Guest Speaker – Graham Ey: "Oh no, is that an ambulance blinking in my rear vision mirror...?"

Valerie Bonython introduced Graham who started his working life in various trades before following an Ambulance one day and joining up in the late 1960's. Graham gave us an interesting talk about the development of the of the Ambulance Service over time, growing from a very small operation to one that today employs 3,500 people in South Australia.

The talk is quite difficult to summarise, largely because it was replete with interesting anecdotes and supported by photographs and videos that demonstrated the progress of processes and technology in the Ambulance Service over the time.

We were shown Ambulance vehicles from the past and present. Initially they weren't much more than Station Wagons with no nifty stretchers that could be loaded easily, equipped only with a few bandages and slings, and a very basic first aid kit. Each new vehicle was bigger and more powerful, but they all had their difficulties due to the lack of proper design of the back end. Finally, someone had the bright idea of getting ambulance officers to design what they needed and it proved to be a great success.

Graham showed lots of pictures of the kit now available to ambulance officers and this enables them to offer an excellent service to the public. Ambulance officers are now highly trained professionals. In 1998 the Paramedic Qualification was introduced and Graham was an early graduate. Now a university degree is required and the entry score is very high. Naturally there is also rigorous ongoing education and training.

There were several questions and Graham was thanked by Valerie.

Thrift Shop Training

Before closing we all enjoyed a detailed training session on how to use the cash register and the EFTPOS machine in the Thrift Shop. The material is reproduced on the following pages for you to relive the pleasure of the experience, to commit to memory, and to carry with you at all times.

Pam Trimmer ran a training session on using the cash register and the EFTPOS machine in the Thrift Shop. Things have moved a long way in a short period of time from the days of the wooden cash draw where the only thing you had to do was remember to remove the bolt from the side so you could open it.

There was a lot of information, and quite a lot to remember, and Pam advised the instructions would be laminated and left in situ for reference. Undoubtedly, we will quickly get used to it on the job, but the need for accuracy and diligent attention to detail was stressed.

For those members and volunteers who were not present for the Thrift Shop training session, the instructions extracted from Pam's slide presentation are provided below.

Cash Register Procedures

Registering a Sale

- Ensure key points to 'R'.
- Enter value of sale (NO decimal point)
- Press DEPARTMENT key (Homewares, Misc., Books, etc.)
- If more than one item (e.g. \$10 ladies clothing and \$10 books) press \$10 Ladies Clothing, \$10 Books and then press SUB TOTAL (will show \$20 on screen)
- Ask customer how they are paying:
 - If paying by cash: Determine the amount being tendered, e.g. \$50, enter the amount (no decimal point) and press CASH TEND, register will display amount of change needed (till drawer will open), put money in till and give change displayed; OR Press CASH TEND (till drawer will open). Change value will not be displayed.
 - If paying by card: Press 'EFTPOS' key (till drawer will open) and do EFTPOS transaction (see EFTPOS instructions)

(Please note that there is a green folder located on the right hand side of the counter which has all of the Register instructions).

End of Day Register Procedure

The following is a "Must Do"

- Turn the key to 'Z'
- Press 'CASH TEND'
- The cash roll for the day's total is printed (keep to attach to EFTPOS Summary)
- Turn the key back to 'R'
- Replace the cash float in the Blue Cash Box. It should be made up of \$90 in notes (no \$50s) and \$35 in assorted coins
- Put money in plastic bag and put in safe.

FFTPOS Procedures

Start of Day Procedure

- Switch on button (top left underneath) Hold button until light comes on and let go.
- Screen will light up: 'Hi I'm Albert"
- If prompted, enter password

To Enter a Sale

Follow machine instructions

- Enter amount (no decimal point) and press 'OK'
- Tap (if Paywave) or insert card OR turn machine around and let customer tap or insert their card. Get the customer to enter their PIN if the machine requests it.
- Machine will automatically print out our receipt; tear off and make sure transaction has been approved.
- Put docket in cash register under cash tray.
- If customer wants a receipt, press 'PRINT' (will be displayed at bottom left of screen).
- If no receipt required, press 'FINISH' (bottom right of screen)
- Screen will return to normal

Refunds

- Swipe screen to display 'menu' OR press 'MENU' button
- Press 'REFUND'
- Enter amount (no decimal point)
- Swipe or insert card and follow screen prompts re customer PIN, etc.
- Press 'FINISH'

End of Day Procedure

Do Transaction Summary

- Swipe screen or press 'MENU' button.
 - ~ Tap 'HISTORY AND TOTALS'
 - ~ Tap 'SETTLEMENTS'
 - ~ Tap 'SETTLE' (bottom left of screen)
 - ~ Tap 'PRINT'
- Attach all EFTPOS dockets in cash register to the Settlement Transaction List and then attach the daily summary from the cash register. Leave them in the Daily Takings book.
- No need to turn off EFTPOS machine LEAVE IT ON THE COUNTER.
- If all else fails, ring Customer Service 1800 230 177 and quote Terminal No. 45520100.

Member Spotlight: Stephen Mwanje promotes health care for all in Uganda

"This was a gift from God." Stephen Mwanje remembers those words, spoken by a sick man who had just received free treatment from a doctor at a Rotary-led Family Health Day in Uganda last fall. "He never thought he would get the medical attention he needed," explains Mwanje, a member of the Rotary Club of Mukono, Uganda, who made that man's care possible.

In 2010-11, Mwanje was governor of District 9200, which then included Ethiopia, Eritrea, Kenya, Tanzania, and Uganda. As he was researching options to address Uganda's lack of health care, he crossed paths with Marion Bunch, an American Rotarian who had founded Rotarians for Family Health & AIDS Prevention in 2004. Their collaboration resulted in the country's first free health clinic, organized by Mwanje in 2011.

Uganda, Nigeria, Ghana, and South Africa now hold Rotary Family Health Days once or twice a year. Local partners finance up to 80 percent of the budget for the health days, making the program sustainable. The clinics last two or three days and are staffed by volunteer health professionals who provide a wide range of services and treatments to anyone who shows up. More than a million people have been treated with the help of thousands of Rotary volunteers. Because of Mwanje's commitment to health care in Uganda, the country also has its first oncology clinic, which was funded by a Rotary grant.


