Guest Speakers

Stephen Bone: New Member's Story

Stephen started his story (as we all should) with a quote form Mark Twain along the lines that disappointment for what you have not done should be more keenly felt than that which you have done....presumably the bad bits. SB was created some 65 years ago in England, had one brother and attended Oxford Brooks Hospitality School, graduating in 1974. Now the picture became a tad confused about timing of particular events through a series of flashbacks...just like in a movie...so accuracy is not guaranteed. Off he went after graduation to the Norfolk Hotel and thence to Holiday Inn in Botswana where he spent 16 years. It is a stunning well governed country and he loved his time there, forming a close relationship with the President's family. He was married in 1977. In 1990, he became a hospitality consultant, travelling to many parts of the globe. 1994 – 1996 he ran a hotel on Guernsey Island. The next recorded event of any note (beside a second marriage) was coming to Adelaide where he joined the Regency School of Catering in 2003, and thence



Le Cordon Bleu in 2004. 2014 he hung up his shingle and retired to Magnetic Island......but then came back to Adelaide where he is now in a happy relationship with Tatiana and 3 cats.

For much of his adult life, Stephen has pursued his passion for the sea. In total, he has sailed an estimated 40,000 nautical miles. Memorable trips include an Atlantic crossing in a 36ft yacht, sailing back to England from Africa, the Mediterranean, around the east coast of Australia.....and many more. If time had permitted it would have been great to quiz Stephen on his most terrifying moments at sea. (The editor has been known to launch a boat without the plugs in place). In relation to Rotary, his service connection came from membership of The Round Table in 1985, and later the 41 Club. Using poetic licence with the words of Mark Twain, 'not a helluva lot to be disappointed about!'

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Trevor McGuirk

Trevor was born sometime last century in Berri. Living conditions were rudimentary.....no electricity, or running water and a drop toilet out the back. He did well at school where year 7 primary school had 52 in its class (*Ed Note....65 in first year Unley High School*) and was appointed head prefect at Glossop High School. His father died when he was 16 and this had a dramatic impact on the family with Trevor having to take a large responsibility for raising his younger twin sisters. In 1963, he attended Teachers College where he qualified in a two-year course for B2 (Rural primary school) teaching. His first posting was to a one-person school with 17 children at the famous Nunjikompita school, followed by an upgrade to a two-person school at Monarto Junction with 31 well behaved kids. Marriage and postings to Gawler River, Thornden Park, Sterling East and Heathfield primary schools followed, with the latter two in leadership positions. His next posting was to Clare as education officer and then back to Adelaide to manage



the amalgamation of Seacliff primary schools. This appointment did not work well and Trevor resigned at the age of 53 in disgust at the lack of support by the Education Department, after 31 years in the profession.

To prevent starvation, Trevor took up a grain management (counting each grain) position with SA Bulk Handling for 18 months, followed by a successful four-year stint as a fundraiser for Scouts SA. He was then appointed Director of Development at Unity College until retiring in 2003. There was much travel through Europe during the 1980s and more recently Peru has been visited five times to implement the village support program. An article about this project recently appeared in Rotary Down Under.... Trevor looks more than pleased. Mark Twain would undoubtedly have also given Trevor a big tick.

Skydivers raise thousands for polio eradication

The first time Noel Jackson jumped out of a plane, it had nothing to do with raising money for polio eradication. The Michigan dentist had received a gift certificate from members of his staff to go skydiving because they knew he was into adventure.

"It is definitely a defining moment," says Jackson, a member of the Rotary Club of Trenton, Mich., of that first jump at 14,000 feet, done in tandem strapped to a professional skydiver. "The rush of the free fall is beyond anything I have ever experienced before. Just the speed and acceleration is unbelievable. You don't even have time to figure out if you are enjoying it or not; it's just a sensation that happens."

Jackson did enjoy the sensation, so much so that he agreed to do another jump, with Shiva Koushik, a Rotarian friend in nearby Windsor, Ontario. "We were in one of those friendship rooms after the conference ... when Koushik began talking about the skydive," Caron says. "We all got really excited and signed up. "I don't like to back out on things I say I'm going to do, even if it's the middle of the night," Caron says. So she began raising money and drove down to Michigan to do the jump.

She also took the idea back to her own club, whose members are mostly young professionals looking for fun things to Rotary Club of Unley Inc.

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do. This past July, 10 members from Toronto Skyline and surrounding Rotary clubs plunged earthward in their own tandem skydive, raising several thousand dollars for polio eradication.

Caron hopes to make it a yearly event. "Polio eradication is definitely something I am passionate about," she says. "It's not a hard fundraiser to put together at all. You just call around and pick a place, and then you begin asking people if they would rather jump or pay up in pledges." Jackson, who'd jumped out of the plane in his "Captain Rotary" outfit, says he personally raised \$4,700 for the Michigan skydive using Caron's approach. I would go up to people and tell them we were skydiving for polio and give them two options," says Jackson. "I would tell them I was paying \$180 out of my own pocket to jump, so if you are not going to jump, you have to pay \$180. Most people would say, 'OK, you got it."

Floating like a bird

Koushik and his wife are active in other ways to rid the world of polio. They have been on several trips with their Rotary district to immunize children in Afghanistan, Pakistan, and India, and particularly enjoy showing off their native country, India, from which they emigrated to Canada about 30 years ago. They are planning to take part in another National Immunization Day in Pakistan next year.

Still, the skydive will hold a special place in Koushik's heart. "This is one of the highlights of my polio eradication efforts," he says. "It's such a feeling of freedom. The first time out of the plane, you have very little idea what is happening; you are free-falling so fast. But once that parachute opens, you look around and say, 'Wow!' It's such a great feeling to be able to float like a bird."
