





during a meeting arranged with my fellow "Tanaka Team" District Governors that were present at the conference.



SPECIAL REPORT: ROTARY CLUB OF HALLETT COVE ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL RYDA EVENT...

A bleak damp morning, blasting along the Southern Expressway causing possible delays for the six buses bringing the students, last minute unforeseen changes to the venue and an unfortunate prang to one of the Rotary volunteer's car en route to RYDA all failed to dampen the spirits of the many committed Rotarians who arrived early and gave up a day for RYDA on Friday, July 20.

155 Year 10 students from Hallett Cove School and their eight teachers arrived a little late but were quickly welcomed and organised into the six colour groups that they would remain in for the whole day. So, after a bit of a dodgy start, all the planning and organisation paid off, and the day was soon running smoothly. The six colour groups rotated through their six activities; Plan B, Police, Crash Survivor, My Wheels, Stopping Distances and Hazards, Distractions and Risks.

The weather refused to improve but the location at Flinders University is an exceptional facility so all were able to stay warm and dry. The District is indeed fortunate to have wonderful support from the University which provides the site for no charge. It is hoped that the students who attended this RYDA event have become somewhat wiser about the hazards of driving and that Rotary has saved some young people from making the wrong choices in the future.





Special thanks must go to Trevor Andrew (District RYDA Chair), AG Peter Hammond (District Coordinator) and other members of the District RYDA Committee, and, of course, the members of the Rotary Club of Hallett Cove for all the time and energy they put in to making the day a success. The support from the National RYDA Office was great. The financing of the event was made possible with a grant of \$2,500 from Marion City Council.

It was terrific to welcome a few Rotarians from other clubs who came to observe. Over 300,000 students in New Zealand and Australia have already been through this program. The Tasmanian Government is so impressed that it has made RYDA a mandatory part of the curriculum for Year 11 students throughout the state. RYDA is a wonderful way for clubs to engage with their local high schools and establish an on-going community project that has a positive impact on everyone concerned. Go for it!

CONTRIBUTIONS EXCEED \$100/member TARGET FOR THE FIRST TIME

The June 2012 figures have just been released and D 9520 clubs averaged

\$118.29 to the Annual Programs Fund with USD168,558 contributed. This is an 18.29% increase over last year. All club members can feel proud of their part in this achievement.

This means we will have some USD84,000 for District Grants in 3 years time. This is a substantial increase and will allow clubs to have many of their educational and humanitarian service projects subsidized so they can make an even great impact. USD55,864 was contributed as other (mainly Polio) giving a total of USD224,421.

Only one club failed to make any contribution to the Foundation this year. The previous year half a dozen clubs failed to contribute.

32 clubs exceeded the target of USD100/Rotarian and 5 clubs exceeded USD200/Rotarian.

This can be done painlessly by clubs by making a decision to transfer fines and weekly raffle money to the Foundation in the names of individual members. Most clubs easily raise \$100/member from members over a year in this way. The Foundation will provide individual

PERSONAL GIVING TO THE ROTARY FOUNDATION The Centurion Program

Currently we have in District 9520 over 300 Rotarians and partners/friends/family who make a personal donation to the Rotary Foundation through The Australian Rotary Foundation Trust each year.

Donations are tax deductible and if the donation is \$100 then the donor is called a Centurion and receives a Certificate and pin after the first donation to certify their involvement with the program. Donors are encouraged to give each year but are not committed to give in subsequent years if circumstances change.

When individuals donate via the Centurion program they can nominate whether they wish their donation to be directed to the Annual Programs Fund of the Foundation which supports most Rotary programs or to the Polio Plus program. Some clubs have committed to become 100% Centurion clubs and have used innovative processes to channel member contributions such, as fines collections, to the program.

Contribution forms are available for download on the District website and should be forwarded to PDG Malcolm Lindquist who will produce certificates and forward payment details to the Parramatta office of Rotary International which will issue a receipt to each individual contributor. This receipt can be kept for taxation purposes. If you do not know your club number or Rotary ID number leave that area blank on the form and it can be filled in for you by PDG Malcolm.
