With the majority of Club changeovers now completed, we should look forward to the year ahead as one of excitement, change, opportunity and celebration. To all of the incoming Presidents and Club officers, thank you for taking the role of leading your Clubs into the year of "Rotary Serving Humanity".

What does the year ahead hold for Rotary International and more specifically, those of us in District 9520? It is another year where each and every one of us has an opportunity to strive to make the world a better place in whatever capacity we are able to through our service to others. Look for ways to find solutions to some of the problems facing our communities.

There are several specific areas I would encourage Clubs to focus on over the next 12 months.

Firstly, we must drive membership growth. Strong membership, will cannot enable us to continue the good work that Rotary Clubs have done for so long now. The changes approved at the recent Council of Legislation now provide us with the opportunity to consider how we can make our Clubs more vibrant through more flexible meeting and membership arrangements.

Most importantly we need to make sure that the Club is absolutely relevant to community within which it operates.

Secondly, remember that Rotary is a Service organisation. Supporting causes is what attracts and inspires people. If we want to attract new members, increase our fundraising and deliver maximum impact from our efforts, then this is best achieved by getting out into the community and undertaking Rotary service projects. So my second aim is to encourage all Clubs to make sure they have an ongoing, sustainable Community Service project that becomes synonymous with the local Rotary Club. I call this having a "signature" project.





Thirdly, we are entering the Centenary Year of the Rotary Foundation. It is a time to celebrate 100 years of doing good in the world. One of the fundamental reasons for the creation of the Foundation was to enable individual Rotarians and all Rotary Clubs across the world to have an opportunity to participate in International Service projects through their support of and contributions to the Foundation. So I would say to all Clubs and Rotarians, celebrate the achievements of the Foundation in the year ahead, but also don't forget to continue to provide support to the Foundation.

It is a vital component that enables Rotary to continue to do good in the world. Finally, I just want to mention the End Polio Now campaign. For nearly 30 years Rotary has led the fight to eradicate Polio. And we are almost there. We have contributed around US\$1.5 billion and countless volunteer hours to the program. It is an example of what can be achieved when Rotarians work together. There is a strong belief and hope that 2017 should see the end of the wild polio virus. But inoculations need to continue for 3 years after that before the world is declared polio free, so we must continue to support the initiative.

So the year ahead is one where we should be optimistic, we can celebrate what Rotary has achieved, but most importantly, we must continue to look for opportunities to serve our communities. We need to encourage and support one another in our Clubs and ultimately, we should strive to be good examples of "Rotary Serving Humanity".

In the words of Winston Churchill Success is not final, failure is not fatal: it is the courage to continue that counts.

Message from outgoing RI President read by DG Dick Wilson

My dear friends,

On every July 1st, a page turns in Rotary. One Rotary year ends, and another begins; we do not lay down our pen but only lift it from the page, as we write the final lines of one chapter and consider the first lines of the next.

The story of the 2015-16 Rotary year has now been written and my friends, you have written it well. We end our year with a net gain of over 30,000 members, and global membership approaching all-time highs. Our convention was the second-largest in Rotary history, with extremely positive reviews. Rotary Global Rewards, launched only one year ago, now contains over 1,350 offers and is approaching 100,000 site visits. And we are closer than ever to our goal of eradicating polio, with only seventeen cases of polio caused by the wild poliovirus to date in 2016.

These are achievements that all of us can be proud of. But we all know that the true story of Rotary this year was written, not in Evanston by its officers, but in every one of Rotary's clubs and districts, by each of you, and by the Rotarians you have led, motivated, and inspired. The story of this Rotary year is the work of your minds, your hands, and your hearts; the story of health, of education, and of hope that you have brought to countless people, in every corner of the Rotary world.


