Youth Exchange.

The latest group of Long Term Youth exchange students had their final briefing day at Murray Bridge High School last weekend.

Their parents and club councillors attended the briefing to receive final instructions and hints on managing a successful exchange.

These ten students from District 9520 have successfully applied for exchange with students in Europe, Scandinavia, USA and Taiwan.

They leave Australia on 16th January 2016 for their exciting year abroad.

A big thankyou to sponsoring Rotary Clubs Mildura Deacon, Encounter Bay, Strathalbyn, Noarlunga East, Blackwood, Robinvale-Euston, Mitcham, Mt Barker, Burnside and Renmark. The Youth Exchange Program relies upon support from Rotary Clubs to continue.



Rotary Club of Berri has just sent their fourth container to Timor Leste.

The cost of sending a container is huge for our small Club and it couldn't be done without help from other Clubs and volunteers. Each year Rotary Club of Unley has assisted with loading and freight costs. Other Clubs who have assisted this year and in past years are Renmark, Blackwood and Waikerie. Donations of goods come from many sources, schools, teachers, hospitals Salvos, op shops as well as private sewers, knitters and supporters. Without our District Donations in Kind in Elizabeth, no Clubs in our two districts would be able send containers to their overseas projects. A huge amount of "good stuff" would not be sent to poor countries and changing lives, it would be going into landfill!

Any Rotarian visiting DIK could not be anything but "blown away" by the enormity of the site and quantity of goods in storage.

At this point we have to acknowledge and thank the DIK guys who put in endless hours to keep this huge depot running. Dave, Joan and Derrick and their many volunteers do amazing job for this RAWCS project and Rotary. Other Rotary Clubs support by fixing wheelchairs, sewing machines, sorting and picking up donations, checking, computers and medical equipment. This year we sent many items for schools, (including over 500 Day for Girls

kits) and equipment for sewing and setting up Days for Girls sewing groups. Hospitals and dental clinics will also receive much needed goods.

The Timorese students come every year to assist will loading, we also assist them by allowing space for them to send back their own goods and computers in the container as they complete their studies. They would not otherwise be able to afford to take them back.

They were able to select an electronic organ and it was great to see how proud one of their group was that we were able to have the organ labelled to go to the church in his village.

Timor Leste is just over 400km from Darwin and is still one of the poorest nations on the planet. With very limited health care, few schools, a high birth mortality and widespread child malnutrition, Timor Leste needs our assistance. There are many opportunities to provide assistance through Rotary Projects dealing with material goods, building infrastructure, and training. VISIT A HINDU TEMPLE


On Tuesday 19 January 2016, the Rotary Club of Hallett Cove has arranged a Vocational Visit to the Hindu Temple in Oaklands Park.

Conference Accommodation at Calperum Station



The Rotary Calperum Committee has arranged with Calperum management for a limited number of Rotarians and partners attending the District Conference to stay in the dormitory at Calperum.

Accommodation will be available from Thursday 28th April to Sunday 1st May, 2016.

The layout of the sleeping quarters is:

6 rooms each with 2 lower beds and 1 upper bed (climb into) per room 4 rooms with 2 lower beds and 2 upper beds (climb into) per room 4 rooms with 1 single bed per room

Just so you know - the showers and toilet block is in a separate

building some 10 metres or so from the sleeping quarters. Similarly, Kitchen facilities are located about 20 metres from the sleeping quarters though we will probably take most meals at the Conference venue.

Calperum Homestead is located about 15 kilometres (10 minutes) north of Renmark which is an easy 3 hour drive or 250 kilometres from Adelaide, with a couple of bakeries on the way!

The cost will be \$22 per person per night to cover utilities and maintenance.

Please note that you will have to bring your own <u>linen</u>, <u>pillow</u> and <u>blankets</u> and/or sleeping bag and <u>pillow</u> and <u>towels</u>. The Conference Dinner bus will <u>not</u> be used to service Calperum as most people are expected to use or share their own vehicles, so booking via the Conference Registration is not required.
