Sophie's ambition is to study, achieve and to become a pharmacist. Prof David David from the Adelaide Women's and Children's Hospital states these goals are within Sophie's reach, due to her dedication, commitment and her amazing family support.

The major project for the Rotary Club of Victor Harbor for the years 2014-15 and 2015-16 was contributing to the Craniofacial Australia program which has enabled Sophie Tan from Borneo to complete many years of facial reconstruction correcting a birth deformity. This transformation took place at the Adelaide Women's and Children's Hospital, led by Prof David David and a team of specialists all donating their skills and time.

On Friday 18th December, Alan, Rob, Beryl and Graham Ewens, attended the Craniofacial Foundation in North Adelaide for morning tea and to meet with Prof David, Bob Snewin, Sophie and her family. Sophie and family expressed heartfelt gratitude and thanks to all members of the Rotary Club for their monetary support, interest and care for her well being. This was a most informative, casual and fulfilling morning.

The Rotary Club of Encounter Bay invites you to visit the Goolwa and Pt Elliot Rotary Markets.

The RCEB took over the management of these markets in January 2014 and have worked with traders, customers and local council to provide 2 busy, vibrant markets for the local community and tourists visiting the South Coast.

Goolwa Wharf market is held on the first and third Sundays of each month, every Sunday in January and Good Friday. This Market trades from 9 am – 3.00 pm.

Goolwa Wharf Market is a large market with over 80 stalls, selling a huge range of goods from fresh produce to arts, plants, crafts and clothing to wine, olive oil, coffee and cakes, bread and takeaway food, as well as books DVDs and variety stalls.

The Pt Elliot market is held on Lakala Reserve (Young St, Port Elliot) on the first and third Saturdays of each month, with extra markets every Saturday in January. This market trades from 9 am - 2 pm.

Pt Elliot Market hosts around 50 stalls in a delightful 'village green' atmosphere. There is plenty of fresh produce and homemade jams, pickles, plants, olive oil, jewellery, clothing and books. There is also food and a delicious cappuccino stall. There is a lake with bird-life and a playground for the children.

This year the RCEB distributed \$16,000 to local organisations with funds raised through the markets. Funds raised are also used to support international projects such as the New Life Africa School in Nakuru, Kenya.

How far are we from chartering our next Rotary club? An update on Seaford.

I guess it's one of those "how long is a piece of string" questions. In October last year, it was just a crazy idea, but we got the ball rolling in February by contacting council representatives, state and federal MPs, conducted mail outs to businesses, visited shopping centres, started a Facebook page, created a website, participated in local events, held an information day, and all of these led to a small interest group of around 6 to 8 people who were keen to proceed with the idea.

The Seaford Rotary interest group has held semi-regular meetings in a number of venues, has had a number of Rotary themed guest speakers in an effort to learn more about our many wonderful programs, and by around September has really started to gain momentum. We have been fortunate to be joined by a number of former Rotarians who are keen to give Rotary another go, and are excited by the prospects of a new club. This Rotary experience is vital to a group of enthusiastic volunteers who are really keen to give back and make a difference, but are somewhat green in Rotary ways.

The opening of Bunnings Seaford has meant regular BBQ fundraising spots, and the group has also participated in events at the Seaford Library and Seaford Community Centre. We also rattled the can for Hat Day in Seaford Shopping Centre and are very slowly building a presence in the community.

Our biggest event thus far was catering for the Seaford Community Carols, held by the Seaford Ecumenical Mission (SEM) on December 6. This was a fabulous event, and although the crowd was down on expectation (not helped by the 40°C forecast), it was a good opportunity to partner SEM, build camaraderie amongst members, and most importantly get some good exposure. The Seaford community now knows that Rotary is in Seaford.

We were also able to publicly announce our first major project, which will be the construction of a community shower and washroom facility in Seaford. Sadly, homelessness is a growing concern in the region, and a daily hot shower, which many of us take for granted, is something that will help restore a little dignity to those less fortunate in the Seaford region.

The group is slowly growing, with around 15 volunteers at the moment. Hopefully we will reach the magical figure of 20 very soon, and be in a position to charter. To be honest, it is a little frustrating knowing we have to get up to 20 to charter, given that D9520 has a number hard working and successful clubs with far fewer numbers that are already doing an amazing job, but we will keep our energy high and I'm confident we'll get there soon.

It's been a lot of hard work, but extremely exciting and rewarding, and there are many people I would like to thank for their ongoing support. Charter President Nominee Cecilie Cardwell has put in so much effort, and is the face of Rotary in the Seaford area, and PDG Jerry Casburn has been enthusiastic and generous with his time, and without these two individuals, we would not have been able to get this far. There are many other district leaders who have helped out, and we have received generous support from Rotarians in other clubs also. It has been a real team effort and an exciting ride thus far. This is easily the most exciting thing I've ever done in Rotary!



RYLA and RYPEN Training Weekend

The St Francis of Assisi school was bustling with excitement and activity on the training weekend for our 2016 RYLA and RYPEN leaders. Kevin's opening session consisted of helpful advice and words of reassurance from his own experiences as the 2015 RYLA lead director.

Following from Kevin's session there were a series of workshops and discussions which allowed the teams to establish a sense of familiarity and understanding with their programs and each other. Rosie led a discussion on the influences of different personality types and their role in establishing a robust and versatile group dynamic. It was also useful for our leaders to gain an awareness of their own characteristic tendencies and how these can support their strengths.

The second day of training began with some fun and challenging group activities to develop problem solving and communication skills. Later in the morning, Jess and Mel lead an interactive session on the importance of self-care and how this is integral to establishing positive relationships with both yourself and others. The leaders were able to practice their counselling skills through a role playing activity which required them to empathise with the challenges both awardees and leaders may face. This session was then followed by a fun activity which challenged randomised teams of five to six people to complete an obstacle course whilst being bound at their ankles. This difficult task emphasised the importance of teamwork, communication, trust and organisation in light of an unfamiliar situation. In a later session teams were encouraged to develop their abilities to think creatively and work in a team to design a detailed contingency plan under pressure. The training weekend concluded with productive team meetings to discuss and develop ideas for themes, speakers and activities. As was evident in a sharing session afterwards, the 2016 awardees are in for some fantastic RYLA and RYPEN experiences. The entire weekend was fun, productive, interactive and insightful for our leaders and has undoubtedly left them better equipped as they step into their roles as mentors in their programs and further as successful leaders.
