### Welcome John Fitzgibbon—District 9520 Vocational Service Chair

John Fitzgibbon joined the Rotary Club of Irymple in 1989. He has been a Director on the Board for most of that time and has held most positions in the Club. He has been President on two occasions, has been a long-term Club Secretary and still is. He was presented with a PHF pin in 1997 by the Club and has since been awarded two sapphires to go with the pin.

John has served on number of District Committees including a term as District Secretary and others on District Conference Committees. He was a DG Representative for PDG John Jackson.

John joined Rotary with the classification of Education and later changed to Management Services.



He was strongly motivated to join by the Objects of Rotary and in particular, the Second Object, which calls Rotarians to "encourage and foster":

High ethical standards in business and professions

The recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations

The dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society

John believes this was the case with many Rotarians but has some misgivings that this commitment has tended to wane in many Clubs in recent years. John would welcome the challenge of assisting Club to return more strongly to some of the basics that has made Rotary a world-leading community organisation.

As the District Vocational Service Chair, John believes that there are many wonderful stories about vocational service in District 9520 Clubs. He would like the assistance of all Clubs to share the 'good news'.



### Welcome Trevor McGuirk - District 9520 International Service Chair

Trevor McGuirk is currently a member of the Rotary Club of Unley, having joined Stirling in 2006 and President of that club in 2010-2011. He is currently vice President of Unley Rotary Club.

Trevor has travelled extensively overseas bur notably

to South America on 4 occasions. In 2008 he spent 8 weeks as volunteers in Cusco, Peru. In November 2009 he returned to Cusco for 5 weeks to distribute Christmas gifts to children who live in poverty in the Andes Mountains near Cusco. On this trip the opportunity to do more for these children and their families arose, and with a Rotary Foundation



matching grant was able to provide a school bus for the community of Quishuarani so that children did not have to walk 2-3 hours to school each day. The bus was delivered in October 2010.

Trevor is currently working to establish an extensive medical health care program for these people who live in isolated communities in the Andes mountains, some 5 hours' drive from Cusco.

Rotary keeps Trevor busy being Chair of the D9520 Friendship Exchange Committee and recently appointed as International Projects Services Director for D9520. He somehow finds time to belong to the Metropolitan Male Choir of South Australia. The Choir will present the "Proms" concerts in the Adelaide Town Hall in August.

#### St Peters—Taken for Granted

St Peters Rotary Club were successful with their application for matching funds from the Federal Government for an infrastructure upgrade to their shed. The *St Peters* club's application detailed a project to concrete the rear access drive to their "spiritual" home, the *Peter Slattery Memorial Shed* as



well as purchasing a dishwasher to clean the multitude of pre-loved kitchen/dishware picked up as donations and then on-sold at the *Rotary on Linde* community rummage shed and meeting place. It's open to the public on Saturday mornings.

Funds are available through the Federal Government's **Stronger Communities Programme** whose objective is to fund small capital projects which will deliver social benefits. The programme aims to improve local community participation, cohesion and contribute to vibrant and viable communities. The Club will receive **over \$6000** to fund these improvements/additions and will match this amount to complete the project by the end of October 2016.

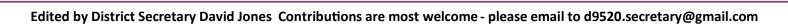

### **Quote from the past**

Today, things are different. Companies are less generous about time, and not every manager looks favorably on community service. It's hard to enjoy a Rotary meeting when you've got emails piling up on your phone. It's harder than ever to balance work with Rotary – and the model that gave us so much growth a few decades ago is part of what's holding back our growth now.

That's why the recent Council on Legislation adopted some innovative measures that allow clubs to vary their meeting times and expand their pool of prospective members. Clubs have more flexibility now to respond to the needs of their members and to clear away as many barriers to membership as they can. But there's one barrier to membership that only you can remove, one thing that every prospective member needs to become a Rotarian: an invitation to join a Rotary club.
