### **Holding a Rotary Day**

President Gary C.K. Huang is encouraging clubs and districts to sponsor or participate in a Rotary Day event in 2014 – 15 to introduce non-Rotarians to Rotary. District Governors are encouraged to award clubs that undertake such events this Rotary year.

'The Rotary Day concept is a simple one. Hold a fun, informal event in your community for the non-Rotary public and use it as an opportunity to introduce them to Rotary. It's that easy,' Huang



says. 'Rotary Days can help your club to drive up interest in membership, strengthen your club's relationships with local institutions and community members and improve Rotary's image in your community.'

Suggested activities include: holding a local festival, picnic or BBQ; organizing a service project and opening the event to the public; invite the community to plant a Rotary Day garden.

There are plans underway to hold a District Rotary Day together with District 9500. More details will follow as planning advances.

#### **POLIO UPDATE**



Polio eradication efforts are moving the world closer than ever to becoming polio-free. Afghanistan, one of three remaining polio-endemic countries along with Nigeria and Pakistan, had just 14 cases of polio in 2013, compared with 27 in 2012. Nigeria reported 53 cases last year, down significantly from 122 the year before.

Pakistan is the only endemic country where the number of cases rose in 2013, to 93 from 58 in 2012. In response to the continued challenges, community and religious leaders there have expressed their support for polio-eradication campaigns.

There was good news in March, when the World Health Organisation (WHO) certified the Southeast Asia region as polio-free. The 11-country region

includes India, Sri Lanka, Maldives and Bhutan and is home to more than 1.8 billion people and over 25 percent of the world's population.


