Figures for 2015 revealed 72 cases in two countries (53 in Pakistan and 19 in Afghanistan).

We have come a long way since 1985 when there were reported 500,000 cases in 150 countries.

But even if we do see our last case this year, we will still need to immunize every child born in the world for the next 3 years. The cost? US\$5.5 billion!

ROTARY SPECIAL MONTH FEBRUARY: PEACE AND CONFLICT PREVENTION/RESOLUTION

In 2002, The Rotary Foundation partnered with leading universities around the world to create the rotary Peace Centres. Rotary Peace Fellows began earning Masters degrees in fields such as:

- international relations
- sustainable development
- peace studies
- conflict resolution

In 2006, a new Peace Centre at Chulalongkorn University, Thailand began offering a 3 month professional development program in peace and conflict studies for mid-level and upper-level professionals. To date, 355 peace fellows have graduated representing 69 countries.

The other universities involved are located in Bradford England, Japan, Uppsala Sweden, North Carolina USA, and our own University of Queensland.

The Rotary Peace Centres are supported by Rotarians, Rotary Districts, individuals and foundations world wide.




DISTRICT CONFERENCE 28th April to 1st May 2016 IN RENMARK SA

A message from President Kate Davies, Rotary Club of Holdfast Bay.



During the days leading up to Australia Day I have been pondering what it means to be Australian. For me, this is very personal and important. As many of you know I was born in Scotland. I arrived in Mt Isa with an Australian mother and Scottish father at the tender age of 11weeks in August 1966. However, I did not become an Australian citizen until Australia Day 1988 at Glenelg. I made the decision to become a citizen at a time when the Prime Minister Paul Keating was making long term residents think about where their loyalties lay. Although I was over 18, I was not entitled to vote.

I was planning on going overseas for 12 months later in 1988 and though I held a re-entry visa in my British passport I may not have been granted entry into the country on my return.

When I became aware of this, I had no hesitation in becoming a citizen. Although very proud of being a Scott – not Scotch (you can't drink me) I consider myself Australian.

Having lived in Australia virtually all my life, I can't think of a better place to live

for many reasons; chief amongst them being that I have the freedom to say what I think without being persecuted, and to vote freely for whom I wish. A footnote to this; my father too became an Australian citizen about 12 months after I did; he first arrived in Australia aged about 22. Interestingly, I was nearly 22 when I took out Australian citizenship.

In his Australia Day speech of 2015, Ben Roberts-Smith VC, as President of the Australia Day Council said in part "We are who we are as a nation because of who we are as people – our values, how we behave, how we grow into our skin as a society that is vastly diverse in so many ways. What else can more truthfully define us?"

I believe that Australia is a great nation because our mix of citizens from all over the world. I also believe that as

much as we are Australian migrants we still retain part of the culture of where we came from. It is important to



retain our overseas culture not least because it is a part of our make up. Australia has given me many opportunities, that had I been born somewhere else I would not have had. Australia is the best place in the world to live, but Scotland is the best country in the world.

Every year, the Adelaide Hills Council holds its Australia Day Ceremony and Citizenship service on Australia Day morning on Mylor Oval.

This community event usually attracts about 300 local citizens.

Members of the Rotary Club of Stirling assist by cooking the typical Aussie breakfast of bacon, eggs and sausages for those attending. Whilst this "in kind" project doesn't produce any direct income for the club, it does the next most important thing, it puts Rotary in the public eye.

Renmark Conference 28 April - 1 May, 2016



PS Industry River Cruises

The PS Industry Cruises on the Friday and Saturday of the Conference, departing at 1.30 pm on each of those days, have been filled, with their maxima of 65 people each.

As indicated earlier, to meet the demand, we have arranged a second PS Industry cruise on the Friday of the Conference, to start paddling approximately 3.30 pm, a short time after the conclusion of the first cruise.

Our challenge, since we are committed to running it, is to achieve a break-even number of 45 (there are economies of scale

in running two cruises on the one day, which means that the break-even number is 45, rather than 60 for the single cruise Saturday). Thus far, we have eight bookings. So for those still to register, and even those who have already registered but who did not book a Cruise, please consider doing so.

A paddle-steamer cruise on the iconic PS Industry will take you back in time, to the 1800's when such craft regularly plied the Murray bringing goods to and fro. They were a vital part of the State's commercial infrastructure. What better way to see the magnificent Murray, with the throb of the steam engine and the swish of the paddle wheels to keep you company.

Renmark Conference 28 April – 1 May, 2016 Calperum Walk

Two Calperum excursions are offered – a Guided 4WD Tag-Along Tour and a Guided Walk Tour.

The former have been very popular; the Friday Tag-Along Tour has now been filled and there are only two places left on the Saturday Tour.

Both Friday and Saturday Guided Walking Tours are still open, with 25 bookings for the Friday and 12 for the Saturday, so there are plenty of places still available, particularly for the Saturday. Each Walking Tour will comprise a maximum of around 30 people, divided into



three groups of 10 people each, with a guide, so there will be opportunities to see many interesting things and to ask lots of questions.

Calperum is a very interesting place. Australian Landscape Trust manages it (242,800 hectares) under contract to the Commonwealth Director of National Parks. The Station has been declared as critical habitat for species conservation under Commonwealth legislation. District 9520 is doing its part in assisting in the rehabilitation program; in fact, it is Rotary's largest environmental project in Australia.

The Walk, along Ral Ral Creek, is not difficult or taxing; in fact, it is more in the nature of a leisurely stroll! Participants will see the work being done in water testing, re-vegetation and monitoring of tree health and will gain an understanding of the variations between the habitats of the flood plains and the mallee country. There is a strong education element to Rotary's involvement at Calperum. Groups of students are taken up there to have a look. Indeed, the Walk, along Ral Ral Creek, is based on a similar walk offered once a year to international students studying environmental issues. So pull out your walking shoes and give it a go!
