Guest Speaker – Jason Kuchel: What's Under the Ground?

Jason Kuchel is the Chief Executive of the South Australian Chamber of Mines and Energy. He holds graduate and post graduate degrees in engineering and is Director of Infrastructure and



Technical Services for the City of Prospect. He holds board level responsibilities on the Mining and Energy Advisory Council to the Minister for mineral Resources & Energy (MEAC) and the State Governments Mining Industry Participation Office and is also Chair of the International Associations Forum for the Prospectors and Developers Association of Canada and Chair of the Australian Resources Associations Forum. Jason speaks regularly on industry matters. Below is the jist of what Jason had to say written by Jason.

What's below the ground? An interests question and I'll come to that. Australia is now growing more rapidly than the US or Britain and at more than twice the pace of Canada, which is the closest comparison as a resource exporter. Unlike any other advanced economy, Australia is on track this year to achieve 25 years without a recession, (defined as two consecutive quarters of contraction). Australia has also captured a greater share of global exploration spend in 2015 which for non ferrous exploration reached 12%, only 2 percentage points behind Canada where that gap had been as much as 8% in recent history. The Frasier Institute's report last week placed Australia as the No.1 country for mining and

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exploration, above Canada for the first time (in my time in the industry at least) with Western Australia and South Australia book ending the top ten mining jurisdictions in the world.

Whilst anti mining activists have been having an impact globally and Australia is not immune, we have enjoyed stronger support from both sides of politics in general and the reduction in iron ore and coal prices have, for the wrong reasons, driven home the importance of mining to Australia's economy. However support from politicians, the media and the general public is a mixed bag as the general population ceases to see mining as critical for the success of our economy. The South Australian Nuclear Fuel Cycle Royal Commission could be a game changer for South Australia in particular, but also for the whole of Australia. There is a growing community support being brought about by simply having a mature debate. Surveys continue to show increasing support for all aspects of the fuel cycle including nearly half of all South Australians being in support of the most controversial aspect, that being the importing and storage of spent fuel from other markets.

Whilst the Royal Commission's interim findings suggest that Nuclear power may not be economic for South Australia in the short term, it does recommend removing the legislative impediment to enable nuclear power and uranium enrichment in the future. With the potential advent of a high level radioactive waste repository, Australia could chose to lease fuel, making it viable to enrich uranium in the medium term. Small modular reactors could also make many stranded deposits in remote parts of Australia viable and the eastern seaboard could potentially justify Nuclear Power. There is no doubt that Australia can do more for reducing global carbon emissions by enabling nuclear power, whether this be through more uranium mining or taking back the spent fuel, than if we turned off all power production in the country altogether.

On the exploration side, the Federal Government recently introduced a pilot program called the Exploration Development Incentive or EDI which has the potential to have a similar effect to the Canadian Flow Through Shares scheme. The desire of the current government to cap their costs has introduced an unnecessary complexity and, along with a couple of glitches in the legislation, has limited its value. Over the course of the coming year we are lobbying to have that fixed, which has great potential for Greenfields exploration. Most states are also implementing or looking at ways to make exploration more attractive with incentive schemes being increased and more money being spent on pre-competitive data collection.

In the case of South Australia, the Government has just built a world class core library and announced PACE 2020, a \$20m program to advance copper exploration. These investments tend to have a payback in the order of 30 times their initial investment. Taking a Prominent Hill for example, it quite possibly would not have been found without the existence of the old core library and the annual royalties received from Prominent a Hill almost paid for the Core Library in one go.

At a Federal level, our new Minister for Resources and Energy, the Hon. Josh Frydenburg, is keen to increase federal expenditure in the pre-competitive space also, and even in an election year budget he had managed to convince his Federal colleagues to invest an additional \$100m in pre competing data for Northern Australia, although we managed to convince him to include SA in that round of funding also. It is great to have yet another Federal Minister who is intent on championing our sector, which can only be to our benefit and the benefit of all Australians.

So what's under the ground, well that's exactly what the Core Library and additional funds for pre competitive data are all about. That is helping the junior exploration sector find what is under the ground. Having said that, we already know that South Australia was originally the largest supplier of copper to the world and we have plenty more. The Government's new Copper Strategy is about assisting industry to triple copper production to 1 million tones over the next decade and in doing so help drive Australia to become the world's third largest copper producer. We have finally got the Government interested in a magnetite strategy and they have now taken the first steps. South Australia has more billions of tones of magnetite and the new strategy will be aimed at securing \$10bn in committed investment over the next decade on the way to making SA the foremost producer of quality magnetite for steel making in the world.

Why a magnetite marketing plan will attract investment

Whether it be uranium, copper, magnetite, mineral sands (by the way, we have 40% of the world's zircon), gold ((there are three new mines opened or opening Portia, Challenger and Carin Hill), graphite or something else like gypsum or lime, South Australia has much going for it already and even more potential.

Rotaract Outstanding Project Award recognizes innovative programs

Though they were a long way from home, members of the Rotaract Club of Bugolobi, Uganda, felt confident they could tackle problems in rural Kanabulemu during their annual 1000 Smiles project.

Their original plan focused on curtailing the spread of HIV/AIDS. It's in the Rakai District, where the first case of AIDS in Uganda was uncovered in 1982 and about 12 percent of the population has been infected with HIV in recent years. But the Rotaractors discovered that problems in the village extended far beyond the disease.

"The community lacked water, the school was in a sorry state, and the medical center was in an even sorrier state, especially the maternity ward," says Anitah Munkudane, president of the Bugolobi club. "The condition was worse than we had imagined."

The Rotaractors still weren't prepared for what they found when they launched the project with the Uganda Health Marketing Group. They expected to treat 700 at the medical camp in Kanabulemu. More than 1,000 patients came.

Volunteers, including Rotaractors from other clubs and members of the club's sponsor, the Rotary Club of Bugolobi, provided comprehensive medical exams, dental screenings, medication, birth control, and more. And the troubled maternity ward? It got new mattresses to make childbirth more comfortable.

They presented benches and desks to the Keyebe Primary School and school supplies and uniforms to its pupils, many of whom are orphans. The team also helped install a borehole to bring much-needed water to the village.

For all of its exemplary work on the 1000 Smiles Kanabulemu Edition project, the Rotaract Club of Bugolobi was named the International Winner of the Rotaract Outstanding Project Award. Members will be honored at the Korea convention in June and will receive \$500 to apply to a future project. The club will use it to help women suffering from fistula, says Munkudane.

Regional Winners

Rotaract Outstanding Project Awards recognized other clubs for projects -- one in each of six regions and an international multidistrict project -- for their excellent humanitarian work.

International multidistrict project: Twelve Rotaract clubs from five districts in Turkey and Russia for the Just Like You With an (+1) Extra! project. Members collaborated with the Down Syndrome Association to organize training for children and adults with Down syndrome. Participants learned how to apply effective communication and cooperation strategies to improve their daily lives and hone job skills.

Asia Pacific: The Rotaract Club of Metro Cebu-CIT Chapter in the Philippines for Project WASHEd-UP, which transformed the lives of kids at Tagatay Elementary School in a remote area in the Philippines. Club members constructed a tank to safely store rainwater, taught the importance of hygiene and sanitation, and treated students who had skin infections and intestinal parasites.

South Asia: The Rotaract Club of The Caduceus in Maharashtra, India, for the Jana Swasthya Project. Members established a digital disease surveillance system to study epidemiological trends. Harnessing the power of mobile technology, they replaced a paper data-tracking system, allowing government officials and experts to access live data with a few clicks.

Europe, Middle East, Central Asia: The Rotaract Club of Istanbul-Dolmabahçe in Turkey for Still Child! Rotaractors organized conferences in rural areas, where local experts, psychologists, and doctors educated residents about how underage girls who are married are, statistically, undereducated and prone to medical and psychological problems.

Sub-Saharan Africa: The Rotaract Club of Lagune de Cotonou in Benin for Notre Bibliotheque. Rotaractors and Rotary members converted an abandoned building into a library for the nearly 400 children who attend Zogbadjè Primary Public School. Not only did Rotaractors design, fundraise, and implement construction plans, they stocked the new library with more than 500 books.

Latin America: The Rotaract Club of Nova Geração Itabaiana in Brazil for Projeto Sergipe. Rotaractors enrolled 100 students in literacy and professional development courses. The club developed a network of community partners and volunteers that donated meeting space for classes and lectures, developed training based on volunteers' professional expertise, and distributed educational materials and resources to students.

United States, Canada, and Caribbean: The Rotaract Club of Birmingham, Alabama, USA, for Ready 2 Succeed. The project t matches high school juniors and seniors with Rotaract mentors to better prepare students for college. Over 75 percent of the program's participants, many first-generation college students, have enrolled in college programs.
