
Guest Speaker - Mark Burns: Changes in the Real Estate Industry in the Last Five Years

Wendy introduced the guest speaker – Mark Burns whose topic was recent trends in real estate. Mark moved to Adelaide with his family in 2000 and entered the Real Estate industry in 2004 as a sales consultant with LJ Hooker in Blackwood. Over time he bought into the business and became the outright owner in 2010. He has been in the Rotary Club of Blackwood for ten years and is on the Board of the Real Estate Employers Federation (SA and NT).

Mark told us the average age of agents in SA is 55 and in general they're resistant to change which is bad luck for them because change is all that's on the menu. Previously the agents had information that the general public didn't have but this is no longer the case. RealEstate.com.au is the dominant on line advertising site in SA and has a virtual monopoly so it can charge a lot for what it does. As well as providing an advertising medium it is a veritable store of data that buyers can use to become familiar with the specific property and the market.



Other information that was previously only available to agents through sites like Core Logic RP Data is now available to buyers who are now better informed than ever before. Virtually nothing is private information anymore, making the real estate market about as pure a market as you can get.

The role of the Real Estate Agent is to use their skills to bring the property to the attention of potential buyers and to solicit offers. The main skill required at that point is the capacity to negotiate a transaction to get the best outcome possible for the seller.

Rotary Clubs Worldwide Mobilise in Support of Earthquake-ravaged Nepal

Rotary International President Gary C.K. Huang is urging the humanitarian organization's 1.2 million members worldwide to assist the victims of earthquake-ravaged Nepal in any way possible, including contributing to ShelterBox, the international disaster response charity that is Rotary's project partner for disaster relief.

"Rotary members worldwide stand together in expressing a profound sadness at the devastation resulting from this weekend's deadly earthquake in Nepal," said Huang. "As we mourn the thousands of lives lost, Rotary joins other international agencies in providing immediate relief to survivors through our partnership with ShelterBox and mobilizing our expertise to support long-term recovery and rebuilding efforts throughout the country."

A donation of approximately US\$1000 will allow ShelterBox to deliver emergency shelter and other lifesaving equipment to a family that has lost everything following a disaster.

Rotary's 34,000 clubs around the world may also pursue other ways to help including holding local fund-raisers, food and supply drives, and by giving to other established relief agencies. Rotary clubs in the United States, Malaysia, Singapore, India, Bangladesh and others are coordinating their support for

immediate needs such as dry foods, tents, blankets, first aid kits and safe drinking water.

Looking ahead, Rotary will focus on intermediate and long-term recovery and rebuilding efforts. The experience and knowledge of Rotary members in Nepal will be essential in ensuring that resources are used for projects and programs that address true community needs.

Nobel Laureate Arias Opens Rotary Peace Symposium in São Paulo

When former Costa Rican president Oscar Arias was eight years old, his country abolished its military and turned its focus instead to human rights and peace. Now, the Nobel Peace laureate believes the world can gain just as much by following his country's example. Speaking at the Rotary Peace Symposium on 4 June in São Paulo, Brazil, Arias recounted how his country traded in its tanks and heavy artillery to invest instead in economic reform and social justice.

"My country promised me, and all its children, that it would invest not in the weapons of our past, but in the tools of our future; not in barracks, but in schools, hospitals, and national parks; not in soldiers, but in teachers, doctors, and park guards," said Arias. "My country decided that it devoted its resources to war long enough and that it wanted to devote the genius of its people to the science of averting war."

Arias received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1987 for his work to bring the countries of Central America together to sign a peace accord that ended the military conflicts that then plagued the region. The conflicts were challenging Costa Rica's culture of peace. As president, Arias was pressured by other governments to take up arms against the Sandinista government in Nicaragua and even threatened with sanctions. He stood firm in maintaining his country's neutrality.

"This enabled my little country to become the platform for the peace accords that gradually ended the unrest in our part of the world," he said.

Arias noted that the \$1.77 trillion the world spends on the military could easily eliminate preventable diseases like malaria and provide basic education for children worldwide.

"I don't have to tell a room full of peace fellows that violence feeds off of illiteracy and desperation. If we can change the numbers of our military spending, we will shift the balance towards peace."

Arias explained to the crowd how he became a Rotary member three months ago.

"This organization, of which I am now so proud to be a part, is without a doubt a key player in strengthening and building peace," he concluded. "The [peace fellows] before me today must lead the way. You have tremendous potential, each and every one of you, to recalculate the mathematics of war that has dominated humanity for so long."

Closing Moments

Sergeant Ken Haines led the fines session after awarding the \$10 prize for the unlucky squares to Heather Kilsby who had accepted someone else's favourite number after another someone else had taken hers. Which all goes to show you should be careful what you wish for.

After an enjoyable evening of information and fellowship President Joan closed the meeting at precisely 8 pm.
