
Rotary International Service Above Self Award.

ROTARY YOUTH LEADERSHIP AWARD.

RYLA Coordinator Rosie Erasmus recently addressed a Club Meeting at Glenelg.

RYLA is a leadership program for young people aged 18-25 and runs for 7 days. This year Rosie was appointed Coordinator and was heavily involved in working with the Directors and secretaries to prepare this year's program in September at Nunyara Conference Centre.

Thirty six young people from a wide range of background and experiences attended. They were placed in teams that would work together throughout the event. Each day consisted of a guest speaker in the morning, an activity or workshop after lunch and an evening team building session. All participants had to surrender all electronic devices including mobiles for the seven days, a daunting expectation to start with but one that enabled then to focus fully on all that was



being offered. Speakers addressed issues such as durability, leadership, public speaking and presentation, first impressions, psychology and mental health and teamwork.

Rosie reflected on the journey participants undertook, the growth and development they made and the friendships and bonds that grew over the week.

VOLUNTEER GRANTS

Applications for the Australian Government's 2015 Volunteer Grants are now open

Community organisations across Australia are now able to apply to the Department of Social Services for a share of \$20 million in grants to support and encourage the work of their volunteers.

The grants of between \$1,000 and \$5,000, will enable community organisations to support their volunteers through the purchase of small equipment items, meeting the cost of training courses and background screening checks as well as assist with reimbursement of fuel costs incurred by volunteers.
