Guest Speaker - Hon David Wotton AM: Mount Lofty Botanic Garden

Graham Beckett introduced our Speaker for the evening, Hon David Wotton AM, who spoke about the Mount Lofty Botanic Gardens.

The Gardens first opened as a cool climate garden in 1977 by Noel Lothian, who was the Director of the Adelaide Botanical Gardens. That was only the beginning of the dramas that followed. In 1983 the Hills experienced the second Ash Wednesday which unfortunately burnt through the wonderful garden destroying so much. This was not a good time economically for the State and the National Parks and gardens were much underfunded and neglected.

The lack of staff and funding for the Garden came to a head in 2011. They were very afraid they were about to lose all funding. It was decided that something had to be done to secure the future Garden, so a Public Meeting was arranged, 350 people attended and a Support Group was established. They were to work with Government and the Botanic Gardens. A petition was put together and volunteers gathered 3,500 signatures. They became an incorporated body.

The Support Group went to the Gardens on holidays and weekends to ask visitors what they felt was needed to make their experience richer. It was recommended that a real need for somewhere to meet, shelter and for education about the Garden. The Government turned them down for funding (surprise, surprise).

David Gilbert, Architect, suggested they go to the University Architect Students to find a design. There were 103 students and 100 designs. A winner was decided and the cost was to be \$300,000. The community assisted with funding, 130 people donated \$315,000. Chris Steele Scott took the role of fundraising,

\$70,000 came from a private foundation, and Adelaide Hills Council gave \$5,000. In 2014 Chris died suddenly. It was decided to recognize her by naming the building after her.

The Contractor was hired and was ready to start, but nobody was prepared to sign the contract and in the end David signed the contract under pressure to get the job done. It took 12 months to build, and is a wonderful addition to an amazing Garden which everyone should visit at some stage. The not so surprising upshot was that the Minister wanted to attend to Open the building (even 'though the Government had no involvement), but he was told no.

David responded to a number of questions from the floor and invited everyone to visit the Gardens and enjoy the new pavilion. Chairman Graham presented a gift to David who was thanked by acclamation.

Steve Finos, Vice Chair of the **Unley Road Association** (of which our club has become the most recent member) explained that the association has the prime purpose of promoting Unley Road and its businesses. It levies its members and invests in advertising material and special events such as the free community concert. Steve looks forward to working closely with our club, and the association will be sponsoring the Carols. Rose Linh is their coordinator.

Stephen Westgarth reported that David Middleton had sorted both the Santa Claus suit and posters for the Carols. Assistance is needed to **distribute the Carols posters** to businesses firstly along Unley Road, followed by King William, Duthy and Fullarton Roads......aim to start getting the material out within two weeks of the event. Rose Linh suggested she could help with social media. Wendy to follow up with Advertiser and Messenger. Jerry and Ken will handle the BBQ.

Wendy Andrews asked members to help fill Reno's roster for the **Christmas Tree in Unley Shopping Centre**. The Bunnings BBQ at the end of this month requires extra volunteers for the afternoon shift.

Six women recognized at United Nations for leadership, humanitarian service

Six Rotary Global Women of Action for 2015 were recognized during Rotary Day at the United Nations on 7 November in New York City for their dedication and service, which have improved the lives of thousands around the world.

"The women we are honoring here today are leaders in Rotary," said Rotary President K.R. Ravindran. "They are pushing the boundaries of Rotary service, pushing us all to do more, be more, and achieve more."

Lakshmi Puri, assistant secretary-general of the United Nations and deputy executive director of UN Women, praised Rotary for its acknowledgment of the crucial role women play.

"I'm very pleased you have picked this team of gender equality and women empowerment," she said.

The six women, who were selected by Rotary senior leaders and staff from more than 100 nominees from around the world, are:

- Dr. Hashrat A. Begum, of the Rotary Club of Dhaka North West, in Bangladesh, who has implemented several large-scale projects to deliver health care to poor and underserved communities.
- Stella S. Dongo, of the Rotary Club of Highlands, in Zimbabwe, who leads the Community Empowerment Project in the city of Harare. The project provides basic business and computer training to more than 6,000 women and youths affected by HIV/AIDS.
- Lucy C. Hobgood-Brown, of the Rotary E-Club of Greater Sydney, in New South Wales, Australia, who co-founded HandUp Congo, a nonprofit that promotes and facilitates sustainable community-driven business, educational, social, and health initiatives in underprivileged communities in the Democratic Republic of Congo.
- Razia Jan, of the Rotary Club of Duxbury, in Massachusetts, USA, who has spent decades fighting for girls'
 educational rights in Afghanistan. An Afghan native, she is the founder and director of the <u>Zabuli Education Center</u>, a
 school that provides free education to more than 480 girls in Deh'Subz, outside Kabul, Afghanistan. She was also
 recognized as a CNN Hero in 2012.
- Kerstin Jeska-Thorwart, of the Rotary Club of Nürnberg-Sigena, in Germany, who launched the <u>Babyhospital Galle</u> project after surviving the 2004 tsunami in Sri Lanka. With a budget of \$1.8 million and the support of 200 Rotary clubs, the project rebuilt and equipped the Mahamodara Teaching Hospital, in Galle, Sri Lanka. The hospital has served more than 150,000 children and more than 2.2 million women.
- Dr. Deborah K.W. Walters, of the Rotary Club of Unity, in Maine, USA, a neuroscientist who has served as director of <u>Safe Passage (Camino Seguro)</u>, a nonprofit that provides educational and social services to families who live in the Guatemala City garbage dump.

Each of the women addressed attendees and led discussions on topics related to her work.

More than 1,000 Rotary members, UN officials, Rotary youth program participants, and guests gathered at this year's annual event, which celebrated 70 years of partnership between Rotary and the UN. A morning youth session was open to high school students, including members of Rotary's Interact and Youth Exchange programs.

Guest speakers included Fabia Yazaki, acting chief for evaluation and communications in the UN's department of public information; Karin Ryan, senior project adviser for the human rights program at the Carter Center; Ambassador at-Large Susan Coppedge Amato,

director of the Office to Monitor and Combat Trafficking in Persons for the U.S. Department of State; Melissa Russell, vice president of strategic partnerships for the International Justice Mission; Jeffrey Kluger, Time magazine editor at-large; and Archie Panjabi, Emmy Award-winning actress and Rotary polio ambassador.
