

Guest Speaker - Ian Bailey: H₂O (aka Dihydrogen Oxide)

Reno Elms Introduced Ian Bailey, a long term resident and notable citizen of the Adelaide Hills and also the proprietor of Mt Lofty Spring Water, to give us the potted history of his business and also of Water as an Industry. In the process lan disabused your scribe of the view that bottled water is just distilled water and that there is no spring.

As we were reminded last week, the members of Unley Rotary are well experienced at living, and all of us would remember when water only came out of a tap, in my case originally from the pristine Warragamba Dam, but for most of us directly from the mighty Murray, affording Adelaide with the much deserved reputation at the time as having the worst drinking water in the nation (although - according to President Stephen, it was

longevity enhancing). This state of affairs created a ready market for bottled water and in 1980 Ian became a pioneer in an industry that is now worth in the vicinity of \$50 million per year.

The water springs 100 meters below the Mt Lofty Lookout on a property that has been in the Bailey family for generations. No-one knows where it comes from, but it pushes its way through the sandstone that filters it, and gushes forth at the rate of 7-8,000 litres per hour, so there's plenty of it. The property is surrounded by Government land so there is no private competition for the water and no ready source of pollution. And springing in an elevated location, gravity provides all the water pressure that's required for it to be used.

The original use was market gardening, but when lan reached adulthood it was clear that there wasn't enough in the farm to support a second family, so he trotted off to find a living elsewhere. Returning to the farm on the death of his father he had no desire to be a farmer and got job at the refinery, somewhat bemused by the fact that people kept on turning up to get some spring water. Some even suggested he could sell it. So he had a go!

It started as a sideline business, manually filling 20 litre containers of water and delivering it to customers – not just for drinking, but also by spa shops who needed clean water for their displays, and for those with ornamental fish. He put on franchisees to do the selling and when he got to five, he left the refinery devoted himself to the business full time. They started filling bottles manually, and when they got to 15 franchisees the business became unwieldy so he sold off the distribution business and focused on production.

They invested in the equipment for packaging the water and now do most of the packaging for the distributors in Adelaide producing 100,000 litres per day. They also do small production runs for those who would like a private label. The business employs a dozen folk full time and seasonal workers as required. Growth continues steadily and they now

export interstate and have recently started exporting to China where many don't trust their own water.

Quality is paramount, they check it every day themselves and it's checked externally by SA Pathology regularly. As well as the natural sand stone filtering before it comes out, the water is exposed to ultra violet light and put through filters fine enough to capture any residual bacteria. It's not only safe to drink. It has sufficient natural fluoride so that when used with fluoride toothpaste is just as good for your teeth as the town supply.

Bureaucracy has provided some problems in the past but ended up being supportive and then metering the use so they could tax it. They also pay 13.5 cents to cover the bottle recycling costs – much of which supports charities and community groups.

Beyond training: Reinvigorating Timor Lesté through professional learning and mentoring in the post-independence era

Regular teacher training supports Timor Lesté's new child centred curriculum, where school leaders are expected to provide ongoing feedback to teachers, while not necessarily having an in depth understanding of their role in leading learning.

To address this issue, a capacity building approach involving a leadership program, ongoing mentoring and establishing teacher peer learning groups is underway in Timor Lesté. The approach is supported by tablet technology, which is highly innovative given that computer use in schools is almost non-existent.

This interactive session has wider interest beyond Timor Lesté and other developing countries in terms of strategies for supporting teachers and leaders in changing their practices and using IT to track impacts on student learning.

Susanne Owen is currently being funded by the Australian Embassy and based as a consultant in the Ministry of Education in Timor Lesté. In this role, Susanne has responsibility as Team Leader for the design and implementation of the Professional Learning and Mentoring Program in Timor Lesté. Susanne was

previously Team Leader for a large scale ICT in Education project in Papua. She also has been an Education Department Systems Manager for an OECD innovative education project, and has worked as a private consultant in national health and education and continues as a university researcher and supervisor of doctoral research candidates.
