

WATER & SANITATION PROJECTS IN THE SOUTH PACIFIC

The D9500/9520 Safe Water Saves Lives (SWSL) Committee of RAWCS recently contacted Australian Diplomatic Missions (ADM's) in the South Pacific, PNG, Timor Leste and Indonesia seeking advice of any "overflow" Direct Aid Program (DAP) project applications in water and sanitation. DAP is a small aid fund which enables Australian Heads of Mission in developing countries to respond to requests for funding for small projects. Typically, DAP is oversubscribed; many more requests are received than there are funds available.

Three water projects on offer to Rotary.

Mr. Andrew Byrne, Australian High Commissioner, Solomon Islands, has advised that there are currently three worthy water projects that Rotary may consider funding:

Nea Noole Rainwater Catchment Project (Temotu province): AU\$72,500 to provide 27 water tanks (4,000 litre) for a remote community in Temotu province – a region badly affected by water shortages. The project will benefit over 1,500 people.

Kwainaketo Rain Catchment Project (Malaita province): AU\$48,600 to purchase 50 water tanks (3,000 litres) to provide an alternative water source to the existing well which is drying up. The project will benefit around 300 community members and is being run by the Ulukwai Women's Association.

Rau Community Water Supply Project (Malaita province): AU\$18,800 to build a water supply system that will benefit 191 people in remote, water deficient Small Malaita and minimise the spread of disease.

These project applications have been rigorously scrutinised by the High Commission. Individual clubs/Groups of clubs can obtain further information from Lisa Chadderton, Second Secretary and DAP Manager, e-mail: lisa.chadderton@dfat.gov.au. SWSL would also appreciate hearing from Clubs if they take on one of these projects. It can assist with general advice, RAWCS project registration and in forming partnerships. Clubs may also like to contact the Rotary Club of Honiara to utilise its valuable local knowledge and discuss the possibility of joint projects. Pinery Fires

The fires of last week, have bought desolation for many, but amidst the ruin we have borne witness to the resilience of community and an outpouring of generosity with the state recovery fund now in excess of \$1.3M.

D9520, Rotary is a second stage assistance organisation. We are not in the business of leading a call for emergency food clothing etc as this is met by other groups. Rotary comes in a few weeks later to help rebuild lives and communities.

The Pinery Fire Recovery will be led by Vince Monterola, an experienced emergency services and recovery services professional. One of his first tasks will be to convene groups of community leaders to plan and stage its recovery. It takes a little time to know what we can do, but our best efforts come once the emergency response is past.

Emergency management Coordinator PDG Wendy Gaborit met with representatives of D9500's Emergency Management Committee and the National Disaster Recovery Officer on Monday to clarify Rotary's role under the MOU with DCSI and to affirm our readiness to assist



URGENT - EXPRESSIONS OF INTEREST SOUGHT FRIENDSHIP EXCHANGE TO INDIA FEBRUARY 2016

In San Diego earlier this year I met Dr George Sundararaj. District Governor D3202 South India who is interested in organizing a Friendship Exchange with D9520.

The team would consist of around 10 to 12 people - 4 to 6 couples or individuals to stay for 2 to 3 weeks.



D3202 has some interesting places such as Ooty, which is a Hill station with beautiful gardens and lakes in Tamil Nadu state and Wayanad with hills, greenery and tea estates in Kerala state. There are also coastal cities like Calicut, Cannanore and Tirupur, the knit industry city and Erode, the turmeric export city.

The district has over 5000 Rotarians and 130 clubs. They speak 2 different languages - Tamil and Malayalam but most Rotarians speak English.

George would like to get the inbound team here around the time of his District Conference (February 5, 6 and 7, 2016) and the 2nd National Immunisation Day (21st February). They would send the D3202 team to South Australia in April, May or June, hopefully in time for D9520 Conference in Renmark.


