Guest Speaker: Rtn Bryan Harris RAWCS - World Water Day

Chairman David Middleton expressed it as an 'unmitigated pleasure' to introduce Bryan who has been a Rotarian for 20 years, initially with Eastwood and now with Adelaide. Bryan has 40 years of experience in water and waste water management. He has been managing the Save Water, Save Lives component of RAWCS [Rotary Australia Wide Community Service] here in SA for 5 years. Tomorrow is World Water Day. Bryan is chair of the **Water and Sanitation Rotary Action Group (WASRAG)** which aims to supply potable water to communities in developing countries, by planning sustainable systems of water catchment, storage and reticulation.

Clean water is critical to sustaining life. 80% of the world's population lives in dry areas. 780million people do not have ready access to potable water and inadequate sanitation is a widespread problem. It is estimated that over 800,000 children below the age of 5 die each year from diarrhoea which is the major water borne disease. But there are a number of other dirty water related diseases which cause severe pain and death.

For its part WASRAG is dedicated to targeting areas where water borne disease is a severe problem. There is a program to provide clean water to every school in Lebanon and a partnership with USAID to similarly assist the Dominican Republic, Ghana and the Philippines. A UNESCO water and sanitation scholarship program is also being supported.

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Rotary clubs in South Australia are providing 5 overseas water projects including water tanks in Fiji, a clean water catchment in Ethiopia and micro-filtration in PNG. Across Australia there are 42 water projects operating under the WASH banner in 18 countries. In the latest *Rotary Down Under* there is a summary of an Indian village water program being supported by New Zealand Rotary District 9940 in collaboration with NSW Rotary. This is an integrated effort which in addition to WASH also includes immunisation, education, micro-financing and sanitation.

RAWCS makes life simple for delivering effective overseas aid because it provides professional project development and management expertise. It's annual budget is \$30m, soon to be \$50m and only incurs admin costs of 3%. It offers tax deductibility for donations, accountability for expenditures and good coordination. More clubs need to give it a go! Bryan was thanked by acclamation.

Rotary members meet with EU officials to examine Rotary's role in achieving peace By Bryant Brownlee

More than 240 Rotary members and other guests gathered in Brussels, Belgium, on 8 March for Rotary at the European Union, a special event that explored how Rotary and the European Union can work together to achieve peace.

The meeting was the first of its kind at the European Union (EU) and was modeled on the tradition of Rotary Day at the United Nations. Rotary members, EU officials, and business leaders at the two-hour event asked how business and civil society organizations like Rotary can work with the EU to achieve the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and build more peaceful and stable societies.



Françoise Tulkens, a professor and former vice president of the European Court of Human Rights, moderated the meeting, which included presentations from Karmenu Vella, European commissioner for environment, maritime affairs, and fisheries; Jean de leu de Cecil, general secretary of the board of Colruyt Group; Rene Branders, president of the Belgian Federation of Chambers of Commerce; and John Hewko, Rotary general secretary.

Vella emphasized the importance of working with business and civil society to achieve the development goals. He also recognized the important role Rotary can play in this global effort.

"You have a massive asset, your vast network, and you can use it to bring community stakeholders together in order to turn the SDGs into reality. Rotary International is uniquely placed to create transformational alliances between business and civil society, pushing forward the implementation of our common agenda," said Vella.

Hewko highlighted Rotary's efforts to address the ongoing migration crisis and foster inclusive economic development. "At Rotary, we believe that we can only respond by forming smart partnerships in which the EU, governments, civil society, the private sector, and other organizations all play an important role. This is why the growing relationship between Rotary and the European Union is a cause for optimism," said Hewko.

Because the EU supports the global polio eradication effort, organizers of Rotary at the European Union are confident that there are other opportunities for collaboration between the organizations.

The event was coordinated with the European Commission and organized by Michel Coomans and Hugo-Maria Schally, RI representatives to the EU, with the support of Kathleen Van Rysseghem, Philippe Vanstalle, and Nathalie Huyghebaert, the governors of the Rotary districts in Belgium and Luxembourg.
