

Meet:

Darrell Wise, District Treasurer

Darrell is a proud Taswegian of convict stock, who, after completing his high school education, joined NAB as a Junior Clerk in 1971. As was the case in those days, Darrell was "told" by his employer that he was to move to Melbourne, so at the age of 17 left home to work and live in Moonee Ponds in Victoria. Darrell recalls that in the '70's, Moonee Ponds was very different to the multi-cultural and popular location it is today!

After returning to Tasmania to live and work in the mid 1970s to provide support during a period of family tragedy, Darrell's life was

forever changed (for the better) when he met and fell head over heels in love with Margaret (Gibson) whom he married in 1980.

Then it was time to move on again (according to his employer) so Darrell & Margaret packed their possessions and moved to Victoria, where after a short period, purchased their first home in Frankston. Darrell was a Manager's Clerk at that time working at NAB in Mornington and his Manager was the infamous Australian Rotary Health Founder **Ian Scott**. Darrell has vivid memories of toiling away at the office whilst Ian Scott spent majority of his time "doing things Rotary". Little did he appreciate at the time just what an impact Ian Scott's passion for (initially) discovering a cure to cot death that was the first project undertaken by Australian Rotary Health all those years ago!

It was whilst living in Frankston that their two children **Chris** and **Katherine** were born - all grown up now as per the photo!

Having grown tired of the Melbourne rat race and seemingly playing the role of a weekend husband and father due to extent of work and commuting, and wishing to be nearer the children's grandparents, Darrell moved his family back to Tasmania in 1988 where he settled his family into Blackmans Bay, a southern suburb of Hobart. During this time Darrell completed his Tertiary Education A work opportunity with NAB again presented itself in the early '90's for a move to Bendigo Victoria, where he and his family resided for nearly 4 years. It was in Bendigo that Darrell first joined Rotary, primarily for the networking opportunities it promised. Darrell soon learned that whilst business networking benefits were important, it was the "service above self" element of Rotary that quickly captured Darrell's passion and remains so to this day.

Darrell and his family moved to Adelaide in late1996 and have lived in Flagstaff Hill since then. Darrell remains with NAB where his current role is Credit Risk Manager working from King William Street Head Office. Margaret works with Flinders Medical Centre as an Administration Officer in the Intensive Care Unit. Son Chris is a Manager with Scouts Australia and daughter Katherine works as a Personal Care worker in a Nursing Home.

Indigenous Health Scholarships

A Report from PP John Sandham

The scholarship provides "top up" financial assistance to the value of \$5000pa (\$2500 from Rotary/other and \$2500 from SA Government). It is designed to encourage and assist Indigenous Students with their education and living expenses while they successfully achieve medical qualifications to become doctors, nurses, or any other health related profession.

Payment of the scholarship monies is made to the student once they successfully pass their subjects at the end of the semester.

Indigenous Australians experience lower levels of access to health services than the general population, are more likely than non-Indigenous people to be hospitalized for most diseases and conditions, to experience disability and reduced quality of life due to ill health, and to die at younger ages, than other Australians. Indigenous Australians also suffer a higher burden of emotional distress and possible mental illness than that experienced by the wider community.

Rural townships and Aboriginal communities have great difficulty in attracting and retaining doctors. Aboriginals have a better understanding of, and better empathy with, their own people. Since the program's inception 57 students have graduated in SA alone.

In 2013 there are 15 sponsored students continuing their studies with a further 7 new students being offered scholarships. Clubs are encouraged to treat a student very much the same as they would an exchange student – but without the hosting – to maintain contact through a mentor and to invite their student to the occasional Club function whenever their studies permit.

Rotary ball a 'win-win':

Clubs' inaugural event set to raise funds for autism support group

FAMILIES of children with autism are set to benefit from Sunraysia's first combined Rotary Club ball.

Seven Rotary clubs have combined for the inaugural event, to raise money for Sunraysia Autism Spectrum Support Group.

Mildura Rotary Club president and ball committee chairman Vince Marciano said the event was a "win-win" for both groups, allowing Rotary clubs to combine while helping families in need. "I thought it would be a good idea to get all the Rotary clubs together – it was too big for just our club," he said.

"I approached the other clubs and all the presidents were all for it and they've all been really supportive." Belinda Rogers, from SASSG, said, "Funds raised at the ball would go towards a "wish list" for local families."

"Things like communication devices like iPads – by using apps they learn so well because they're so interactive," she said. "These would be given to families for them to use exclusively."

Funds would also be used to help pay for medical and travel costs. "Wait times on families are really hard," Mrs Rogers said.

"Even to get diagnosis can take some time so we want it to go towards families in need to get this diagnosis done. "To have a diagnosis, you need a psychologist's report, speech pathology report and occupational therapy and then signed off by a paediatrician and those reports are very expensive."

Mrs Rogers said the money could also be used to transport families to specialist appointments outside of Sunraysia and go towards supporting siblings of children with autism.

"We're so happy to be the recipients of the first ball," she

Ball committee treasurer Fiona Weir, from Mildura Rotary Club, said SASSG was chosen as the event's first recipient through a tender process.

"One of the big things (to consider) was how much government funding they get because a lot of groups do get a lot of government support," she said. "And we also looked at the ability of the group to come on board and help."

Mrs Weir said putting SASSG in the spotlight would also help to break down the stigma surrounding autism and the behaviours associated with it. "We felt there wasn't a lot of awareness about autism," she said.

Mr Marciano said he hoped the ball would become an annual event for the seven Rotary Clubs – Mildura, Mildura Deakin, South Mildura, Irymple, Red Cliffs, Wentworth and Euston-Robinvale – helping a different charity each year

Mr Marciano said he was unsure how much would be raised, being the first event of its kind, but called for donations of items and financial support to help with the auctions and raffles.

A Team with Vision Having a Ball!

Prior to Vince Marciano commencing his Presidential term with the Rotary Club of Mildura, he already knew that he wanted to host a Gala Ball during his term. With further thought, he thought this could be an amazing fundraiser event.

After talking with a few members, it soon became apparent to Vince that this would logistically require a lot of support, and was too big for one Rotary Club to handle. So the idea of the eight Rotary Clubs of Sunraysia - District 9520, working on a joint project was born. A multi Rotary Club event had not taken place in Sunraysia for many, many years.

A committee was formed representing most of the Clubs in the area, and the process of selecting a recipient charity began. It was a unanimous decision that it was to be a local Charity and one that did not have a high profile within the community. That was to be one of the missions, not only raise money, but raise the profile of the Charity within the Sunraysia community.

A short list of six local charities was established by the committee, and these charities were approached to tender as the recipient of the inaugural Sunraysia Rotary Charity Ball. The committee felt the most important selection criteria were:

- 1. A Charity that wasn't well known and didn't receive a great deal of exposure in the community.
- 2. A Charity that didn't receive significant government funding.
- 3. A Charity that could ensure their members could come on board with the organising committee, and work to pull off a successful Gala Ball.

So unanimously, the Sunraysia Autism Spectrum Support Group was chosen. This group is a relatively new support group in our community, affected by Autism.



The countdown to March 16, 2013 began some 7 months prior. This committee pulled together, confident in being able to present a Gala Ball that Rotary and the community in general would be proud of. The committee was overwhelmed by the generosity of local businesses and individuals that were more than happy to come on board with financial donations or auction items.

So Saturday March 16 saw some 300 people gather at the Club da Vinci Mildura, for a memorable evening. We were thrilled and privileged to have District 9520 Governor Roy Armstrong, Secretary Jerry Casburn and District 9520 President Elect Wendy Gaborit and their respective partners travel from Adelaide to attend this event. As well as our own Assistant DG Lesley Mitchell and husband

Each and every committee member expressed how much they enjoyed working and getting to know other Rotary members from outside their own Club, as well as the members from the Autism support group.

What a night it turned out to be with over \$28,000 raised for the Sunraysia Autism Spectrum Support Group. Disappointingly, the Ball wasn't well patronised by our local Rotary members. Of an audience of 300, approximately 30 were local Rotarians (apart from the 11 in the organising committee). What we do take away from this is: we feel there was some scepticism by members that Rotary Clubs cannot work successfully together, hence the poor support that was received from members in our area. On the other hand, we received generous financial contributions from members that could not attend on the night.

The local media exposure that the Ball received leading up to, as well as after the event has been amazing, It has highlighted Rotary in general, as well as the incredible work that Rotary does. This can only be such a positive spin to encourage Rotary Clubs to embark on joint projects such as this one.

We now feel confident, that our Committee has proven that Rotary Clubs can work together successfully for a common cause. We are confident, that this success will motivate more members from all eight Clubs to participate and support the next Sunraysia Rotary Charity Ball which I am sure will be bigger and even more successful.

One last aspect our Committee highlighted was the great work women do in Rotary. It was "almost" an exclusively female Committee!!
