Sad News! Nepal Orphanage.

Mark Bourchier (Pulteney Grammar School) has been in touch with Ishwor and below is his latest report. Things look pretty grim, but we are lucky that all of the children are safe.

"Thankfully, Ishwor was at the Orphanage when the first major earthquake hit, as Mother Rajan was away on business. This remarkable young man evacuated the 55 children to the veggie patch as both the Orphanage building and the new school building suffered significant damage and appear in imminent danger of collapse. Mother Rajan made her way back in the middle of the night and together they have kept the children safe and warm in the garden. sheltering under blankets as it is was raining intermittently. They did not sleep as constant aftershocks frightened the children.

They had a large bag of rice and have cooked this on an open fire to provide some sustenance for the children. A supply of bottled water has been secured for the short term.





Nepalese teenager Ishwor Ghimire studied at Pulteney on a full scholarship in 2013/14 and now mentors children at the orphanage while he prepares for university.

There is no power supply but late today they were able to borrow a small generator which will allow them to recharge their phones and provide a small amount of lighting at night.

Such is the level of destruction in the Kathmandu Valley, that they have not seen, nor expect to, any support from the military or police and fire services.

At the time of the earthquake, a painter working on the roof of the new school was thrown 2 storeys to the ground, sustaining dreadful injuries. After initially dealing with his 55 frightened young charges, Ishwor managed to get him to the local hospital in a taxi. His description of the scenes at the hospital was something no young person should have to deal with. We should all be very proud of him.

A local church has offered their small bamboo structure for the younger children to sleep in tonight and all of the kids have been lining up to use the single toilet at the church. Clearly, our first priority is to try to assist with accommodation and health requirements. Through several Old Scholars in the military we are endeavouring to source suitable tropical weather tents, and a mobile water purification system, and then to deliver these items post haste.

Should the orphanage need to be demolished, it may be impossible to retrieve it's contents prior to destruction and this will bring another level of needed support.

Our good friend Prem Oli, Headmaster of Blue Sky School, has been in touch several times today and I include his recent posts:

Sunday am: "We are all fine till now. We slept in open land, wake up whole night. More than 1500 people are killed, but no detail report. There was earthquake at 5AM too. All the things of kitchen crashed. I do not know what happened in science lab or computer lab at school. There was another shake just 5 minutes ago. We are out of home for 18 hours. I have come at home now to check mails. It is told there will more."

Sunday pm: "It was again strong hit at 1PM today with 6.8 rector . Many buildings broke down. We are safe. We are sleeping in the open land whole night. People are not living at their home . More than 2000 people are killed. But there is to come detail report. many world heritage are destroyed.'

Power and hence communication by phone and internet have been seriously disrupted in the city. We await further information from Prem, as to how we might assist his community.

For those who have travelled to Kathmandu, the media coverage of the destruction of centuries old historic sites, aside obviously, from the loss of life, is horrific."

From Joy to Disaster in Two months! **PDG Malcolm Lindquist**

On the 22nd February the Rotary community and family and friends of the late David Rusk celebrated the opening of the newly constructed school on the outskirts of Kathmandu. The school caters for 55 dalit (untouchable) orphans who live in the adjacent orphanage, which was constructed in 2007, and other local students. The school was constructed entirely by funds donated locally in Australia. See photo (orphanage on the left school on the right)

On the 25th April disaster struck with the earthquake causing substantial structural damage to the school and orphanage leaving the children, who were thankfully not harmed, homeless.

It is hoped that the buildings will be able to be repaired rather than demolished but it is estimated that this will require around \$200,000.

So, what's this talk of pizza got to do with Rotary?


Ham & Pineapple Rotary

My son can be a particularly picky eater. One of his favourite meals is ham and pineapple pizza. We occasionally make pizza at home, and I wouldn't ever bother putting anything on his pizza but ham and pineapple, because he would just pick it off. Occasionally we grab a pizza when we're out, and that's exactly what he does —

picks off anything and everything that is not ham or pineapple. I sort of think ham and pineapple pizzas are a bit on the boring side, but he just loves them that way.

So, what's this talk of pizza got to do with Rotary?

If my Rotary International experience was a pizza, it would be a super supreme. There's a bit of everything and I just woof it down. If I think of my greatest Rotary experiences, it's hard to



But apart from me, there were only 228 other Rotarians from our district who made the trip (over 20 of whom were working behind the scenes to make the show happen). Accompanying partners and guests took the attendance to well over the 300 mark, but I've been scratching my head, wondering why only 229 Rotarians out of a total district membership of 1,369 would come to such an amazing event. **That's just under 17%**.

Many Rotarians cannot get away from work commitments. I ran a catering business for 5 years, and wiping out a weekend meant saying no to 5 or 6 functions, and at the time, I just couldn't do it. Affordability is also an issue. Whilst the registration cost is quite reasonable, accommodation, petrol and meals all add up. Some Rotarians are getting on in years and their health precludes their attendance at such events, and sometimes the conference will clash with other important events in our lives, so it's just not possible. I get that. But I feel the overwhelming majority of people who elect not to attend a district conference are just not interested in "super supreme" Rotary. They like ham and pineapple Rotary, and will pick off anything that's not ham or pineapple.

District Assembly and the many other training events offer more variety to the Rotary pizza too, as do visits to other clubs, attendance at other club fundraising events, or district events like the 110th Birthday or the Rotary Race Day. Taking on a role at district level is like walking into a pizza shop – there is just so much variety on offer. You can choose what roles take your interest, and take advantage of your expertise. It's just like choosing which extra toppings you want on your pizza.



Think of the pizza analogy from a recruitment perspective too. We need to offer a broad range of pizza at our pizza shop, because the customers wouldn't walk through the front door if ham and pineapple was the only variety on the menu.

But here's the kicker. If you never even try those extra toppings, you'll never know what you're missing out on.

I fear that so many Rotarians are not getting the most out of their Rotary experience, and many end up leaving the organisation because ham and pineapple got a little bit boring after a few years. Rotary has so much to offer beyond weekly meetings. Not everything is for everyone. Even I will pick the olives off my pizza. But you'll never know how good pizza can be if you pick off everything that's not ham or pineapple.





SOUTH PACIFIC AT DIK

The South Pacific was represented at the Donations in Kind (DIK) warehouse on 29 November - not so much as a musical but as a working bee. Following earlier container projects to Fiji with the Fiji Association of South Australia (FASA), a group of 33 Pacific Islanders came to the DIK warehouse facility at Edinburgh Parks to help

with the goods stored there. This included volunteers from PNG, Tonga. Kiribati, Cook Is, Tuvalu, as well as Fiji. They joined seven Rotarians and partners from Rotary Clubs of Noarlunga East and Gawler Light and five from the DIK committee.



DIK had previously helped FASA get two containers of donated goods to the needy in Fiji, one following the devastating storm in 2012. Another is on the cards for early in 2015. The Rotary Club of Noarlunga East is part of District 9520's Group 5 clubs. This Group has an approved Grant to assist getting an ambulance to Tonga as a part of a container project. This project is planned to be done in 2015 with the help of the SA Ambulance Service providing the ambulance and other medical goods coming from DIK stock.

A special invite for the day was extended to the Rotary Club of Gawler Light's two newest Rotarians (inducted four days previously),

lan and Marilyn Curtis as they were ex-Rotarians from the Rotary Club of Suva North in Fiji and had lived for many years in both Fiji and PNG. This gave them a good opportunity to share Islander stories, as well as doing an excellent job cleaning part of the warehouse!

A BBQ lunch provided a great fellowship opportunity for all. It also gave DIK Chairman, Dave Cockshell, an opportunity to outline the wide range of container projects to the South Pacific Islands that the RAWCS Central Region DIK programme had coordinated. In recent years these include PNG, Fiji, Tuvalu, Kiribati, Philippines and Vanuatu.

Overall the day was a great success. Over 80% of the jobs on the task list for the day were completed. This makes a big difference for the DIK committee in managing the site and the very dynamic movement of donated goods into and

out of the facility to needy communities. The day provided an excellent opportunity for fellowship and goodwill with many island nations represented.

In 2015 Australian Rotary Health enters its 34th year of existence, thanks to the foresight of Rotarian Ian Scott. From those origins in May 1981 the Fund has established itself as the main Community Service arm of Rotary in Australia. Since 2000, the main objective of Australian Rotary Health has been to increase knowledge and awareness of Mental Illness, and in that time approximately \$27,000,000 has been put into Mental Illness research.

Thanks to Rotarians in District 9520 for their support of Australian Rotary Health as our District has now contributed over \$1.4 million dollars into the fund.

It is with some sadness that this year we saw the passing of PP Geoff Bailey OAM. Geoff was a member of the Rotary club of Mitcham and a recipient of the Australian Rotary Health Medal. Due to his work the Indigenous Health Scholarship program came into existence in 2000 and has enabled many Indigenous people to enter the health care profession in its various forms. As a consequence of that past Premier Dean Brown was also honoured with the Australian Rotary Health medal, for his government's financial support to the Indigenous scholarship program in 2002. There are now over 192 students who have successfully completed their training due to the Scholarship program. Geoff and his contribution will always be remembered.

Trainee Award Programme

The Rotary Encounter Bay have just implemented their Trainee Award Program with cosponsors Eat@Whalers and Victa Cinemas. The aim of this award is to promote excellence in the workplace in Victor Harbor.

Businesses are asked to nominate one of their trainees who they think are worthy of the award each month. The monthly award given to the trainee is a meal voucher for \$100 from Eat @ Whalers and a 2 cinema tickets from Victa Cinemas. The judging will be done by Statewide Training, the VHBA committee and the Rotary Vocational committee.

At the end of the year the businesses who successfully nominated their trainee will be asked to submit another nomination with updated details of the trainees' performance over the year. The 12 monthly winners will then be judged by the same judges. The winner of the award will be given \$500 and then, upon presentation of an invoice from a Tertiary Institution, up to \$3,500 will be paid to that institution for ongoing educational fees. This can also be paid to a business if the business is paying the education fees for their trainee.

At the end of the year the businesses which successfully nominated their trainee will be asked to submit another nomination with updated details of the trainees' performance



over the year. The 12 monthly winners will then be judged by the same judges. The winner of the award will be given \$500 and then, upon presentation of an invoice from a Tertiary Institution, up to \$3,500 will be paid to that institution for ongoing educational fees. This can also be paid to a business if the business is paying the education fees for their trainee.

Any trainee, in any position, can be entered, from trades to IT to butchers, bakers and candlestick makers! And there is no age restriction on the award.

Jamie Dwyer is the first recipient of the new Rotary Club of Encounter Bay Trainee award. Jamie, an employee of Fleurieu Crash Repairs, was chosen from an excellent field of applicants for the April award and now qualifies for the Trainee of the year award. Jamie has taken considerable initiative in improving company security, learning the roles of others so that she can cover for them in their absence, undertaking a first aid course in her own time, and has improved the business filing system. She is punctual, well groomed, and gives her best at all times. She has been successful in building her qualifications through TAFE and is both customer focused and future oriented.
