ShelterBox Kits Arrive in Nepal

There are smiles in these photos, as the arrival of 39 tons of ShelterBox aid brings hope to remote villages in earthquake-shattered Nepal.

International disaster relief charity ShelterBox is gearing up its operation in the uplands of Nepal. In the early hours of this morning 39 tons of much-needed shelter aid left Kathmandu's busy airport, heading in trucks up steep winding roads towards the mountain district of Sindhupalchowk.

This shipment contains 500 family tents, made to United Nations specifications. There are also 500 ShelterBox shelter kits, containing tools to help clear rubble and saw wood, and – most importantly –

waterproof tarpaulins and fixings to create basic, dry shelters, or to make the best of habitable parts of damaged buildings.

They will soon be on their way to selected sites among Sindhupalchowk's 79 village communities, among the highest inhabited altitudes in the world.

ShelterBox is working with the Nepal Red Cross to distribute the aid to families in remote areas badly affected by the earthquake. Helicopters still come and go, airlifting people in need of medical assistance, and carrying aid to

communities that can be reached only by air or on foot.

ShelterBox has strengthened its Nepal team in recent days, and now has twelve people working in country.

In addition to today's consignment of 1,000 tents and kits, 53 ShelterBoxes are already in Nepal, with a further 1,500 now in transit. 500 more shelter kits are landing this afternoon, and a further 1,736 are in Dubai awaiting charter flights. ShelterBox already had 72 ShelterBoxes in Kathmandu when the earthquake struck, as it had responded to flooding and landslides in Nepal last autumn. The tents from those boxes are being used as outdoor clinic space in four Kathmandu hospitals, and now in Chautara.

ShelterBox Chief Executive Alison Wallace says, 'ShelterBox responded rapidly to this disaster, and had the practical advantage of having some aid already in the country, which had an instant use to create extra hospital space. Kathmandu brings its own challenges, and now our teams are working with colleague charities on plans to get to the hardest-to-reach mountain communities. The flow of incoming aid is getting faster, and we now have substantial stock already in country, and much more on the way.'



'This organisation runs on generosity and compassion, and we are seeing both on a grand scale in our response to the Nepal earthquake. I want to thank everyone involved for their time and energy, and donations, which will be needed for many weeks to come.'

Nepal Dalit Women Upliftment Centre Orphanage School

The Nepal Dalit Women Upliftment Centre Orphanage School has provided a safe, secure and loving home for about 100 poor, abandoned and orphaned Dalit (Untouchable) girls and boys, aged 3 to 17 years.



The Rotary Clubs of Brownhill Clubs and Dillibazar-Ktm (Nepal) have been long-term supporters of the Orphanage and new School, which only opened in February.

Tragically, the School and Orphanage were very severely damaged in the recent earthquakes. Currently 55 children, who were already without parents are now homeless and need urgent assistance.

Australian Rotary Health

Shaping the Future Health of Australians, Today

Australian Rotary Health has a history of influencing the health of future Australians through their pioneering research.

In 2006, Professor Michael Good developed a vaccine for Malaria with funding from Australian Rotary Health. Professor Good's studies showed that the vaccine protected animals from severe disease/death caused by different parasites. In 2009 he won Australia's top science award, the Eureka Prize. Then in 2010 he began a five-year Australia Fellowship at Griffith University to develop this vaccine into a form suitable for human trials. A human vaccination for Malaria is expected soon.

In 2007, Australian Rotary Health funded the development of two pioneering e-therapy

interventions called *Panic Online* and *PTSD Online*, where both resources produced either as good or better results than existing offline therapies. *PTSD Online* produced major clinical improvements in people with PTSD and required far less therapist time than traditional face-to-face treatment. This pioneering work then led to the development of *Mental Health Online*, now a Government-funded



website which provides free information, assessment, online diagnosis and treatment for a range of anxiety disorders.

The Mental Health Online website

In 2008, an Australian Rotary Health study revealed that men's behaviour change groups reduced domestic violence behaviour in 91% of men involved; 69% of men stopped all violence completely and a further 22% reduced the level of violence they inflicted. This study was an Australian first in assessing the relevance of male intervention programs, and produced understanding of what drives men towards domestic violence. Results were used by Lifeworks (one of the largest providers of behaviour change programs in Australia) to increase government support for domestic violence interventions and broaden pathways into the program for both perpetrators and their families.

Each year, Australian Rotary Health receives 300 Grant applications for studies, which could change the future of Australian health. However, only 10 studies (3.3%) can be awarded successful funding. Australian Rotary Health encourages Rotarians in Australia to consider an end of financial year donation for future Research Project Grants.
