


Well, it was another amazing month with some fantastic events that Briony and I have had the joy of being involved in.



Briony's Blog



Hello friends,

This was going to be my speech for the International Women's Day Breakfast on the 4th of March. I wanted to tell non-Rotarians my interpretation of Rotary. But as it turns out, Julie from 9500 and myself have been let off the hook. So rather than waste a good story, I would like to share it with you. So...:

Hello my name is Briony Casburn and I am a Rotarian and we have 51 clubs in our District. Our District 9520 starts from the salty air of Victor Harbour through the Southern Vales, up through the east of the city, Adelaide Hills, travelling to the orchards, river boats of the Riverland, the vines and tourist area of Mildura and even over the bridge to Victoria to visit Robinvale Euston. Moving up finally to the historic Broken hill where the Cattle kings live. All of these places have dedicated people who work for their community locally and overseas.

My Club is the Rotary club of Unley. I have friends who are not Rotarians but who are members of all sorts of clubs. They may be sporting clubs or others. I get to hear

about the footy mostly and always Crows and Port supporters are the loudest. I see they like to wear their clubs colours as we do. Our colours are blue and yellow by the way. And when my friends go to their footy match they eat hot dogs, pies, chips and drink beer, cheer on their club. They work out who the best players are and who works well in the BEST positions so the team has the BEST chance of success. A bit like our club really. They have a great time sharing this with their mates and the whole afternoon is spent having fun.

Tuesday night is my Club night which I share with MY mates and we have a meal and most times quests speakers on all sorts of interesting subjects. We share ideas on projects or other matters.

We have fun and I am home by 8.30pm. The footy clubs charge a fee to join and this helps to run the club, to make sure the Club is a success. Rotary International is the same, but at around \$4 a night I think I'm ahead. The footy clubs have sponsors. So do we and with Bill Gates giving us \$2 for every \$1 we raise, to help eliminate Polio off the Planet, I think HE thinks that Rotary is really worth backing.

Footy clubs raise money to benefit the people who love the game of footy and we Rotarians raise money to benefit the people who aren't as lucky as we are. We want to make the world a better place. Each Rotary Club works together to raise money for their own club, or giving their time and labour to projects locally or across the world. Each club is autonomous; clubs work on the programs and projects their members choose.

I joined Rotary because I wanted to work on overseas projects, my husband originally joined to meet people other than those at work. Some have joined to network, to challenge themselves to grow as a person in a non-competitive environment, there are lots of reasons people join Rotary, BUT we all stay for the same reason, because we love it.



District Secretary's Report

This is a busy time with many District events taking place and many more being planned.

A new invoicing procedure was introduced in January for Clubs to pay their semi-annual dues to Rotary International. This innovation appears to have been well accepted. Most Clubs have paid their dues, while currently 7 Clubs are in arrears.

Succession planning is a vital part of Rotary's operation. All Clubs have been encouraged and cajoled to enter the details of their incoming Club Officers for the 2015 - 2016 Rotary year on the Rotary International database. Currently, 4 Clubs have still to nominate an incoming Club President.

District training for the incoming team is well underway. A successful District Leaders' Training session was held in February, and the President Elect Training Seminar and the District Assembly will be held in March.

The District Conference will be held next month in Ballarat. A number of interesting and entertaining speakers have been assembled in a first class venue. Rotarians who have still to register are encouraged to do so as soon as possible.

Since July 1st, figures from Rotary International in Parramatta indicate that 43 new members have been inducted, but we have also lost 43 members during the same period, so our total District membership is currently 1,364, the same number with which we started the year.

To celebrate Rotary's 110th Birthday, a successful event was recently staged on the Torrens riverbank. The evening included musical entertainment, Rotary fare, a welcome from the State Governor, balloon release and 'Light Up Rotary' videos on the Telstra Plaza at the Adelaide Oval. It concluded with bagpipers leading a twilight procession carrying glow sticks onto the new footbridge, where they sang a hearty rendition of 'Happy Birthday.'

Planning is well underway for a Rotary Race Day at Morphettville Race Course in May. This will be an affordable family fun day for the whole family. The South Australian Derby for 3-year-old horses is the main race of the day, which will attract a good crowd. In addition, there will be several Rotary named races. So it will be an opportunity to showcase Rotary to the public and will highlight our causes, programs and projects from local clubs.

The Awards have been recognised across the country as regional Australia's largest and most successful vocational award program.

Apprenticeships and traineeships are vital to any community. They provide opportunities for our young people to gain sustainable employment skills in areas, such as building and construction, electrical, engineering, automotive, hairdressing, cooking and baking, printing and graphic arts and many other industry sectors. By providing apprenticeship and traineeship opportunities, local businesses not only ensure their own survival into the future, but help our community keep some of its best talent at home.

The Riverland and Mallee has somewhere in the vicinity of 600 apprentices and trainees currently in training. This includes apprentices in traditional trades as well as those undertaking traineeships in horticulture, agriculture, retail, clerical, health care, child care, transport, hospitality, information technology, management, wine production, fitness, food processing, animal care, beauty and real estate.

In recent years, generous financial support from both Federal and State Governments, has enabled local businesses to up skill and train many of their long term employees. This has provided opportunities for all Australians to




not only achieve Nationally Recognised Qualifications in their industry, but also be recognised for skills they have developed during their entire working life.

District 9520 in South Australia celebrated Rotary's 110th Birthday on the picturesque Pinky Flat Park on the Riverbank of the Torrens River in Adelaide on Sunday, 22nd February.

On a very hot 40°C day in South Australia the Torrens River bank was a very pleasant place to be for the Rotary Family Day picnic. Starting at 6 PM, people enjoyed affordable food provided by the Rotary Clubs of Brownhill Creek, with Pancakes, Burnside, with Greek foods and salad and drinks, Mitcham, Kranskys with cheese and roll and St Peters, with hot cinnamon donuts.

Free entertainment was provided by the Holdfast Bay Concert Band along with jugglers and a face painter painting children's faces. The promotion of End Polio Now by the sale of T-shirts and the blowing up of the balloons was done near the ShelterBox Tent which was set up for the public to see and was used for storage of the End Polio Now Balloons before their release.

Channel 7 were able to do the TV live weather cross with Tim Noonan showing the activities on the Riverbank with all the colourful Rotarians attire and the Balloons being held by Rotoractors in the background.

Led by the Rotoractors with Rotary International flags, we walked with the balloons up the path alongside the Torrens River with the State Governor. His Excellency the Honourable Hieu Van Le and his wife, Mrs Lan Le to the Adelaide Oval Riverbank Grandstand forecourt at twilight. The Grandstand's large TV screens showed the" Light up Rotary" logo before the playing of the video with Rotary International President, Gary C Huang talking about lighting up Rotary, by lighting one candle for each Rotarian to make a difference around the world.

We were welcomed by State Governor Hieu Van Le, with the Adelaide Oval Southern Grandstand being lit up in Rotary colours. Blue and Gold. His address to us about "Lighting up Rotary" was very moving with his experiences as a Rotarian. After, Rotarians and friends released 110 End Poilo Now Balloons which was a spectacular sight.

At dusk we had electronic candles and glow-sticks and then followed the Shed Bagpipers to the "Light up Rotary" walk across the new Torrens Riverbank footbridge.

This was a once in a life time event, in this year of the international year of light, for members of Rotary and their friends to help celebrate Rotary's 110th Anniversary and all the good work that Rotary does around the world.

The biggest and most exciting job in my Rotary life!

The Rotary Club of Hindmarsh Island was the last club chartered in our district, but sadly, it is also one of seven clubs to hand in its charter over the last ten years, along with Reynella, St. Marys, Glen Osmond, Morphettville, and most recently Marion and Lameroo.

Rotary continues to grow at a staggering rate in some parts of the world, including India, South Korea, Germany, Taiwan, Brazil and in many smaller African and Asian

countries. But for much of the western world, it is more common for clubs to disappear than to charter. But every now and then an opportunity presents itself, even if not overtly.

As a long-time resident of Adelaide's outer southern suburbs, I have watched the urban sprawl rapidly creep ever closer to Sellicks Hill, the southernmost point of the Adelaide plains where the coast and the hills meet, the point at which the sprawl will one day stop. or must at least slow down.

In this time I've seen the coastal region from Seaford down to Aldinga grow to become a busy and thriving, yet family friendly community, nestled between the hills, the vines of the McLaren Vale region and the pristine beaches where my kids have splashed joyously. They have also participated in gymnastics at the Seaford Recreation Centre, have floated down the end of the Onkaparinga River where it winds gently into the sea at Southport Beach, and they've climbed all over the massive wooden playground at Jubilee Park in Port Noarlunga South. It really is a fabulous community, but there's just one more thing that could make this community even more special. A Rotary presence.

I am delighted to announce that we have commenced the process of chartering our district's newest Rotary club in Seaford. The Seaford / Aldinga region is the second fastest growing in South Australia, second only to the massive growth around Munno Para and Smithfield to the north of the city. But unlike Adelaide's outer northern suburbs which lie in District 9500, the expanding south is part of D9520, and the perfect region to launch a new Rotary Club. The recent completion of duplication work to the Southern Expressway and extension of the Noarlunga train line to Seaford have helped make the region more attractive to those travelling into the city and inner metropolitan suburbs for work.

It is customary for new Rotary clubs to be sponsored by existing Rotary clubs, but this initiative will be taken on directly by the District Membership Committee. We are under no illusions with regard to the scale of this task. There is a lot of hard work ahead of us, but we are driven and committed to this exciting venture. We need to find 25 new members before we can even approach RI to charter the club, but we will give this one ... Cont on page 9


hell of a crack. We want to build Australia's newest and most exciting Rotary club, and it may not look like what we've come to expect of a Rotary club.



Recent Bushfires Support



Rotary Club of Brownhill Creek Rotary Club of Onkaparinga PDG Dick Cuttle Reporting

Rotarians are currently active in supporting people affected by the recent bushfires in the Kersbrook, Gumeracha, Kenton Valley areas. Members and friends from Onkaparinga and Brownhill Creek clubs already have 5 properties where work of some sort has been done, or is planned. This includes fencing, clearing of access roads, and cleaning up sheds and buildings

that were damaged or destroyed. Members from Onkaparinga continued work out in the Eden Valley fires until early November last year, and we expect that we will be able to offer support for at least a year, depending on the needs of land holders, and the number of volunteers we have.



We ask that land holders provide all materials, or work through the Recovery Centre if they need help in this regard. It has been said that insurance covers all damage to fences, buildings in paddocks, etc. We know that this is not the case, and that many land holders discover that their insurance covers only materials replacement. Some do not even have this cover for fencing. We are able to help these members

of our local community help them selves.

We will accept financial support, which is used for replacement and maintenance of the district tools and trailers, to replace safety equipment such as gloves and goggles, fuel for chain saws and generators, and paying for chain saw courses for our volunteers. Where volunteers come from further afield, we also offer token support for their fuel costs. All donations are handled in a separate account, and no money has been or will be used for any other purpose.
