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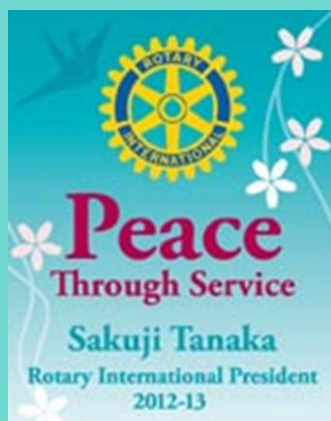
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The Challenge of Change!

new online goal-setting tool for club and district leaders, launches

Rotary Club Central, an online tool to help club and district leaders set and track goals, launched last week. It gives Rotary a better way to measure the impact Rotarians are making worldwide.

The new tool empowers club and district leaders to monitor club progress and achievements in three key performance areas: membership initiatives, service activities, and Rotary Foundation giving.

Rotary Club Central includes charts that track membership retention and Annual Fund giving over the past five years. District leaders can view a summary of club progress.

Club leaders are encouraged to log in to [Member Access](#) and enter their data in Rotary Club Central so that club members, the district governor, and assistant governors can see it.

This year we have funded projects addressing the issues and causation of indigenous mental health, which is 2-3 times higher than the rest of Australia, furthered research into the effects of prenatal hormone exposure on mental health, and financed the first online therapy program to investigate the treatment of preschool children with anxiety.

By continuing to fund research that uncovers possible causes of mental illness, Australian Rotary Health brings the possibility of prevention all the more closer.

Meet Penni Hamilton-Smith

Penni for your thoughts...



President of the Rotary Club of Mitcham, shares some of her thoughts on Rotary.

Penni first became involved in Rotary when she moved to Darwin in 2000. Not knowing too many people in her new home, it was her mother, a member of the Rotary Club of Eastwood, who suggested she give Rotary a go. After expressing an interest in joining the Rotary Club of Darwin North, a group of senior members met with Penni to explain how membership worked and answer all of her questions. One of these Rotarians was Earl James OAM, a well respected long time Darwinian who had been a surveyor and had surveyed most of the Northern Territory.

"I came to realise the calibre of people who are Rotarians, the kind of people who I would not come across in my daily life or in my profession as a Child Care centre manager.", says Penni.

"It was a great honour to be accepted by this fine group of people. I was hooked. Rotary became the highlight of my week and my life. It was so much fun to be involved in community activities and to be a treasured member of such a wonderful group."

Penni returned to Adelaide in 2004 and her brother, an honorary member of the Rotary Club of Mitcham, introduced her to the club. Once again she was hooked. This club was very different, but with members who were just as warm, just as welcoming and just as special.

"Being a Rotarian is important to me. After my family and my work, Rotary comes next in my life. Because of Rotary I am able to assist the community in ways that I would never be able to alone. Because of Rotary I can have influence on the way that decisions are made about how and whom to assist. Because of Rotary my life is full of friends and of people who need me. I think of others rather than myself and am constantly challenged to become a better person. Rotary is an integral part of the community both locally, nationally and internationally, and that Rotarians all over the world are striving to make that world a better place."

Penni works as an interviewer with Roy Morgan and is also a Civil Celebrant performing "hatch, match and dispatch" ceremonies.

NEW GENERATIONS YOUTH EXCHANGE

Rotarians and Friends of Rotary – Youth Exchange needs your support.

The month of September is New Generations month and a significant part of this Avenue of Service is Youth Exchange.

We can all experience this program in some way, either in our own club or at district level. My wife and I have been involved in this aspect of Rotary for a number of years and the satisfaction gained makes us wonder why the majority of Rotarians find reasons not to support it.

It is very easy to say we are too old, or to see an occasional problem and use the answer as an excuse to do nothing. As a result some young people miss out on the opportunity Rotary is trying to provide. All it takes is effort (as many other Rotary programs need) and we can achieve a result.

One difficulty raised can be identifying host families. These need not be Rotarians but must be of good character and meet the Rotary criteria. Several clubs have found this has also resulted in new members.

Most exchange students, both inbound and outbound get a fantastic experience and develop skills they never dreamed possible. The benefits of youth exchange for our young people were highlighted recently in an article in the "Advertiser" newspaper about Hannah Kent. Hannah was 17 years of age when she undertook a Rotary exchange to a fishing village in Iceland. Whilst there she heard the story of Agnes Magnúsdóttir, a convicted murderer beheaded in 1830, which piqued her interest. Hannah returned home and researched the case for her PhD in creative writing at Flinders University. As a result, she has won an international publishing deal which will see her book released all over the world. A wonderful example of an Exchange Student who has grasped her experience and gone on to success. It is very noticeable that all the students seem to return to Australia with much more self reliance and confidence.



Inbound students also gain a lot of skills to assist in their development in later years. The two young ladies pictured are enjoying surfing lessons at Smiths Beach on Phillip Island in Victoria. Anna is from Brazil and Celine from Belgium. They were in Australia about two years ago and, through the advent of "Facebook" and other media, have remained friends since their time in South Australia. Also both have gone on to university where they are performing well. Both have also assisted Australian exchange students visiting their countries to assimilate into their communities.

And it is not just the young ladies and men that benefit. Through the ongoing involvement with Rotary Youth Exchange Rotarians will gain many young friends, learn a lot of things about other countries and enjoy experiences that all Rotarians can benefit from. There is also a lot of satisfaction from being involved with the young people.

NEW GENERATIONS MONTH AND YOUTH PROTECTION

New Generations programs and initiatives are something Rotary International has been increasingly putting more emphasis on culminating last year in the adoption of New Generations as the fifth Rotary Avenue of Service. The District Youth Protection Committee is an important cog in our district's increasing emphasis on youth programs and DG Roy felt this month was an appropriate time to explain to Rotarians the role of this relatively new committee and how its duties have evolved over recent years.

The Youth Protection Committee commenced in District 9520 under DG Bob Northcote in 2006. This was as a result of direction from RI that all districts should have such a committee. The inaugural chair was David Binks who had at that time recently chaired an Australian-wide committee drawing up policies and procedures adopted nationally to protect youth exchange students.

Because of the importance of this role this committee plays in the district David felt the committee should include the DG, and the DGE. This was later extended to include the DG Nominee and (when known) the DG Nominee Nominee. These officers along with a chair who has had extensive involvement with youth and a couple of other Rotarians committed to looking after young people now form the committee. The newly appointed committee chair is Bruce Partridge formerly the chair of Youth Exchange in our district. Other duties RI strongly recommends or requires districts now have been added recently to the duties of the committee and are now incorporated in its title.

The Duties of District 9520 Youth Protection Committee incorporating Crisis Management, Risk Management & Document Review Committees

1. To investigate all cases or suspected cases of abuse or harassment (sexual, physical or mental) occurring in Rotary programs or clubs unless the police are currently investigating the matter
2. To provide support for victims of harassment or abuse in Rotary clubs or programs in accordance with RI guidelines which include
 - a. assistance from Rotary as needed or requested
 - b. If requested independent non-Rotary counselling at Rotary's expense
 - c. if requested independent non-Rotary legal assistance at rotary's expense
 - d. facilitate any claims a victim may have on Rotary's molestation Insurance
3. To train and coordinate the training of all Rotarians, particularly Rotarians and others involved in our youth programs. The training is to be in accordance with our policies submitted to and approved by RI for protecting youth in Rotary programs, i.e.
 - a. "Rotary District 9520 Club Certification and District Certification Policy Procedures and supplementary documentation for protecting Youth Exchange Students (incorporating RANZSE exchange) January 2012
 - b. "Rotary District 9520 Guide to Protecting Youth involved in Short Rotary Programs January 2012"

This training based, where applicable, on the RI training manual to be implemented and coordinated in any practical way but in particular

- a. at district assemblies and district conferences
- b. through AG's talking to clubs or club presidents within their groups
- c. by Youth Protection Committee members talking directly to clubs
- d. through information forwarded to clubs and those Rotarians responsible for the various district youth programs
- e. through youth district committee members visiting and talking to clubs or people involved in youth programs (particularly Youth Exchange Committee members talking to clubs and talking at Youth Exchange "Home Briefings")
- f. members of the Youth Protection Committee talking separately to both inbound and outbound youth exchange students and parents and counsellors at the Youth Exchange Briefing Day

The Rotary Club of Broken Hill hosts a Breakfast Meeting on Men's Health

In November 2011 the rain came to western NSW and the planned Rotary Club night at the Broken Hill Gun Club was treated to travelling guest speaker who was stranded in the Hill. He entertained the mixed crowd and transfixed them with his handling of sensitive men's health issues.

In July 2012 this speaker, Steve Carroll, returned to complete his mission to talk to the men of the outback and to talk to the 'tough' miners at Perilya Broken Hill.

Chris Anderson saw the great chance to get people together under the Rotary banner and engage them in looking after themselves. He worked with the staff of Lifeline and the Democratic Club to set up a breakfast meeting at 7am on 24th July. It got some people out of bed earlier than usual, it got husbands and wives together talking about health and every one of the 55 people who attended started the day with a laugh.



The Men's Health Workshop topics included cardio-vascular health, testicular cancer, diabetes, prostate disease, mental health, sexual dysfunction, diet and exercise. The presentation aimed to empower men to take an active involvement in their own health. The "take home message" was that small changes to life style will translate into bigger outcomes that will impact in a positive way on the man, his family and the community.



The morning has been voted a success for several reasons;

- A unique event got a significant number of people into a social setting they rarely if ever experience
- Approximately 20% of the men who attended have had a complete check up for the first time
- Up to 10 potential new members of Rotary have been identified.

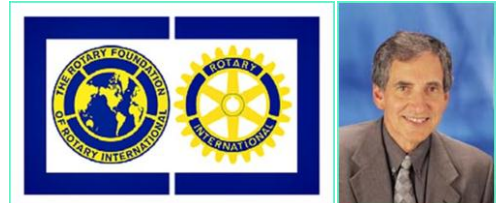
On the Saturday night the students showed their appreciation by cooking a 7 course international dinner for the club and station staff.
