

September was New Generations Month (YOUTH SERVICE) and I am taking this opportunity to showcase two programs. This past week saw the celebration of RYLA 2013, a cast of 40 young adults supported by an exceptional team of Directors and an incredible array of speakers (see below photos). I won't steal RYLA Chairman Peter Poulton's thunder but it was an exceptional seminar, and Peter and his team are to be commended. My thanks to the clubs who nominated and supported an awardee and to those clubs who took up Peter's challenge and agreed to sponsor an awardee. Comments from Awardees at Graduation bore testament to the value of this program, new friends, new experiences, skills and confidence.

A special mention to President Betty Gebert, Merbein who accepted Peter's challenge to sponsor Xing Ting an International Student at Adelaide University. Betty and Trevor travelled to Adelaide especially to attend and share graduation with Xing Ting and to confirm a speaking date in December.

Saturday 28th saw the Rotary Club of Murray Bridge head north on their annual "Go Bush with Rotary" a program which invites children to join in on a camping holiday in the outback. Into an environment with few modern facilities, no "switch on" entertainment, where the participants are encouraged to exercise their imaginations, to communicate with each other and adults in a relaxed environment. The program aims to provide children who would not otherwise be able to have a bush holiday, reinforce social values and help children develop strategies in situations where they may be placed at risk, to encourage communication and trust. Provide positive adult role models, and provide situations where interpersonal and social skills can be developed. Now in its 10th year this program continues to change lives.

Inspired by the stories of Dr Hamlin and her life work to give dignity back to thousands of women injured during child birth. Who she describes as "the poorest of the poor, alone in the world without hope, without friends. The bear their sorrows in silent shame. Their miseries, untreated, are utterly lonely and lifelong. Rotarian Sue McKay commenced a journey that would give meaning to the year's theme - make dreams real.

Two years later and with the advent of Global Grants Sue and the Rotary Club of Victor Harbor have delivered a successful project which will provide the funding for three (3) midwifery degrees, ensuring the continuance in high quality medical care during childbirth and funds to provide corrective surgery to 20 women afflicted by fistula.
