February is Peace and Conflict Prevention and Resolution Month


Dear Rotarians and Friends,

During my Club visits, I regularly talked about the work of The Rotary Foundation and Rotary's six areas of focus. One focus area that we explore this month is Peace and Conflict Prevention and Resolution. Striving to prevent conflict and building

peace in our world is as critically important today as it ever has been.

In our District, we have been fortunate to have a number of candidates awarded Rotary Peace Fellowships, enabling them to study at Rotary Peace Centres and develop vital skills including conflict resolution and mediation strategies

and also, equally importantly, to learn and understand how to address the underlying causes of conflict. Like me, I am sure you have often wondered what happens to our Peace Studies graduates. Well, I have taken some snapshots from Rotary International's website that I think are very interesting.

This first graphic on the left shows where the Peace Centre alumni work. It may be surprising to some the industries in which many of the graduates are now involved — journalism, banking, law enforcement, teaching and NGOs.

What can we do in our own Clubs to promote peace and conflict prevention and resolution? Here are some suggestions:



- 1. Use role playing and sports to teach children and young adults socially appropriate ways of dealing with conflict.
- 2. Train local leaders on strategies to prevent and mediate conflict as a component of your community service projects.
- 3. Pursue projects that address the underlying causes of conflict: disease, illiteracy. Hunger and poverty.
- 4. Join a Rotary Action Group.

As with most things in Rotary, the opportunity exists to undertake focus projects at a local level or to participate in larger projects internationally. The message is just do something to make a positive difference!

ROTARY BIRTHDAY AND FILM NIGHT

A few days ago, I received an update from the National Public Image and Foundation Committees which I summarise below.

The campaign to celebrate the Centennial of The Rotary Foundation was meant to engage clubs and have them attending at theatres across Australia during the week of 23 February.

In parallel, there is also the annual Rotary Foundation Film Fundraiser, which is organised by the TRF Marketing Manager for RI - South Pacific and who has been tasked with liaising with Fox studios to try and create the opportunity for both events to occur. The present status is:

- 1. The representative from TRF RI South Pacific is working with the TRF chairs across Australia in staging a series of Rotary Film nights / days for the pre-release screening of "Hidden Figures". Fox has agreed, as part of the distribution, to air the Centennial 4 minute video. In District 9520, you will have already been made aware that the TRF Movie Screening was on 5th February 2017.
- 2. The national Public Image Campaign has developed 4 x 30 second TV quality videos, 2 are complete and have now been "shared" with DGs and DGsE. These will also be uploaded to You Tube, the Rotary Australia web site and shared on District and club web sites and provided to TV stations. They will also form the basis of a social media campaign with messages to donate and volunteer, the latter to run over a 3 week period before and after the 23rd February. The National Committee is still hopeful of achieving the airing of these videos in picture theatres and to provide clubs with the opportunity to present Rotary to the community and to raise funds for the Foundation. However, the Committee has been constrained by the need to gain industry / union approval, which is still forthcoming. Until then, the videos can be used for social media only.


Encounter Bay Rotary changing lives for 40,000 young people

The Rotary Club of Encounter Bay, with district assistance and help from Rotarians in South Carolina is changing the lives of children, teachers and nurses in Haiti. They have embarked on an ambitious literacy project to empower the impoverished people, who are living in appalling conditions and earning less than \$2 AUD per day

Haiti is the Western Hemisphere's poorest place where survival is dependent on agriculture. There have been years of oppression with a corrupt government, repeated seasons of drought and in recent times hurricane Matthew destroyed homes and properties leaving in its wake both squalor and a cholera outbreak. They are doing it tough, with homes and crops destroyed and little direct assistance towards recovery.

The Encounter Bay Literacy Project aims at providing hope. As a general rule, schools lack resources – most still have dirt floors and no electricity. Teachers pass on cultural information, but most can't read or write. People see education as the way to a brighter future – but who will teach them to read or write?

Dr Peter Manuel (former high school Principal and member of the Rotary Club of Encounter Bay) has written and illustrated a children's book, ROO GOES TO SCHOOL. This book contains many of the readiness skills for learning, and has been translated into Creole (the native language of Haitians). The Rotary club has had printed 750 copies, and these have been forwarded to Dr Sarah Mansbach in Haiti, who will conduct a training program for teachers and nurses.



When literate, participants will receive their own copy of the book, and they have signed an agreement to repeat the process to teach children how to read.

There is excitement about this program. Forty-One schools have registered to be part of the training and a group of Rotarian educators from South Carolina will travel to Haiti to work closely with participants as part of a weeklong program.


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Primary education programs that begin in the mother tongue help students gain literacy and numeracy skills more quickly. When taught in their local language, students readily transfer literacy skills to official languages of education, acquiring essential tools for lifelong learning. The results are the growth of self-esteem and a community that is better equipped to become literate in languages of wider communication.

The cost to the Rotary Club of Encounter Bay and Rotary District 9520 has been approx \$6000, but it will touch the lives of 40,000 children over the next 12 months. Rotary does make a difference and is thrilled to have taken the initiative in meeting very real needs.

DISASTER RELIEF

SHELTERBOX AT WOMAD 10-13th March 2017:

Greg Love Chair SBA for D9500 and 9520 advised of plans for displaying a ShelterBox at WOMADelaide 10-13th March 2017 and setting up the situation where the Shelterbox team can meet and talk to many people during the WOMADelaide event.

Last March they displayed one over four days talking to hundreds of people, donations reached over \$11,000 with much of that coming in after the event.

For \$1,000, you can sponsor a ShelterBox to be delivered where needed - this includes all materials, packing, transport and distribution to recipients worldwide and a contribution to stock in readiness for the next disaster we are called to respond to.

RI Council on Legislation

The Council on Legislation is an important part of Rotary's governance process. The Council comprises more than 500 representatives from every part of the Rotary world. Voting members include one elected representative of the clubs of each Rotary district. Every three years, Rotarians meet at the Council on Legislation to review and vote on proposed changes to the legislation that governs Rotary. They consider enactments, which change Rotary's governing documents, and position statements by the RI Board.

Council on Resolutions

The Council on Resolutions meets online every year to vote on proposed resolutions, which express opinions and make recommendations to the Board.

Council representatives

Each Rotary district chooses a representative for a threeyear term. These members represent their districts at all three meetings of the Council on Resolutions and at the Council on Legislation during their term.

District Governors have until 30 June 2017 to report to Rotary their district representatives for the term covering 1 July 2017 through 30 June 2020. Representatives will participate in:

- The 2017, 2018, and 2019 Councils on Resolutions
- The 2019 Council on Legislation

Proposing legislation and resolutions

Clubs, districts, the RI Board, and the RIBI general council or conference may submit legislation and resolutions to the Councils. The deadline for submitting legislation for the 2019 Council on Legislation is **31 December 2017**.

The deadline for submitting resolutions to the 2017-18 Council on Resolutions is **30 June 2017**.







ROMAC CENTRAL REGION (Districts 9500 and 95200) NEWSLETTER

You may recall that during the 2015/16 Rotary year Central Region Rotary clubs hosted four children from Timor Leste, two treated at the Memorial and two at the Adelaide Woman's and Children's hospital. The cost to ROMAC of their hospitalisation and treatment was in excess of \$50,000. The surgeons generously donated their time for which we sincerely thank them. Although claimable, the costs incurred by the host clubs, Kidman Park, Salisbury and Burnside were donated to ROMAC. During the same period the donations made by District 9500 and 9520 clubs fell far short of covering these costs. Our next patient, 8 year old Tomas Farel was due to have urgent brain surgery at the Adelaide Woman's and Children's just prior to Christmas. Unfortunately on landing in Darwin in transit to Adelaide, due to his condition he was immediately taken to the Darwin hospital where he had urgent surgery and remains in hospital. Due to the low volume of financial donations and to raise the profile of ROMAC your regional committee chose to hold a fund raiser with great live music from the 50s, 60s and 70s performed by the very talented "Buddies 4" dancing for those who would like to trip the light fantastic, and auctions, with quality offerings all round.

The speaker for the 2017 Women in Rotary International Women's Day breakfast is Professor Tanya Monro.

Professor Tanya Monro is Deputy Vice Chancellor Research and Innovation and an ARC Georgina Sweet Laureate Fellow at the University of South Australia. Tanya was the inaugural Director of the Institute for Photonics and Advanced Sensing (IPAS) from 2008 to 2014 and was also the inaugural Director for the ARC Centre of Excellence for Nanoscale BioPhotonics (CNBP) at the University of Adelaide.

Tanya is a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Science (AAS), the Australian Academy of Technological Sciences and Engineering (ATSE), the Optical Society of America (OSA) and the Australian Institute of Physics. She is a member of the Prime Ministers Commonwealth Science Council (CSC), the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (CSIRO), the AAS National Committee for Physics and the South Australian Economic Development Board. She is Chair of the Council of the National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) and is also an inaugural Bragg Fellow of the Royal Institution of Australia (RiAus).

In 2015 Tanya was awarded a Eureka Prize for Excellence in Interdisciplinary Scientific Research. In 2014, Tanya was awarded the Beattie Steel Medal of the Australian Optical Society and in 2012 the Australian Academy of Sciences' Pawsey Medal. In 2011, Tanya was named South Australia's Australian of the Year; and the Scopus Young Researcher of the Year. In 2010, she became South Australian Scientist of the Year and Telstra Business Women of the Year (in the Community and Government category). In 2008, she won the Prime Ministers Malcolm McIntosh Prize for Physical Scientist of the Year.

Tanya obtained her PhD in Physics in 1998 from The University of Sydney, for which she was awarded the Bragg Gold Medal for the best Physics PhD in Australia. In 2000, she received a Royal Society University Research Fellowship at the Optoelectronics Research Centre at the University of Southampton in the UK. She came to the University of Adelaide in 2005 as inaugural Chair of Photonics. She has published over 500 papers in refereed journals and conference proceedings and raised over \$140M for research.
