Dear Rotarians and Friends,

ATLANTA CONVENTION AND FOUNDATION CENTENARY

The Rotary International Convention in Atlanta, Georgia starts on 10th June and we have a contingent of Rotarians from our District attending the event. Unfortunately, Lee and I are unable to get to the Convention ourselves, but we know that everyone who is going will have a fabulous time and return with some inspiring stories.

The core focus of the International Convention will be the celebration of The Rotary Foundation's 100th anniversary.

During that 100 years, the Foundation has spent \$3 billion on life-changing, sustainable projects. To continue doing good for the next 100 years, The Rotary Foundation needs our ongoing support.

Throughout this past Rotary year, Lee's partner project was simply to ask that all Clubs and Rotarians in our District consider their contributions to the Foundation and perhaps strive to donate a little more than usual in celebration of the Centenary of the Foundation. With this Rotary year quickly coming to an end, I would ask all Clubs to please think about where you allocate your funds aim to give a little more to the Foundation this year if you can.



CLUB VISITS AND ACTIVITIES



Lee and I were invited to attend the changeover function of the **Rotary Nomads Club**, which was held in Berri and hosted by the Berri Rotary Club. The event was fabulous, great fun, friendship and lots of Rotary business being discussed. For those that may not know, the Nomads Club was charted about 3 years ago. It operates as an e-club and has quickly grown to 35+ members now. One key element of the Club is that they are all travel regularly across Australia in their caravans and motorhomes. The members are dispersed across Australia. Besides weekly online meetings, they arrange 3-4 "musters" annually, where most of the members travel and meet up in a nominated location somewhere in Australia. They enjoy fellowship, hold face-to-face meetings, visit local Rotary clubs and get involved helping local clubs with their projects.

This year alone, the Club members have managed to support 21 Service projects and hold 7 major fundraising events. A massive effort for a club whose members are spread out all over the country. They have also donated \$18,000 to the causes that they especially support including the Rotary Foundation, the Royal Flying Doctor Service and ShelterBox.

A particularly interesting aspect of the Club is that, being grey nomads, the age of the group is between 55 and 80. And yet they have all become very proficient in using technology to run weekly videoconference meetings, to share communication and reports and to undertake their work in local communities. They are an inspiring group who have "broken the traditional Rotary image", yet still focus on "service above self" in everything they do. To me, this is another wonderful example of offering a different and more appropriate version of Rotary to their members, many of whom never heard of Rotary before joining the Nomads.



There were many other highlights during this past month:

- The St Peters Club held their Annual Music Awards. Some truly outstanding young musicians were showcased and given support by the Club. If you haven't attended one of these events previously, look out for it and go along next year. It is fabulous.
- The Long Term Youth Exchange Ball and Graduation Event. This is a fun evening where everyone gets very "glammed up" and the students tell us about some of their experiences. They are also presented with their graduation certificates.

- The Reel Event was run by the Magill Sunrise Rotary Club where they run a series of short films created by local film-makers, producers and directors. There was also the opportunity to meet and chat with the talented people involved in creating the films. This event supports vocational service, but also is a fundraising opportunity for the Club. Fantastic.
- The Unley Rotary Club held their annual Police Officer of the Year Award. A great tribute to Vocation Service that is warmly appreciated by the recipients and the police force in general.



I know I can't showcase everything, because there are so many wonderful things that our Clubs and members do to serve their communities. It is truly inspirational.

The Rotary year is quickly coming to an end and this is my final District Governor's Newsletter. (There will be another issue of The Herald in a couple of weeks.) The RAM programme in the South West Pacific continues to have very significant impact on the occurrence of malaria in Papua New Guinea, the Solomon Islands and Timor Leste. The primary prevention tool is insecticide impregnated bed nets, supported by spraying the interior of houses with insecticide. A malaria vaccine has been developed and is undergoing trial.

Also, in PNG, where the malaria control programme is carried out by a "company" set up by the Rotary Club of Port Moresby, under contract to the "Global Fund". The WHO reports a significant reduction in the incidence of malaria and consequently a reduction in the deaths from that cause.

A very important message to all individual donors, who wish to make a "tax deductible" donation, and Clubs, that wish to donate to the RAM cause. It is unfortunate that I have to report that PDG Richmond Manyweathers, the national treasurer for RAM, is ill and we wish to relieve him of the responsibility of processing donations that are forwarded directly to him, as requested on some of the RAM pamphlets.

Disaster Aid Australia is a project of the Rotary Club of Endeavour Hills, Victoria Australia.

PROJECT 81_7317-W-002 To provide potable water for Provincial schools in Columbia South America

DAA provides innovative Australian-based humanitarian packages that help family units survive in post-disaster circumstances with dignity.

In 2015 at the RI Convention in Sao Paulo, then DGE Humberto Escobar Molano visited the Disaster Aid International stand and saw the Australian SkyHydrant water Filtration system which produces safe drinking water without the need for power or chemicals. A single unit can produce up to 1000 litres per hour. Clean drinking water can be produced from the majority of non-saline surface and ground water.

That led to the Rotary Club of Bogota Teusaquillo applying for a Global grant to bring safe Water to the school children of rural Columbia. The initiative will provide safe water to some 50 schools and surrounding communities in rural Columbia.

It is US\$97,000 project and in addition to the Rotary Club of Endeavour Hills contributing A\$15,000, the Project requires an additional **US\$7500 to get them across the line.**

A NO RISK FUND RAISING PROPOSAL FOR YOUR CLUB

The **Encounter Bay Rotary Club**, in conjunction with the Axiom Publishers Managing Director, Rotarian John Gallehawk, and author/illustrator Rotarian Dr Peter Manuel, have come up with **a plan to raise funds for interested clubs while supporting literacy across district 9520 and beyond.**

A children's book (*Roo Goes to School*) has been written and illustrated, and can be printed economically to be **sold for profits** by participating Rotary clubs. Please note that Encounter Bay club had no problem in selling over 700 copies of this book leading up to Christmas - simply by adding book sales to existing activities, or strategically placing the books in local businesses. No special promotion was required.

In brief, the Encounter Bay Club can **supply the books at \$5 each – your club can sell them for \$10 making 100% profit.** You may also choose to work with schools profit sharing, or give some books to kindergartens, schools, waiting rooms, or sell them to club members and families. Use the resource as you wish.

The books will be printed – ie 48 pages A-4 size - with binding being section sewn for strength, and with a sturdy cover finish of gloss lamination rather than varnish. They will be both robust and colourful.

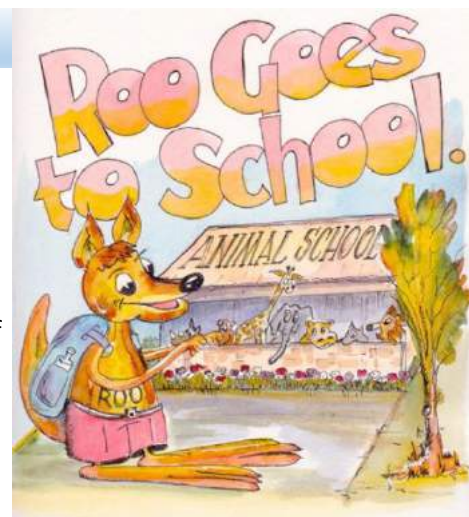
Two pages of the book will be reserved to promote Rotary and *will list those clubs wishing to participate (deadline end of June).*

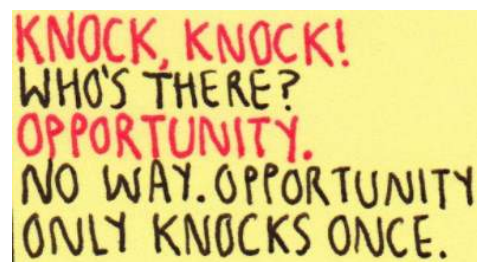

South Australia Police Officer of the Year 2016



The Rotary Club of Unley has been presenting the Police Officer of the Year award annually since 1978. This is the 38th presentation of the Award.

The purpose of the award is to provide a means by which members of the public may bring to notice outstanding acts of courtesy, kindness, understanding, compassion, courage or devotion to duty by any member of the South Australia Police.

There are many instances of Police Officers providing help, comfort and assistance to the general community which go far beyond the call of duty and which are often unrecognised.

Too often, any adverse comment on Police operations receives widespread publicity but little is ever written or said regarding the tremendous contribution made to our community by members of the South Australia Police.

The Rotary Club of Unley seeks to bring this good news side of the South Australia Police to the fore through this award.

The recipient of the Police Officer of the Year 2016 award is Brevet Sergeant Peter Phillips who is currently stationed at Mount Gambier. He was recently Officer in Charge at the Beachport Police Station and was nominated in recognition of his support of that community.

His community involvement included being instrumental in the founding of the Beachport Surf Lifesaving Club, participation in the local Lions Club and the Beachport District and Development Association where he liaised with the association to foster a solid working relationship between the community and the Police.

During his speech Peter said that there had been a drowning at Beachport not long after his arrival and this led to him becoming passionate about the town having a Surf Lifesaving Club.

This was a big task that took several years of working with the local community, Government bodies and liaising with sponsors. Peter was

elected as the inaugural President of the Beachport Surf Life Saving Club. The Club now has over 60 members, an amazing result for a small community.
