Induction

DG Sam Camporeale performed the induction of Stephen Bone, who was introduced by Jerry Casburn. Stephen attended Oxford Brookes University and worked in the hospitality industry, including in Southern Africa from 1974 to 1993. Whilst in Botswana he joined Round Table, a charitable and social networking club, and was a member from 1985-1990. He returned to the U.K. in 1993, by sailing across the Atlantic from Cape Town to Guernsey in a 36 ft yacht, and worked there from 1994 – 2002...and joined the 41 Club (Round Table for retired members).

In 2003 he moved to Adelaide and was employed by TAFE at the Le Cordon Bleu faculty delivering a business degree to mainly international students. As a senior lecturer he became responsible for delivering marketing & finance to first and second year students. He retired in 2014.

He is a keen sailor.....twice to Qld and three times across Bass Strait in his 38 ft yacht, and competes locally twice a week. As well as being involved in volunteer work including with the *Talking with Aussies* program at Adelaide University, he does exam supervision at Flinders Uni.

Stephen's has been assigned to the International Committee, has a vocational Jerry, Stephen, Tatiana, Ken & Sam designation of Education Tertiary, and will be mentored by Jerry.....which is fraught with some risk as evidenced by the mislaid iconic Rotary badge.

Stephen was accompanied by Tatiana, who rightfully received flowers from the Prez.

Stephen was enthusiastically welcomed into the club.



DG Sam had 3 themes to his address:

- · Rotary stands for Service Above Self
- Rotary offers the opportunity for people to make a difference locally and internationally
- Fundraising is critical and the need for us to invest wisely is vital

He expressed discomfort that significant sums raised by Rotary clubs are being spent on projects which deliver quite low rates of return (by helping far less people) compared with existing Rotary programs. There are four outstanding Australian Rotary humanitarian endeavours, namely:



- Rotary Australia World Community Service [RAWCS]includes Rotarians Against Malaria (RAM), Donations
 in Kind (DIK), Rotary Volunteers and others
- Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children [ROMAC]
- Rotary Australia Benevolent Society [RABS]

Other notable programs include Operation Cleft, Days for Girls, Interplast and Disaster Aid Australia Successful youth programs include RYPEN, RYLA, and Youth Exchange.

The recent changes made by the Council on Legislation have significantly increased club flexibility...... 3 clubs in District 9520 are now meeting fortnightly with the aim of having more projects and less meetings.

2017 marks the centenary of The Rotary Foundation (one of the world's top rated charities initiated by Arch Klumph).

Over the past 100 years more than \$3b has been invested world-wide to improve lives, the most notable program of which is the eradication of polio. Other successful initiatives include scholarships for peace-makers, group study exchanges and major projects. Importantly money invested with TRF delivers back a club and district premium for projects such Unley's Peru project. On the anniversary of the Foundation's establishment, February 23, a modified version of the video presented by Sam at the meeting will be broadcast for a week across cinemas Australia wide to advertise Rotary. Clubs will be asked to distribute material at the theatres.

The polio battle is being won with 27 cases reported this year compared with 51 in the previous year but unfortunately there has been a recent outbreak in Nigeria. Rotary operates in partnership with WHO, UINICEF, Center for Disease Control and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

Sam urged everyone to attend the District Conference in Mount Gambier 27-30 April with a galaxy of star speakers. He was thanked by acclamation.

Rotary Foundation named World's Outstanding Foundation for 2016

The Association of Fundraising Professionals has recognized The Rotary Foundation with its annual Award for Outstanding Foundation.

The award honors organizations that show philanthropic commitment and leadership through financial support, innovation, encouragement of others, and involvement in public affairs. Some of the boldest names in American giving — Kellogg, Komen, and MacArthur, among others —are past honorees.

"We are honored to receive this recognition from the AFP, which gives us even more reason to celebrate during our Foundation's centennial



year," says Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair Kalyan Banerjee. "The continued strong support of Rotary members will help us keep our promise of a polio-free world for all children and enable the Foundation to carry out its mission of advancing world understanding, goodwill, and peace. We look forward to another 100 years of Rotary members taking action to make communities better around the world."

The announcement came on 15 November, known to industry professionals since the 1980s as National Philanthropy Day. The award will be presented in early 2017 at the AFP's annual conference in San Francisco.

Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair-elect Paul Netzel is set to accept the award on Rotary's behalf, and Eric Schmelling, director of fund development at Rotary, will speak at the conference. The event is expected to draw more than 3,400 senior-level fundraising professionals from 33 countries.

"While almost everyone is familiar with Rotary, not everyone may realize just how much of an impact Rotary and The Rotary Foundation have had on countless people and communities across the globe," says Jason Lee, AFP president and CEO. "On behalf of the entire charitable sector and people around the world, all of us at AFP are honored to be able to recognize The Rotary Foundation as our 2016 Outstanding Foundation."

AFP's committee of judges cited Rotary's comprehensive campaign to eradicate polio as a major driver of the selection. They also mentioned that Rotary applies a methodical, purposeful approach to support a wide variety of causes, from providing clean water to educating the next generation of peace professionals.


