

An Award Winning Recovery Effort

Our Rotary District (9520) has been recognised with the Victorian Premier's Fire Awareness Award for its Victorian Bushfire Recovery Project, managed by the Rotary Club of Brownhill Creek.



"What can we do to help?", was the question being asked by many local Rotarians in the aftermath of the devastating Victorian bushfires of 2009. Rotary conducted a survey of the affected regions in order to identify suitable projects to be financed by \$60,000 in accumulated District disaster funds donated by local Rotary clubs for bushfire relief.

Key aims for these projects were to assist as many people as practical and achieve the maximum possible value from the money pledged by utilising as many Rotary and community volunteers as practical in a hands on manner in a safe working environment.

The targeted areas included South Traralgon, Flowerdale, Callignee,

Narbethong, Kilmore East, Alexandra, Wandong, Strath Creek, Kinglake and Pheasant Creek, where 5,000 km of fencing had been destroyed and many farmers had lost their livelihood.

In addition to building farm fences in conjunction with land owners, Rotarians worked on reinstatement and construction of a town walking trail, assistance with construction and installation of bird boxes, and offering assistance at an animal refuge centre.

The project was long and ambitious from its inception, but became more complex by its scale, distance between our local clubs and the affected region, the number of people involved, and the emotional toll of dealing with people who had suffered great and traumatic losses.



In total 530 volunteers were involved in \$1.2 million worth of fencing, construction and cleanup work, including 45 kilometres of fencing and the construction of three temporary dwellings.

District 9520 Rotarians demonstrated a remarkable ability to work with and form valuable community partnerships with other Rotary Districts, The Uniting Church and Landcare to achieve remarkable synergy and camaraderie in the process.

A Messaage from Rotary Financial Services

Beginning with the July 2012 Semiannual Report (SAR), Rotary International will distribute the semiannual report electronically. The SAR will be emailed to Rotary clubs and club officers.

In addition to supporting RI's environmental efforts, going paperless provides other benefits, including:

- Improved service to all clubs
- Faster, more secure, and more effective international delivery
- Significant cost savings
- Increased efficiency at all RI office locations

All clubs will receive a paper copy of the SAR for July and clubs will continue to receive the standard paper SAR unless they choose to opt out by updating their club preferences in Member Access (see below for additional details). The paperless option, which RI strongly encourages clubs to adopt, is now available in Member Access; the first paperless SAR will be distributed in the last week of June.

The electronic SAR will be sent from the following email address: Rotary_International_SAR@microdg.com. (E-mail contains underscores) To avoid your club's Semiannual Report being filtered as junk mail, please add Rotary_International_SAR@microdg.com to your list of approved senders and contacts.

To make this effort to go green successful, please ensure that your club and club officer's email addresses on file with RI are current.

Instruction for Opting out of paper SAR:

If your club no longer wishes to receive the paper version of the SAR, the secretary, president, or executive secretary/director should login to Member Access, click the option "Update Club Data, Semiannual Report Preferences", and mark option 'Check this box to remove your club from receiving the Semiannual report paper copy' and then click the Save button. This option is available to update prior to 1 December or 1 June for each SAR period.

Reflections on a Mini Assembly at Broken Hill DGE Wendy Gaborit



June 16 th saw a group of District Leaders head northeast to Broken Hill to conduct a mini assembly.

DGE Roy Armstrong in acknowledging the tyrrany distance has on many and in particular how it contributes to limiting Rotarians attendance at District events. Scheduled a mini assembly at the old Hospital - Morgan Street, Broken Hill. President Margaret Lesjack, Broken Hill South took up the challenge to secure a venue and to cater.

DG Bruce and Kathy Richardson travelled from Berri, PDG Malcolm and Antoinette Lindquist and ROMAC Chair Oleh Bilyk set forth from Adelaide as did the 2012-15 leadership group Roy Armstrong, Wendy Gaborit & Jerry Casburn accompanied by Briony Lyons. Their trip is worthy of a story in itself...

We were joined Saturday night by Rotarians from the local clubs for some fellowship and fun.

On the day, 28 Rotarians from Broken Hill & Mildura gathered in the training facility and were welcomed by DG Bruce Richardson. Based on feedback from the Murray Bridge Assembly, we amended the program to include what Rotarians stated they wanted to be informed on. PDG Malcolm Lindquist demystified The Rotary Foundation, its programs and how clubs can support those programs. Then provided an over view of the Future Vision and the thrust for bigger, better and bolder projects. The Question and Answer session provided opportunity for further clarification.







District Secretary Jerry Casburn gave voice to why clubs need to communicate with District, the role of District Officers and the support available to clubs from District, The Assistant Governors and from RI Parramatta.

DG Bruce and Roy spoke and engaged the members in a discussion on membership, and marketing. DG Bruce unveiling the new Rotary a-frame signs... These are a really good marketing tool – you can't miss them and clubs are urged to nominate locations..

Oleh Bilyk, spoke on ROMAC and the opportunity to change the lives of those condemned to poverty, abuse and rejection due to injury, birth deformity and disease.

Oleh then spoke on Insurance and risk management... PDG alias Dorothy Dix, added to the conversation and understanding of all in attendance with a few well chosen questions.

Following a great lunch, thanks to President Margaret, we resumed Assembly with Rotarians moving to breakout sessions. Session 1 offered Planning Guide and Member Access targeted at Presidents Elect and Secretaries, or New Generations. Followed by, Club Visioning or the District Web Site with DG Bruce conducting an interactive session on the latter. The afternoon was wrapped up by the final session run as an open forum.

A quick review of the feedback sheets indicates that everyone gained from the assembly, the training was well received, with The Foundation, New Generations and Insurance getting the gongs for most valuable sessions.

Target achieved for the first time!

Thanks to the generosity of Rotary clubs and Rotarians throughout the district, D9520 has achieved, in fact, exceeded, the target of USD100/Rotarian for the first

time. We have been trying to do this for many years and to finally reach the target means there will be more money available for clubs for Global Grants and District Grants under the new Future Vision rules that start in2013. The Foundation committee is most grateful for your generosity and humbled by the work of all clubs this year to achieve the target. Already we have 14 clubs that have given notice of Matching Grant projects they wish to undertake. This is three times our normal annual requests for Matching Grants and demonstrates unprecedented interest in the work of the Foundation. Clubs will be invited to apply for District Simplified Grants in a couple of months.

We won't know the final result for another 10 days as individual donations and club contributions are still being processed. This will be announced in the August newsletter.

At a dinner held on 9 June more members were recognised. **John and Sonya Caddy (Burnside), Don and Jill Cant (Marion), John Henshall (Edwardstown) and Mike Woosnam (Loxton)** all received their 'wings' and a certificate for a commitment to donate USD1000 a year to the Foundation.
