President Ken's Announcements

- Ken welcomed visiting Rotarians from RC St Peters and guests

Guest Speaker: Tim James - Harvesting of Food

Chairman Stephen Baker introduced Tim who, with Hayley Everuss, is joint State Manager of Oz Harvest. Tim has a background in mechanical engineering (a junior Red Adair), business management, consulting and mentoring young entrepreneurs. He has a passion for charitable enterprise and previously coordinated OzHarvest's Adelaide nutritional education and simple cooking on the NEST program. He has developed funding programs for OzHarvest. Tim has experience across a wide range of industries, has travelled widely, is married and has two nearly grown-up children.

Tim explained that OzHarvest is all about Nourishing our country in 4 ways:

Rescue – rescue wholesome food from supermarkets, restaurants and other food outlets Educate – which has a number of parts including the NEST wholesome food program

from simple ingredients, Nourish those who are doing it tough, Train some of these in hospitality and work experience, Reduce food waste

Engage – gather together a volunteer work force. In SA there are 250 volunteers and 15 staff, mostly casual

Innovate - Generate and implement big new ideas.

In 2004 OzHarvest was initiated in Sydney by event organiser Ronni Khan who was appalled by the wastage of palatable food. Ronni squeezed a refrigerated vehicle out of Macquarrie Bank and started to collect perishables from various food



outlets and deliver the food to charities involved in feeding programs. There are now 37 refrigerated vehicles in use across the mainland States. In Adelaide the 4 vehicles collect 50 tons per month and delver to 125 charities (including the Salvos here in Unley). He mentioned the way in which involvement in OzHarvest can lead to help being delivered in other areas such as education. Nothing is collected if past its use-by date. Laws have been amended to protect food donors from unwarranted litigation.

Food wastage across the nation is estimated at well over \$1000 per household per annum. Waste disposal currently costs \$150 per ton, and food waste emits noxious methane from landfill. All good reasons to make better use of food!

Funding comes from a variety of sources including foundations and trusts, merchandise sale, organisation link-up (eg Woolworths' recent program raised \$700k), Caltex fuel sponsorship, the Clipsal Chef's cook-off, V8 drivers etc. A number of these event involve volunteers and prove useful in attracting new helpers.



Foodbank, which our club visited, is more into preparing food and food parcels from gathered stock, whereas OzHarvest 'grabs and delivers'. Each provide a very helpful service to those most in need. Tim urged greater use of green bins for food scraps.

Tim was thanked by acclamation....and presented with the Rotary stick.

2017-18 RI President Ian H.S. Riseley announces his presidential theme, *Rotary: Making a Difference*

Rotary International President-elect Ian H.S. Riseley made the case in San Diego that protecting the environment and curbing climate change are essential to Rotary's goal of sustainable service.

Riseley, a member of the Rotary Club of Sandringham, Victoria, Australia, unveiled the 2017-18 presidential theme, *Rotary: Making a Difference*, to incoming district governors at Rotary's International Assembly in San Diego, California, USA.

Environmental degradation and global climate change are serious threats to everyone, Riseley said. "They are having a disproportionate impact on those who are most vulnerable, those to whom Rotary has the greatest responsibility. Yet environmental issues rarely register on the Rotary agenda," he said.

Environmental degradation is one of the major threats listed by the UN's High-level Panel on Threats, Challenges, and Change. Riseley added, "The time is long past when environmental sustainability can be dismissed as not Rotary's concern. It is, and must be, everyone's concern."

The president-elect challenged every Rotary club to make a difference by planting a tree for each of its members between the start of the Rotary year on 1 July and Earth Day on 22 April 2018. Trees remove carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases from the air, which slows global warming. "It is my hope that the result of that effort will be far greater than the environmental benefit that those 1.2 million new trees will bring," Riseley said. "I believe the greater result will be a Rotary that recognizes our responsibility not only to the people on our planet, but to the planet itself."

Securing Rotary's future

In his address to the 2017-18 class of district governors, Riseley also urged clubs to improve their gender balance and lower the average age of their members. Only 22 percent of Rotary's members are women, up from 13 percent 10 years ago. At that rate, Riseley said, it will take another three decades for Rotary to achieve gender parity. "Three decades is far too long to wait to achieve a Rotary that reflects the world in which we live. We need to make it a priority now," he said. Noting that 103 of the 539 incoming governors are women, Riseley said they are the type of women we need in Rotary, "leaders who will help Rotary connect with, and represent, and better serve, all of the members of all our communities."

Riseley also believes it is imperative that clubs find ways to attract and engage younger members. Today only 5 percent of reported members are under 40, and a majority of members are over 60, Riseley told the audience. "Consider what Rotary stands to look like 10 or 20 years from now if we don't get very serious, very soon, about bringing in younger members," Riseley said. Clubs will make a difference this year through their own decisions, said Riseley, but it will take teamwork on a global scale to move Rotary forward and secure its future.

"We know that we can do more together than we could ever hope to do alone," he told incoming governors. "I ask you to keep that spirit of teamwork and cooperation always in your minds and to take it back with you to your districts."
