# FROM A DREAM TO REALITY! WELCOME TO THE ROTARY CLUB OF SEAFORD

On **Saturday 26<sup>th</sup> November 2016**, we officially welcomed into Rotary District 9520 the first new club chartered in our District in well over a decade. Twenty three (23) Rotarians were inducted into the Seaford Rotary Club at a special cocktail celebration event. From my perspective, what was evident during the evening was the excitement, enthusiasm and commitment of all the new Rotarians.



The idea of a new club in the area was conceived nearly two years ago. Following quite bit of research and many discussions with local MPs and other community leaders, Rotarian Mark Huddleston believed that there was a need for a new Rotary Club to service this rapidly growing region. He suggested the idea to then District Governor Jerry Casburn who immediately threw his support behind the idea. Mark was assisted from the outset by charter President Cecilie Cardwell. It was decided that the new club was going to be a more flexible and contemporary Rotary Club with the goal of attracting a diverse membership who are committed to making an impact through Rotary service.

There is no doubt that Mark and Cecilie faced many challenges, but as the core group started to grow, the determination to succeed grew also. Saturday evening was the culmination of that hard work and persistence, but even before the Club was chartered, partnerships were already established with the local Bunnings Hardware store, Breakfast Bellies and others. The Club was undertaking fundraising activities and was already developing a strong community profile.

On behalf of everyone in District 9520, I welcome the new Rotary Club of Seaford and all the new Rotarians into the worldwide family of Rotary. I don't need to wish you luck because I know that your collective positive attitudes will see you make your community and the world a better place.





#### **ICE COMMUNITY FORUM**

It has been an incredibly busy month. On **Thursday 24**<sup>th</sup> **November**, an ICE Community Forum was held at the Norwood Town Hall. This special forum sponsored by the Rotary clubs of St Peters, and supported by the Rotary Clubs of **Morialta, Campbelltown, Magill Sunrise, Kent Town, Norwood & Burnside**, was arranged to assist the community to come to grips with a growing problem.

This was an outstanding forum where the speakers allayed some of the community fears about the problem and, most importantly, offered a positive message of the treatment and support that is available.

## World's Outstanding Foundation For 2016

The **Association of Fundraising Professionals** has recognised **The Rotary Foundation** with its annual Award for Outstanding Foundation.

The award honours organisations that show philanthropic commitment and leadership through financial support, innovation, encouragement of others, and involvement in public affairs.

"We are honoured to receive this recognition from the AFP, which gives us even more reason to celebrate during our Foundation's centennial year," says Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair **Kalyan Banerjee.** "The continued strong support of Rotary members will help us keep our promise of a polio-free world for all children and enable the Foundation to carry out its mission of advancing world understanding, goodwill, and peace. We look forward to another 100 years of

Rotary members taking action to make communities better around the world."

AFP's committee of judges cited Rotary's comprehensive campaign to eradicate polio as a major driver of the selection. They also mentioned that Rotary applies a methodical, purposeful approach to support a wide variety of causes, from providing clean water to educating the next generation of peace professionals.

The announcement came on 15 November, known to industry professionals since the 1980s as National Philanthropy Day. The award will be presented in early 2017 at the AFP's annual conference in San Francisco.

## **Working Toward GSE in 2018**

We have two Rotary Clubs in the District who have shown interest. We need at **least another two clubs** to show interest before we start working on the idea of having a Group Study Exchange in 2018

We will need to establish what part of the world a delegation might want to visit on a cultural, vocational, or service exchange and we would appreciate any suggestions that your club may have regarding which country you would like to see an exchange take place.

Group Study Exchange

Then I will establish contact with an overseas district at the upcoming International Assembly in San Diego in January 2017 and once I have an agreement with my counterpart overseas, the District will set up a GSE committee with past GSE team leaders and other interested Rotarians as the members of the committee.

With the incoming team from overseas the travel costs would be carried by the individual overseas participants (either personally or by their District) and the costs in our District would be carried by the club hosting them which also includes the cost for team members to participate in the combined District 9500/9520 conference in March 2018.

With the outgoing team to travel overseas the District will only able to financially support about \$5,000 from the District Grant funds. Participating Rotary clubs would be asked to contributed around \$1,000 each towards the exchange and the individual participants would be required to fund around \$400 each and the balance of their costs whilst preparing for the exchange and whilst on exchange.

If your club is interested we suggest that the club nominate a couple of club members who would be committee members of the District committee.
