Vocational & Youth Service

Sheila Evans, the Chair of the Vocational Committee advised of a planned programme for unemployed younger folk to help them effectively influence potential employers. The project will be financed by the Campbelltown Skills Share Inc. Trust of which the club is the custodian.

Rotarians are required to assist with Interview training on 15th and 23rd of March.

Stephen Westgarth reported on progress in preparing for this year's Police Officer of the Year. The presentation is scheduled for 17th of May with the public award at the Unley Memorial Gardens and the evening dinner at Kooyonga Golf Club. In all, over 1,800 posters and other information has been widely distributed to all Rotary Clubs in South Australia, to all of the fire services, emergency services, local governments and, of course, police stations. Good news for the Police Band is that they've been invited to London the play for the Queen is bad news for us in that it will be in May and alternative arrangements for entertainment need to be made.

Stephen also advised that efforts are under way to involve corporates and sponsors to raise the profile of the project.

International Service

Graham Beckett reported on the International Committees activities. The Timor project is coming to an end and the committee is casting around for a new focus. They are looking at water filter systems the club could support that will make a difference to many lives as there is a shortage of potable water throughout the world and in the Pacific region close to us. Trevor McGuirk is promoting involvement in medical services in communities in Peru as a major project and the Indian 'adopt a village' project is still under active consideration. It was also reported that the container of supplies recently sent to East Timor had arrived and was well received although Chandra Sluggett had expressed some reservations about the quality of some of the cargo.

The **Thrift Shop** was the subject of open discussion. EFTPOS is being introduced and will require training. Bob Mullins advised that a waste management firm has been contracted to take away the rubbish although waste cardboard will need to be cut into smaller pieces. The visibility of the shop was discussed after the recent initiative by Bob Mullins and Lindsay

England to wash the front has made a big difference. Painting it in Rotary colours is being considered.

Community Service

Wendy Andrews reported on behalf of the Community Services Committee. On the 5th Dec I attended a meeting Catherine House along with 4 other Rotarians representing different clubs. They had a wish list to improve the accommodation of the apartments. We each took on a role to research where we could acquire certain goods. I took on second hand furniture, and have been given the number of a Campbelltown Rotarian to view their goods privately on a Tuesday. I will also have details of Second Chance. They need lounges and lounge chairs, and dining tables with 4 chairs. These would be purchased by the staff. We are to have a second meeting, I will then have a committee meeting to see if they want to go ahead and with this proposal and a budget. I am suggesting \$500. They also need single sheets which they can buy from the Thrift Shop.

On the 11th Dec I was on the judging panel along with Rosemary Worthington C.E.O and a young carer to judge the Carers SA Young Care Photography Project .This project was in two parts: firstly the running of photography workshops in Mt Gambier, Berri, Port Lincoln,

Royal Park and Port Augusta, and secondly whereby young carers can submit photographs which depicts what caring means to them. They comment that this could not have been possible without the support of Rotary, providing funding and connections to venues to support the workshops. The work shops were well attend and the feedback was great including "Fantastic Day, can we do it again" and "Thanks for a great day. I enjoyed meeting with other Young Carers." I was disappointed there were only 17 entries but they seemed happy with that. The winner was from Port Lincoln and was presented with an I Pad Air Tablet by a staff member and a representative from the Rotary Club of Port Lincoln in January with hopes for a local media story. Donations of \$500 from Port Lincoln, Loxton \$500, and Port Augusta \$166 were received leaving Unley to pay the remaining amount of \$1663.

The Salvation Army received a donation of \$333.33 for hire of tables and chairs and 2 other clubs donated the same amount.

Six Christmas Hampers were delivered to carers who would have been disadvantaged otherwise at Christmas. A short sentence on each of the recipients was received.

Three cartons of 16 Baked Puddings were delivered to to Pizza Meals on Wheels, with part of the profits supporting Rotary Foundation,

The Committee supported "Books for Babies" to celebrate Rotary's 111 birthday on Feb 23 Feb, where by every baby born in S.A. between the 20 and 24th Feb 2016 will receive a hard-board book by Mem Fox of "Ten little fingers and ten little toes" at \$7 each. The maximum out lay would be no more than \$150 and used as a Rotary promotion for our club and the Literacy PR. This is being coordinated by the Rotary Club of Mitcham and the Rotary Club of Adelaide West.

Kay continues to cut and style hair for clients of Bramwell House without charge.

A cheque for \$1,000 is to be sent to CFSD Foundation re recent bushfires.

The 80th birthday gift to the people of Unley has now been finalised with table and chairs and a shelter at Fraser Reserve.

Geoff Hill has identified waiting rooms where Rotary Down Under can be put for reading and a roster of Rotarians to refill the supply as new editions become available will be established. The new brochure was raised as an achievement of this outstanding committee, as was the building relationship with the Unley Road Association.

District leaders set to celebrate Foundation's centennial

The Rotary Foundation has been improving lives since 1917. Learn about our work and help us celebrate 100 years of doing good in the world.

Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair Ray Klinginsmith asked district governors in training at the International Assembly to lead the celebration of the Foundation's centennial year, 2016-17.

"You are the primary contacts between the Foundation and our 34,000 Rotary clubs in the world. The success of the centennial celebration is largely in your hands," said Klinginsmith at a 19 January general session. "Catch the spirit and spread the word about the importance of celebrating our success."

Since the Foundation was established in 1917, it has spent more than \$3 billion on programs and projects to improve the lives of millions worldwide, said Klinginsmith.

The centennial celebration officially kicks off in May at the Rotary Convention in Korea and culminates at the 2017 convention in Atlanta.

District plans for the centennial

Governor-elect Tom James Markos of District 5100 in Oregon, USA, says he is proud to be serving during such a historic year. He plans to promote the centennial not only to his district's members, but also through local media.

"We need the public to be aware of what we've accomplished," says Markos, who has set a district goal of raising \$1 million for the Foundation during the centennial year.

Bill Proctor, incoming governor of District 7080 in Ontario, Canada, believes the centennial year is an opportunity to "refocus and reeducate" members on the importance the Foundation's work.

"We have so many accomplishments to celebrate," said Proctor. "We need to use the momentum of the celebration to strengthen the Foundation's future."
