The new Satellite club policy provides a new way to create Rotary clubs. A Satellite club functions as a short-term, transitional step on the path to becoming a full, independent Rotary club.

For a club to apply to have a Satellite club they will receive an application sent to Club and District Support via the sponsor club president.

There is no minimum number needed to start a Satellite club. There is also no maximum number of members.

Succession planning is part of the regular management procedures to ensure ongoing development of your Rotary Club. Leaders need time to prepare themselves for key positions in your Rotary Club.

Club vibrancy is encouraged when you identify your incoming President, Secretary and Treasurer very early in the planning cycle.

Many Rotary Clubs use their Annual General Meeting in December to identify their leaders for the coming Rotary Year. This allows time for training, and developing a mindset for taking on a key role in the organisation. Some Clubs do leave their succession planning to the new calendar year, and I believe this is too late. Give your leaders a chance to undertake adequate preparation by identifying your incoming leaders early.
