Clubs will be starting to plan for their changeover functions in June or July. A new Rotary year brings many new Club leaders. However many Clubs have still not reported all their incoming Club Officers. It is very important that these Officers and their email addresses are entered in My Rotary to ensure that communication to Clubs continues smoothly with the changes in Club leadership.

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library



What is it?

The program is an Early Literacy initiative that improves educational opportunities for children from birth to 5 years of age by giving them access to a free age appropriate book each month. It also provides their parents/caregivers literacy tips and resources an how to engage in early literacy with the child.

Rotary International has partnered with a number of organisations including Penguin books, Love2Read, Good Beginnings Australia and United Way to support this program.

How does it work?

An organisation such as a Rotary Club signs up with United Way to become a Community Partner and as such agrees to identify the children in their identified community that will be involved and to sign up the parents of those children. A club may start with a pilot group by identifying a specific age or community cohort. The club agrees to provide the funding necessary to provide the specific number of children with their monthly book.

Once enrolled, United Way in partnership with Penguin Books deliver the books and resources free of charge to each child and family.

Has it worked?

Since its inception, the Imagination Library has reached more than 1 million children across the United Kingdom, the United States, Canada, and now Australia. Statistics show that the program drastically improves early childhood literacy, and increasing access to quality books regardless of family income, and increasing the overall amount of time children are engaged in reading activities.



How much does it cost?



The cost is \$6.50 per month per child so the overall cost to the club will depend on the number of children they enrol. There is an understanding that the club will commit to fund the program for a minimum period of years. Clubs can add additional children into the program at any time.

How is the club recognised?

The club branding is included on the parent signup sheets and posters so children and families know who is providing their books.

Violence Free Families



Originally founded by the Rotary Club of Brighton, Victoria, Violence Free Families is now an independent national registered charity. It works in Research, Development and Education: improving existing behaviour change programs for violent men, developing new ones and supporting childhood education programs. VFF is led by a Board of Rotarians, community representatives and professionals.

Recently, the popular singer Colleen Hewett has become an ambassador for Violence Free Families. She has recently recorded a powerful song, *Shut Up and Let Me Breathe*, which is about domestic violence. There is also a moving video clip of well-known personalities and children saying no to family violence. Colleen has been invited to perform at the Rotary Zone 8 Institute in November.



Prime Minister Tony Abbott is supporting Colleen's efforts with regard to domestic violence and last week filmed a message, which has been added to the video clip of her song. He acknowledges the work of Rotary in the message.

Rotarians are encouraged to purchase copies of Colleen's new CD *Black & White*, which features the song *Shut Up and Let Me Breathe*. The cost of the CD is only \$20, and \$5 from every sale will be donated to Violence Free Families.

Rotarian Trevor McGuirk in Cusco, Peru

A Letter from Trevor McGuirk



I have been in Cusco now for 27 days. Living with Dr. Jean-Jacques DeCoster, who spoke at the Warrnambool conference 14 months ago. The flight to Cusco is long and tiring and not without drama - but that is another story. The reason to visit this fascinating city, the centre of the Inca civilisation, is to investigate the establishment of the Women and Children's health service for people who live in remote community of Quishuarani in the Andes Mountains 4-5 hours drive from Cusco. Leading up to my departure, I visited and spoke to 23 District 9520 clubs,

seeking financial support for this project. Having visited Cusco on 3 previous occasions, I am further convinced that these communities desperately need such support.

In 2010, Stirling and the Rotary Club of Cusco, supported by a District and RI Matching grant, purchased a school bus for the community of Quishuarani, which lies at 4,400 metres. The bus transports children to Lares some 40mins away, saving the children a 2-3 hour walk to school.

I suffered, once again, from altitude sickness on arrival-splitting headache, head cold, constant dribbling nose and shortness of breath. Consequently I agreed not to travel to Quishuarani, a disappointing set back, but amazingly many of the community of Quishuarani travelled in the school bus to Calca, a town in the Sacred Valley to see me on Saturday 2nd May. Doris, a teacher from Cusco arranged this encounter. I distributed 27 Sawyer "Point One" water filters and 30 pairs of reading glasses (1-2 magnification). Ate trout freshly caught from the mountain lake. I am now over "soroche" and feeling good,



apart from a nasty dog bite to my right calf requiring a rabies booster injection and a course of antibiotics. It's mending. Grrr, woof - did I say that!

I travelled to Quishuarani on Saturday 16th May to discuss with the elders of the community aspects of the health project. They have already expressed their need for a comprehensive health program. A family in the community has tuberculosis. A full community examination is required to identify and treat those who are inflicted - and organised! A young woman died in childbirth 6 months ago - a sad story. I met with a group of doctors, dentists and nutritionists on Tuesday 13th May. They are preparing a proposal, outlining a complete program with an estimated cost for a two-year initial project. On Wednesday 20th I will present details of the project to the Rotary Club of Cusco - in Spanish! It's certainly full on in Cusco. Yours in Rotary,

Volunteering in Kenya is a life-changing experience that allows you to <u>contribute to a</u> project that is helping children and communities to break the cycle of poverty.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION

We require 9 Rotarians or non-Rotarians with experience in building, farming or irrigation. Volunteers can be men or women, but must be physically fit and able to work in the heat. Please note: your passport must be valid for an additional 6 months from your date of departure and compulsory vaccinations apply.

TOUR INFORMATION

The Umoja Volunteer Team will travel to Diani Beach to continue working on self-sustainability projects—building a chicken shed for 100 chickens, planting an edible food garden, planning and implementing irrigation and assisting locals with Permaculture training.

The tour also includes:

- Guided tour of a mentor orphanage north of Mombasa
- · Assisting at the Kikambala Feeding Station
- 4-day Wildlife Safari

DATES

You must arrive in Mombasa on 30^{th} December 2014 to begin on the 31^{st} December, and you will be returned to Mombasa on 13^{th} January 2015 for your departure on the 14^{th} January 2015.

COST

The cost will be approx. \$4198 (plus return airfares to Mombasa, Kenya).

This Umoja Volunteer Tour is **all inclusive** and covers accommodation, transport, safari, meals and drinks costs (conditions apply).
