

Meet: AG David Lloyd

David was born in Merthyr Tydfil, in the Merthyr Valley of Glamorgan, South Wales, UK and was educated at the local village school.

On leaving school David became a junior life guard at the local swimming baths, a position he held for several weeks until management discovered he could not swim, and still can't. David left Wales with his parents on May 9th 1965 bound for Townsville Queensland arriving in Townsville July 9th 1965. In August 1966 they moved down from Townsville to South Australia and settled in Adelaide.

David's first job in Australian was that of a Brickies Labourer in Townsville, he also had a short stint at share farming on the West Coast, at Poochera and Port Kenny. before moving into the clothing / sporting industry.

He assisted in the manufacture of the first Australian Made Cricket Jumper for the Australian Test Team, prior to which they were imported from England, and he still has the original sample garment.

David commenced with Pengelley & Kanbe Funerals (now Blackwell Funerals) in 1985. The pinnacle thus far in his career was arranging and conducting both Lady Jessie and Sir Donald Bradmans funeral services. David is also privileged to have some very special memorabilia autographed for him by Sir Donald.

David was awarded an OAM in the 2007 New Year's Honours List for services to the community especially through The Knights of the Southern Cross, Rotary International, and the Funeral Industry. David is a member of the the Knights of the Southern Cross (SA), serving as Councillor, Chairman, Deputy President, and Secretary, all national executive positions. He was awarded a Knight of Merit in 2000. In 1999 David accepted a Papal Knighthood into the Equestrian Order of the Knights of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem.

He is a past President of the Australian Funeral Directors Association (SA / NT Division) and was made a Master Funeral Director in 2006, and currently serves as a State Councillor.

David is a member of the Royal Association of Justices of the Peace (SA), Past President of the Rotary Club of Morialta; a Paul Harris Fellow. Currently he is Assistant Governor for Group 7. David is also a current member of the Board of Directors of Southern Cross Care (SA/NT), the largest provider of Aged Care Facilities both in SA/NT and on a National level.

As you can see David is not a stranger to community service - doing everything he can through Rotary, his Church and his vocation. One would have thought that this might be enough "to make a difference" But wait, there is more, in addition, David is active in a political party – in hope that he can make an additional contribution to society.

David is married to Tricia, they have two children, James, a teacher and Simon, a Police Officer.


Most of you have already heard that there is a special David's Motto, but for those who have not, here it is:

ROMAC is an organisation within Rotary in Australia and New Zealand which brings disadvantaged children into both countries for medical treatment which they cannot receive in their own country.

On a yearly basis ROMAC has around 30 children treated, but this year the number will be around 40 to 45. Naturally this puts a great deal of pressure on our limited financial resources, but with the help of Rotarians, the Public, the generosity of Doctors and Hospitals, not to mention Rotary Clubs, we are still doing good in the world. Without their help we could not continue work that we do.

The average cost per patient is approx. \$30,000 and on top of this add air fares and associated figure increases dramatically. As a result we are always looking for new sources of funding.

We, in Australia, do not know how lucky we are with all our health resources, hospitals, doctors can receive, because, when you look at the children that ROMAC deals with you have to say "Thank goodness I live in Australia!"

We are very fortunate to have the facilities that are lacking in the Oceania Region of the and in many countries of Asia, East Timor and Indonesia. Also, many of similar problems Australian children, however, in Australia, due to the standard of medical care, problems detected and treated <u>very early</u> in the lives of Australian children, so we do not often see advanced deformities or other advanced problems of Oceania's children.

ROMAC is an Inter District Programme.

ALLOW ME TO SHARE THE STORY OF REX KHUMO WITH YOU:

5 year old Rex and his mother, Karen, live in the Papua New Guinea Highlands, a 10 hour the nearest town. Like so many who live what we would consider a simple life. Because of his was ostracized, so, he could not attend school.

When they arrived in Adelaide, they were met by members of the Rotary Club of Henley Beach and Rotarian Anthony Mason. Rex arrived in Adelaide for treatment for an encephalocele (herniated brain).

Like so many of ROMAC's children's parents, Karen had no idea of how to use money or even shop ['big city' style].



Rex was operated on by Dr. Mark Moore at the Women's and Children's Hospital. He made a very quick recovery and within two weeks was organizing miniature games of Rugby Onion in the corridors of the hospital. He was also enjoying outings to the Zoo and stroking Kangaroos. When he visited Henley Beach his eyes lit up when he saw sand and water for the first time. It was a highlight for him.



Rex now has a new life ahead of him and will be able to attend school, which is his dream.

There are many such stories that the people of ROMAC could tell. All deeply gratifying not only to the child and parent but also to the members of the Rotary Clubs involved. **COULD YOUR CLUB HELP?**



Despite all of the distractions of the fringe festival and the 37degree heat 340 men women and children from Districts 9500 and 9520 gathered in the Members' Dining Room overlooking the hallowed turf of Adelaide Oval on Saturday Feb 23rd to celebrate Rotary's commitment to Peace as suggested by RI President Sakuji Tanaka.

The keynote speakers Lieutenant Governor of South Australia, Hieu Van Le OA and Alexander Downer AC, both delivered outstanding speeches relating their personal involvements in the Peace process, Mr Le's in war torn Vietnam. Other speakers were Dr Daniel Biro, Peace Scholar Sonja Basic and Emily Haren from the Oaktree Foundation.

"Peace is not a final destination to be reached, but an active and continuous process. All of us are capable of becoming peacemakers in our own lives, and through our words and actions, we will demonstrate that peace is possible"

Following the success of the Forum the dinner in the evening overlooking the oval was a celebration of Peace and Rotary's 108th Birthday. The Peace/Birthday cake was jointly cut by RI Director John Boag, DG Marie Dorrington (D9500) and DG Roy and formed part of the dessert.

They included Youth Exchange students, RYLA awardees, NYSF graduates, Rotaractors and sponsored school students.



Group 5 Clubs (Blackwood, Coromandel Valley, Flagstaff Hill, Hallett Cove Noarlunga and Noarlunga East) recently enjoyed a combined meeting at the House of Jade Restaurant, Sheidow Park. The Rotary Club of Hallett Cove hosted the meeting and over 90 Rotarians, partners and guests attended. After giving a brief history of East Timor, Terry and Sharyn spoke passionately about the project and the reasons for their involvement. Rotary and Lions jointly support the East Timor Dental Project.


