# Nepal Dalit Women Upliftment Centre Orphanage School

The Nepal Dalit Women Upliftment Centre Orphanage School has provided a safe, secure and loving home for about 100 poor, abandoned and orphaned Dalit (Untouchable) girls and boys, aged 3 to 17 years.



The Rotary Clubs of Brownhill Clubs and Dillibazar-Ktm (Nepal) have been long-term supporters of the Orphanage and new School, which only opened in February.

Tragically, the School and Orphanage were very severely damaged in the recent earthquakes. Currently 55 children, who were already without parents are now homeless and need urgent assistance.

# ShelterBox - Christmas in July

### HISTORY

ShelterBox was founded in 2000 in Cornwall, UK. That same year the Rotary Club of Helston-Lizard adopted it as our millennium project. Little did they know that it would become a Rotary project partner, with an ever-growing number of international affiliates.



The first consignment of 143 boxes was sent to earthquake victims in the Indian state of Gujarat in January 2001. Over the next three years the project matured and by the end of 2004 nearly 2,600 boxes had been dispatched, following 16 major disasters. On 26 December 2004, news came of the devastating Indian Ocean Tsunami and we faced our most significant challenge, one that would change our course forever. Donations and volunteers poured in and ShelterBox were able to ramp up operations on a scale unimaginable just six months earlier.

### CHRISTMAS IN JULY

The ShelterBox Christmas in July dinner will facilitate Kent Town and our partners to seek donations to purchase shelter boxes so to provide emergency aid for victims overwhelmed by disaster and humanitarian crisis disasters at home and around the world. In 2013 the Rotary Club of Kent Town raised sufficient funds to purchase 5 ShelterBoxes, this year we are aiming for fifteen. ShelterBox Australia is an affiliate of ShelterBox International. The Rotary Club of Kent Town has supported ShelterBox since 2007 with total donations exceeding \$27,000.

### WHAT?

In 2005 ShelterBox sent out more than 22,000 boxes, almost 10 times the number they had sent out in the previous three years. Not only were they sending aid to survivors of the Tsunami, but were also able to help those who had lost their homes in Hurricane Katrina in the USA and the massive earthquake that hit the Kashmir region of Pakistan.



Aid was sent after the Haiti earthquake, the Syria crisis, and the biggest storm to ever make landfall — Typhoon Haiyan in the Philippines; ShelterBox have responded to some of the largest humanitarian crises the modern world has ever known. Alongside this, ShelterBox have also helped many thousands of people displaced by disasters that are not featured in the media. Simply put, if there are families in need of emergency shelter, ShelterBox will do everything we can to help them.

### THE VISION

A world in which all people displaced by disasters and humanitarian crises are rapidly provided with emergency shelter and vital aid, which will help rebuild their communities and lives.



### THE MISSION

To rapidly provide emergency shelter and vital aid to stabilise, protect and support communities overwhelmed by disaster and humanitarian crisis. The objective is to provide emergency shelter for up to 500,000 people every year.



### How?



For each \$1,000 donated, a shelter box will be delivered when and where needed. This includes all materials, packing, transport and distribution to recipients worldwide and a contribution to stock in readiness for the next disaster ShelterBox is called to respond to. Each box bears its own unique number so donors can track their box all the way to the recipient country via ShelterBox's website. Highly trained ShelterBox Response Teams distribute boxes on the ground, working closely with local organisations, international aid agencies and Rotary clubs worldwide.

ShelterBox provides emergency shelter and vital supplies to support communities around the world overwhelmed by disaster and humanitarian crisis. Every year hundreds and thousands of communities, often with no warning, lose their homes, their possessions and their livelihoods. Every day they are faced with a battle for survival.

# Rotary Oceanic Medical Aid for Children





Since its inception by a Rotary District in Victoria in 1987 this humanitarian program has been adopted and supported by all Districts in Australia and New Zealand and has provided over 400 children from more than 20 developing countries in the Oceania region with urgent medical treatment that has saved their lives or given them new hope for a better life. It is run only by volunteer Rotarians.

I am pleased to remind clubs and Rotarians that unlike other similar medical programs, as good as they may be, that ROMAC is the only one that has been approved and supported by Rotary International and proudly displays the Rotary Logo. ROMAC is assisted by many eminent Australian and New Zealand surgeons who without the program could not function and like the Rotarians that run ROMAC usually very generously donate their time for the treatment of our patients. Our Patrons include the Governor of South Australia His Excellency the Honourable Hieu Van Le AO.

District 9520 and 9500, Central Region, is one of six regions including New Zealand. The joint district committee is chaired by PDG Alun Hughes from the Rotary Club of Salisbury in District 9500. Other committee members volunteer to be on the committee from the Rotary Clubs of Burnside, Hallett Cove, Brownhill Creek, Somerton Park, Tea Tree Gully and Elizabeth.

The most recent patients in the Central Region have come from Timor Leste and have been hosted by the Rotary Clubs of Hallett Cove and Burnside and one due to the urgency was housed at Ronald McDonald House at North Adelaide and the other due to very short notice was housed at a University student residence in the suburb of Rose Park. These patients were all treated in the Adelaide Women and Children's hospital.

Our next patient will be arriving sometime in July for treatment in the Memorial Hospital and the committee are seeking a host Rotary Club and family. Patients arrive with a parent who looks after their personal needs. The host family are required to house and feed them and the host club record in their board minutes the names of the patient and carer so they are covered by Rotary Insurance and assist in transporting their charges to a from the hospital. All Rotarian's who come in contact with the child must have National Police Check clearances. Usually the host club covers the cost of caring for the patient/carer as a donation to ROMAC but some costs can be claimed from ROMAC if required.
