


## Jerry's Jottings

We will take these ideas on board and without putting words into Dick's mouth I believe he will repeat an away from the city meeting next year.

I want to thank Lesley Mitchell for her key role in organising a very successful weekend, the venues and the speaker.

Well as I have said a number of times recently, Briony and I are on the downhill slope and the end of our Rotary Year is rapidly approaching. Dick and Liz are preparing for their year and we have had two very successful events PETS and Assembly. PETS in Renmark worked very well and again a great opportunity for the Presidents Elect to create a strong bond as they go into their year ahead. The Assembly just last weekend was also great with more than 200 attending the various training streams. The Unity College was full of energy and commitment for a successful year. Well done Dick and the training team under Damian Leach's leadership.

Following our attendance at PETS we moved on to Broken Hill for a once in a lifetime event. District 9630, which covers the southern part of Queensland, were chartering a club in Broken Hill. This was obviously not a Queensland club but an e-club made up of Nomads and named accordingly. These are travellers who tour our country, who meet weekly as an e-club and intend to become involved in activities with rotary clubs wherever they visit. They are not travelling together, hence the e-club structure but will meet periodically. The club was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Jindalee and was an immediate success with some 29 new members. We were invited to join them as they were in our District. The chartering was attended by Phillip Charles, their DG. This may be a first, a club chartered outside of its District and with two current DGs present. As a piece of trivia which sadly shows the working of my mind, if you take our District 9520 from theirs 9630, you get 110 the number of years Rotary has been around.

## One Hundred Years of Rotary Service.

It is rare for one club to recognise two members who between them have given 100 years of service to Rotary. However the Rotary Club of Glenelg had that unique distinction when it acknowledged David Binks (PHF.OAM) and John Callary (PHF) on the occasion of then both achieving this milestone.

David was inducted into the Rotary Club of Glenelg on March 3rd 1965 while John was initially inducted into the Rotary Club of Port Pirie in March 1965 and later transferred to the Rotary Club of Glenelg in August 1980.

Both Rotarians have been Presidents of their initial Rotary Club while David has been fortunate to hold the President's position on three occasions. They have held numerous club positions over the years.

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While in the Port Pirie club John was asked to undertake the major task of determining the boundary for the newly created Districts of 9520 and 9500 a task he completed successfully.

At his recognition dinner on the 25th April John spoke of the enjoyment he

experienced and friendships he had made during his 50 years in Rotary. He made special mention of the outstanding and continuous support from his wife Yvonne, his family as well as the members of both clubs.

David's celebration on the 19th March at the Glenelg Golf Club saw over one hundred Rotarians, friends and family come to celebrate his achievement. DG Gerry Casburn spoke about David's time in Rotary.

Early in his business life David was approached by several prominent local businessmen who invited him to join the Rotary Club of Glenelg and while he had initial reservations as to whether he would have the time to commit to Rotary as he was spending many hours building his business, following some sound advise from his father David accepted the invitation and was inducted into the club and the rest as they say is history.

Over the past 50 years David not only found the time to attend the weekly meetings he took an active part in club events such as the annual Art Show, Breakfast on the Pat and club projects that included the building of the Community Centre in Mosley Street Glenelg and the Glenelg Meals on Wheels facility at Glenelg North.

David became a strong supporter of youth project and in particular International Youth Exchange. As David said this became his "Rotary Moment". Over the years David has been a counsellor for both incoming and outgoing Exchange students and Pam and David have hosted 18 incoming students from around the globe. He furthered his commitment to youth by becoming a member and later chair of the District Youth Exchange Committee.

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Later he was appointed District Youth Services
Coordinator. In 2006 he formed and chaired the Youth
Protection Committee. In these capacities David excelled.
Over the years he produced a number of manuals of
procedure and policies pertaining to Youth Exchange and
other youth programs for District 9520. In 2005 he was
asked to write a Youth Protection Manual for all Australian
Districts. This has been recognised as significant by
Rotary International and adopted by many Rotary Districts
worldwide, Gerry presented David with a certificate of
appreciation from RI President Gary C Huang and John will
similarly receive his certificate in May.

David thanked all his Rotary and sailing friends for sharing the night and for their support over the years and he gave special recognition to his wife Pam and his family for their support without which he would not have been successful in his boat building business or achieved the enjoyment and rewards from his time in Rotary. David expressed his hoped that all current and future Rotarians would be able to experience their "Rotary Moment" and gain their own significant enjoyment and rewards from taking an active part in the worldwide Rotary movement.

Throughout the night attendees were asked to make a donation to support the District appeal for the people of Vanuatu so adversely impacted by Cyclone Pam and at the end of the evening Rotarian Jessie Vun from the Rotary Club of Glenelg presented DG Gerry with \$1006.75.

# Your Club Recruitment Campaign Three Factors to Consider

How are your club recruitment initiatives going? Do you have a plan you're working to, or is it a bit haphazard? If we were to undertake a study of everyone who joined our ranks over the past 5 years and identify and document the events that led to their decision to join, I wonder what proportion would be random events or chance meetings, and what proportion would be as a result of a dedicated recruitment campaign?

Without hard evidence either way, my guess is that our recruitment successes are largely random – i.e., we get lucky. It's reasonable that the majority of people join a Rotary club because they've been invited by a friend or colleague, we Rotarians are constantly badgered to ask our friends to join. But what about those community minded citizens who DON'T already know someone in Rotary? What are we doing to gain their attention?

I'd like you to consider three factors when it comes to recruitment initiatives: Intent, Audience & Product.

### INTENT

How committed are you to recruiting new members? Is your ENTIRE club driven and enthusiastic about promoting your work and speaking to potential members? Or, as is the case in many clubs, are there one or two well-connected and dedicated recruiters on a mission, and the rest of the club thinking that recruitment is someone else's problem? Have you set aside a budget for promotion and recruitment? Do you even want new members? I know there are plenty out there who are very satisfied with the status quo.





### **AUDIENCE**

Who are you trying to reach? Where are they? Are you looking for specific sectors or (dare I say it) "classifications"? Do you want to attract younger members? More women? More who were born outside of Australia? Do you have a specific geographic region you're targeting? The private sector, the public sector, the local shopping centre, the local industrial park? Or are you happy with anyone you can get? Are you going to where they are, or are you expecting they will come to you? You can't answer questions that haven't been asked. Put some thought into your target audience.

### **PRODUCT**

What is it that you're trying to sell? This is the most important part of the formula to get right, but the most ignored part of the formula in Rotary. We can no longer assume that the style of Rotary we have become accustomed to, is the style that will attract new members today. Twenty years ago you could have made a living selling 35mm film and floppy disks. If you went into business today with the same products, your customer base will be very limited. Likewise, the style of Rotary we were selling twenty years ago may not be as well received today. Are you working on innovative and sustainable projects that address a community need? Are your meetings run the same way they were twenty years ago? Are they interesting and professionally run? Is your venue welcoming with good food at a good price? These all form part of the Rotary product that potential members will evaluate. Would YOU join your club today if you knew nothing about Rotary?

In the words of Winston Churchill, "He who fails to plan is planning to fail".

## What is the National Youth Science Forum?

"NYSF is unique in Australia." Exclaims the webmaster on the website http://www.nysf.edu.au/

The headline says: "Students during year 11 are selected to attend the NYSF the following year. They learn how to make informed decisions about courses and careers in the sciences and gain a professional skill set to help them realise their potential."

In its annual report I found an apt description of NYSF activities:

"After more than thirty years of operation, the National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) is a national organisation that offers a suite of programs, all of which are designed to develop and support the engagement of Year 12 students on to prospective vocation, study and employment opportunities within science, engineering and technology. "

"NYSF's mission is to provide an environment for community minded, academically well-rounded incoming Year 12 students, who have an interest in science, engineering and technology, to make informed decisions about future study and career options within a collaborative professional and social environment with like-minded peers."



"The NYSF has been delivering quality programs now for 30 years and has over 10,000 alumni around the country (and increasingly around the world). By my estimates, if we all stood in a line, including Rotary partners, and staff and all the other helpers who have been involved in the program the line would stretch over 12 kilometres."

This website provides a good overview of the programme. It is well worth the visit.

### This is a Personal Story

Enough about generalities. This is a personal story when I was in Canberra in January where I attended the Rotary Meeting with 200 NYSF students, local Rotarians and dignitaries, over 300 for dinner at the Ainslee Football Club, Canberra. WOW, was there a dynamic atmosphere with all those bright sparks in one room!



The keynote speaker at this dinner was Dr Renee Kidson, (a RYLA alumni 1992), who inspired students with her message of continual re-invention and up-skilling to manage the transition though an exciting career of research, travel, teaching and policy development. She is currently Director of Statistics at the Bureau of Infrastructure, Transport & Regional **Economics for the Commonwealth** Government.

She was inundated by students wanting to find out more afterwards.



I was fortunate to meet up with seven of the 9 students from D9520 in this session C. (10 students were in session A)



The program has distinguished speakers. One of them, Professor Tanya Monro, from University of Adelaide School of Physics & Chemistry, opened one session. She is an alumna of the NYSF, and reflected on her own time at the program, and how it impacted on her decisions for future study options. I mention her because she is also the current Chair of the NYSF Council. We, in SA, are hopeful of a third session being held in Adelaide in the future.

During their stay in Canberra students live at Burgmann College, at the ANU (Australian National University) in Canberra. This year there were two sessions each of two weeks duration. Because I was incoming Chair of the NYSF committee for D9520, AND I was in Canberra doing Gran duties I was able to see for the first time a bit of what NYSF is about. And I am even more excited about what this great program can do for our country. There is not much space here to describe the program. NYSF has a permanent office at ANU. I had a most productive meeting there with Director Damian Pearce, who was able to answer the questions from a District prospective, and I met the staff who run the program.







Students are divided into groups according to their Science interest.

Students participate in laboratory experiences in the fields of their interest: Physics, Chemistry, Engineering, Biology, Health Sciences.

Students who are observed as good leaders are invited back to NYSF as 'Staffies', who then run the next NYSF program. (just like RYLA). The Staffies have all been in the same situations as the current students. With their experience they can offer a wealth of information on getting through year 12, and how to apply to universities, and what the various courses are all about.

Before qualifying as a Staffie, they must complete a leadership training course run over the ANZAC long weekend. Part of this program involves an analysis and planning session; the intent of which is to improve on the previous forum.

Rotarians are also involved in the January sessions through the roles of Rotary Mum and Dad, and Rotary Aunts and Uncles. These volunteers provide assistance and back up to Staffies, as well as pastoral care and medical support, if required.

### ROTARIANS IMPROVE THE HEALTH OF VILLAGERS!

OECUSSI PROVINCE, TIMOR LESTE Robert Koehne Reporting

Imagine having your toilet washed away every wet season, then having to wait until the dry season to re-build it. This has been a frustrating scenario in villages in Oecussi Province, Timor Leste.

Oecussi is an enclave, surrounded by the Indonesian region of West Timor and the Savu Sea. It is relatively undeveloped, a 12 hour, often hazardous, ferry journey from Timor Leste's capital, Dili.

Oecussi is a legacy of former colonial times. Timor was first colonised by the Portuguese, then the Dutch assumed control of the archipelago, which became known as the Dutch East Indies. When the Dutch and the Portuguese negotiated over the control of the island of Timor, the Dutch proposed to take over the western half leaving the Portuguese in control of the eastern half. The Portuguese, however, negotiated successfully to retain also the small Oecussi enclave in west Timor, for sentimental reasons – it was where the Portuguese first landed and established a trading post in Timor (the sandalwood on the island was much prized).



Oecusse, formerly Ambeno and Oecussi-Ambeno, is a district of East Timor. It is a coastal exclave in the western part of the island of Timor, separated from the rest of East Timor by West Timor, which is part of the province of Nusa Tenggara Timor, Indonesia, and which surrounds Oecusse in all directions except the north, where it borders the Savu Sea. The capital of the district is Pante Macassar, also called Oecussi Town, or formerly, in Portuguese Timor, as Vila Taveiro. Originally Ambeno was the name of the district and Oecussi (< Oe Kusi) its capital.[1]





The District had funds left over from the large Timor Leste Water and Sanitation Project in which it was involved several years ago which the Safe Water Saves Lives (SWSL) Committee administered. SWSL was keen for the surplus funds to be spent on water and sanitation issues in Timor Leste and sought the advice of the Australian Embassy in Dili, Timor Leste, on how best the funds could be spent. The Embassy recommended two projects in Oecussi, to build permanent toilets in several villages.

SWSL worked with two Timor Leste Non-Government Organisations (NGO's), based in Oecussi, to implement the projects. Using local labour, concrete, iron and zinc were used to build the toilets. This ensured that they could easily withstand the regular onslaught from the wet season.

The new toilets have been built and the improved health conditions now available not only assist with preventing the outbreak of debilitating and potentially deadly diseases, but also reinforce the importance of good sanitation.

The villagers themselves, under instruction from NGO staff, built the toilets. The sense of ownership that this engendered has been very important and will ensure the facilities are well-maintained.
