelaide, the Most Reverend Jeffrey Driver, announced Dr Arnold's appointment as Chief Executive of Anglicare SA. He was in this role from 18 March 2008 to 30 June 2012, after which date he was exploring ordination to the Anglican priesthood. He was ordained deacon in Adelaide in November 2013.

This year's Assembly is focusing on collaboration between clubs and planning to achieve goals in each Portfolio. There are streams prepared for Club Committees for each avenue of service and also Club Officers. "Talking as a group gives insight to other clubs and their involvement in programs that can be achieved." – Judy Shipp, President, Holdfast Bay. Newer members are also welcome, with a dedicated stream for newer members of Rotary.
