

Guest Speaker – Peter Hammond: Rotary Australia World Community Service (aka RAWCS)

Valerie Bonython introduced Peter Hammond, a Rotarian from Somerton Park. Peter is known to those of us who worked on the Conference in Ballarat where he was a member of the organising committee. He's been in Rotary since 2005 and held a variety of roles in his own club (including President) and in District, including a current role as Secretary of RAWCS.

Rotary Australia World Community Service Ltd. (RAWCS) was formed 50 years ago to support Australian Rotarians and Rotary Clubs in assisting disadvantaged communities and individuals with humanitarian aid projects. The objectives include managing the Rotary Australia Overseas Aid Fund, Rotary Australia Benevolent Society, and the Developed Country Disaster Fund.

The Unley Rotarian 10 May 2016 It also aims to enable Rotarians, the public and the corporate sector to deliver humanitarian aid and charitable support through a range of projects including Rotarians Against Malaria, Donations In Kind and Australian Charitable Support.

To facilitate Rotarians undertaking voluntary work, the Board has engaged professional support in the fields of information technology, communications and marketing and has established a staffed office to process the administrative, accounting and banking functions. It is extremely efficient, operating as it does with only one person full time and one part time.

RAWCS is not an emergency response organization, but rather looks to engage in sustainable, developmental or relief projects.

RAWCS is a company and each year the District Governors from around Australia appoint a National Board that then appoints 5 regional boards and one is the Central region that covers the two South Australian districts. Our own Jerry Casburn is the currently in the chair of the Central Region Board. Actually his seat isn't currently in it, because if seats could swan, his is currently doing so in foreign climes.

Each year RAWCS handles a large number of projects and around \$25 million. They coordinate with other Rotary projects including Donations in Kind with which we are familiar having packed containers full of mainly goodies that are then dispatched to needy folk abroad, and we love doing it (ish).

Our own Trevor McGuirk has a project through RAWCS, sponsored by our club that's aimed at providing medical services in rural Peru. This is a live example of a project that is facilitated by RAWCS that provides the infrastructure to collect donations from clubs and tax deductible donations from the general public, and would then be able to assist in coordinating volunteers and handling the insurance and travel details of them if required.

Rotary News

Report on the Rotary District 9520 Conference in Renmark 28 April - 1 May 2016

Rotary often delivers special moments of proud reflection and inspiration; Beverley and I spent four glorious days at the District Conference in Renmark. We parked ourselves on the Murray River with many other campers at the Big Four. The weather was outstanding, the scenery spectacular, the pelicans ravenous, the fishing abysmal (these two items may be related), the locals friendly and the conference very enjoyable. Jerry and Briony played host to a number of guests on a houseboat which rocked gently with passing river traffic, and less gently with speedboat races...and they are now in England to help the Brits decide whether to stay in the EU.

In terms of the key messages coming from the conference, it was not surprising that the number one item was membership. I was shocked to learn that the average age of Rotarians in the UK and Ireland is 74 and 76 respectively...an entrepreneur will no doubt seize the opportunity to establish "Rotadotage" villages. In developing countries the picture is much brighter. Clearly, bridging the age divide and finding new ways to work hand in glove with those who are also strongly motivated to achieve great good, but who are time poor, is a priority. Stuart Heal from NZ, the

representative of the Rotary International President, stressed the need to engage members in service projects which is what most seek to do when they join Rotary. Other key ingredients of successful transition include Fellowship, Diversity, Integrity and Leadership. Another luminary who runs Calperum stressed: be AWARE, be INFORMED, be ENGAGED. Positivity beats the hell out of doom and gloom and creates remarkable opportunities. Mark Huddleston spent some time explaining the need for greater flexibility and to not be consumed by the need to meet weekly in the same old fashion which has been in vogue for over a century.

There was a rich array of information provided including:

- A presentation by Valmai Hankel and former Chief Justice John Doyle on the challenges facing those with Parkinson's disease.
- Several contributions on the local region including wine making by the Angoves established in 1886, the importance
 of the River Murray in providing food for domestic and overseas consumption, and positive changes in river
 management across the States.
- Reflections of a Rotary Peace Scholar who was imprisoned and tortured as a student protestor in Myanmar, now returning home to assist in the peaceful transition of his country...my favorite segment on how good Rotary really is.
- Special insights on how nanotechnology will deliver far more effective vaccinations (including for polio), how corporate farming is more effective than family farms in feeding a hungry world, how carbon capture in soil is vital to our future and how water supplies across the developing world are seriously degraded (and cause for international conflict into the future).
- And a science and engineering challenge in the Riverland during June, finding a cure for cystic fibrosis, the New Generations Service Exchange...and much more.

RC Mitcham 'trumpeted in' their 2017 conference for Mt Gambier with the theme of Jazzing Up Rotary.....very neat!

The fabulous weather and the Saturday night dinner celebration (when even the more senior members were letting their hair down) at the Renmark Club made for a very happy occasion. Unley delivered a brilliant conference last year and this year we had fun and continued to learn.

For me, the key question remains...how do we effectively translate this inspiration and goodwill into a gang buster result for Unley....and for all the other clubs in our District. Any help would be appreciated.
