It included a trip down history lane led by Bob Mills, an outline of the club's current activities from Greg McLeod, two inductions, three Paul Harris Fellowship presentations, a donation to Catherine House, a quick address by District Governor Dick Wilson, and a raffle draw of gargantuan proportions, symbolic of the club's long history. Reno Elms and the Salvos benefited from a large "birthday" cake generously donated by Damien Hein. And members were urged to sign a petition in favour of keeping Majors Reno and Roslyn in Unley.....quite rightly so.

President Stephen thanked all who had attended and paid special tribute to chief organiser Patsy Beckett, club Historian Bob Mills and Secretary Greg McLeod for their contributions. The meeting closed late – but who cares?

## **Keynote Speakers**

## Bob Mills: A Brief History of the Rotary Club of Unley

The Unley Club was formed by the Rotary Club of Adelaide and was the third Club in South Australia. The Club was chartered on 17th April 1935 with 18 Members.

- Our Club has created seven daughter clubs and the family extends to 28 Clubs including three great-great-grand daughter clubs in District 9520 and District 9500.
- An estimated 2500 people have been members.
- Seven District Governors have been provided.
- A total of 80 Paul Harris Fellows (PHF) and 18 Sapphire Pins have been awarded with 26 PHFs being given to non-Rotarians.
- Nine Mayors, nine Councilors and four Town Clerks have been members.
- The current membership includes 13 Past Presidents.
- There are eight current Members who have served for at least 25 years

#### **FUNDRAISING**

Our major and consistent fundraising source is the Thrift Shop, the envy of many Clubs. The Thrift shop started in November 1973. Since its commencement the Thrift Shop has raised an estimated \$1,400,000 in today's dollars.

More recently monthly "sausage sizzles" at the Bunnings store and a regular barbecue with Detmold Packaging has provided approximately \$10,000 per year to our funds with both events also allowing some publicity for Rotary and the Club.

#### **PROJECTS**

One of the earliest and significant projects was the establishment in 1945 of a club for War veterans and retired men in the Unley community. A former air raid hut was completely furnished and equipped with a radio, books, games and other facilities.

The most recent project involved the making hands demonstration in the Unley Shopping Centre. These are simple yet very effective mechanical hands for amputees resulting from landmines in Southeast Asia.

Permanent fixtures in the Unley area involving the Club include:

- A new flagpole and a heritage drinking fountain in the Soldiers' Memorial Gardens
- A Peace Garden in memory of the Bali bombing victims
- And the replacement Rotunda in the Soldiers' Memorial gardens

The Police Officer of the Year Award has been presented annually since 1978 and aims to give recognition to police officers for outstanding services to the community.

The club has been a keen supporter of the Indigenous Medical Student program with our first student, Dr. Olivier O'Donoghue working within the aboriginal community in Alice Springs.

On the International scene many projects to improve the lifestyle and opportunities of those in need have been completed and range from shipping containers of general goods and school supplies to Timor Lesté to providing water from 40 bores to many towns and villages via the Dharmavaram Mid-Town project in India.

#### THE FUTURE

The past is history, the future is about opportunities and these challenges will be addressed by a Club that has been injected with the enthusiasm of recent and younger Members.

## Greg McLeod: More of what Unley Rotary has done and is doing

The Rotary Club of Unley is a busy Club, a productive and companionable Club, well motivated but always striving to do better and be a good citizen of the world.

From an international perspective:

- the Club has assisted with the provision of IT services to an orphanage in Sri Lanka, in land improvement and irrigation in poor rural India, in the provision of school and stationery needs in East Timor, in the improvement of hygiene facilities for school-age female students, in the provision of eyeglasses, in assistance to Nepal and in the financing of shelter boxes which are essential emergency supplies, tenting, etc that are dispatched to all parts of the world experiencing natural or other humanitarian disasters;
- the Club is working up an invovlement in an existing external Cusco Peru project which entails monthly medical team visits to provide health treatment and medical advice, and the provisioning of the erection of 'greenhouses' for the propagation of vegetables to improve the health of remote hills populations;
- the Club strongly supports the Helping Hands project which has as its aim the provision of basic mechanical hands to sufferers of limb loss due to mine and other explosions in time of war or insurgency, a project that is already well received in Cambodia. The

insurgency, a project that is already well received in Cambodia. These units can be assembled on the spot and with a little training can be maintained and repaired by the end user, and enable the recipients to regain their dignity and worth and usefulness in society;

• the Club contributes to the Rotary Foundation and other arms of Rotary in its various worldwide projects, perhaps the most well-known of which is the struggle (nearly over) to rid the world of the scourge of polio.

From a local community perspective:

- the Club has provided much needed mats to the Unley Park Sports Club to protect new flooring, which is a follow-up to the supply last year of a heart defibrillator unit;
- we have provided seed money for a verge vegetable garden as part of the Sustainable Communities initiative.
- we have provided seating and shelter structures for the Fraser Reserve park in Myrtle Bank, and bench furniture for the Glen Osmond Scouts;
- we have provided Xmas hampers to the Young Carers Association and baked puddings to the Italian community version of Meals on Wheels;
- we have approved funding for the installation of a fountain in the Katherine Street Park redevelopment being undertaken by the UCC.
- we have provided a donation to the CFS in recognition of the support by the CFS to the community in its work in the recent bushfires:
- in the ongoing struggle against the effects of drug addiction, the Club has provided fridge magnets which contain vital address and phone contacts detailing where help can be sought by sufferers and families of sufferers, and are intended to be placed with police, in police stations, outreach clinics, hospitals, etc;
- we have provided or are in the course of providing funding for the upgrading of existing accommodation provided by Catherine House, which provides support for homeless women without children, and seeks to help them with education and job finding to get back into society.
- financial assistance has also been provided to the Young Carers Association in supporting a photography competition aimed at developing skills for young people charged by circumstance with looking after other family members or similar and to enable them through photography to depict what caring means to them.

The Salvos are assisted in many ways, through the matching of funds collected by Club members at Red Shield Appeal to providing donation collectors and manpower at Christmas appeal time.

The Club also funds attendees at RYLA camp and the National Youth Science Forum experience, and many of us heard Catherine Bampton 2 weeks ago extolling the benefits gained by her in her personal and vocational development through her recent attendance at the Science forum.

Two other major projects receiving Club funding and support annually are:

- The Police Officer of the Year Award, which recognises a SAPOL police officer endorsed by his or her local community and SAPOL itself.
- Carols at the Rotunda, which is largely seen as this Club's gift to the local community, in co-operation with the UCC.

## **Induction of New Members**

Two new members were inducted into the club.



Soheila Mostaghim came to Australia as a refugee twenty years ago. She has her own business and is a volunteer at the Thrift Shop.

Lachlan Reid has had an involvement in Rotary in Rotaract with the Rotary Club of Mt Barker. He was the first president of their Rotary Community Corps, and he is currently kept busy in Retail Sales and by study.

## Paul Harris Fellow Awards

Rotarian Bob Laws was singled out for a Sapphire Pin to accompany his Paul Harris Fellowship for his efforts in keeping the Thrift Shop on track over a very long period. (Glenyss received an honorable mention – but no cigar).

Continuing the Thrift Shop theme, long term volunteer extraordinaire, Sandy Dobson was recognised for her many years of highly valued contribution to the success of the venture. Her input has helped many underprivileged people throughout the world.

Steve Finos has also helped the shop by being next door to it and offering support as required. Steve is also a leader of the Unley Road Association with which our club has a burgeoning relationship. He was described by President Stephen as being a 'useful individual' – high praise indeed!
