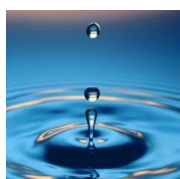

ShelterBox Australia is a significant contributor to aid for the people in Fiji.

Within hours after the passage of Cyclone Winston, ShelterBox had a response Team on the ground to assist with the distribution of 204 boxes from New Zealand, and later 209 boxes were flown out of Melbourne to Fiji by DFAT and ADF as shown in the picture. Plans are underway for a further 2000 boxes to be assembled at the request of the Fijian Government. UN estimates that 360,000 people were affected in Fiji, and that 120,000 of these were left homeless.

The Hon John Doyle OA will address our District Conference within the topic of “Courage, Resilience and Inspiration.”

John Doyle’s development into the life of law showed early signs of great promise as the Dux of the graduating class at Saint Ignatius College in South Australia in 1962, before being admitted to the degree of Bachelor of Laws from the University of Adelaide in 1966 and to the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law from Oxford University in 1969.

He was the 1967 Rhodes Scholar for South Australia, using this to complete his studies in law at Magdalen College, Oxford. He was admitted as a barrister and solicitor of the South Australian Supreme Court in 1970, and became a partner in an Adelaide firm of solicitors from 1970 to 1977. From 1977 until 1986 he practised at the Bar in Adelaide. John Doyle was appointed a Queen’s Counsel in 1981, and in 1986 he was appointed Solicitor-General of the State of South Australia in which position he represented the State before the High Court of Australia and the Supreme Court of South Australia in constitutional, criminal and other cases.

John Doyle was appointed Chief Justice of South Australia from May 1995 to June 2012 and a Companion of the Order of Australia was conferred in June 2002.

ROYAL FLYING DOCTOR SERVICE

RFDS Central Operations covers South Australia and the lower half of the Northern Territory. There are three aeromedical bases in Adelaide, Port Augusta and Alice Springs, as well as the Marree Health Service on the Birdsville Track.

The Service has 193 staff, including 138 full-time in Central Operations working within the following areas:

- 24-hour emergency aeromedical evacuations and retrievals, for victims of accident or serious illness from a remote location.
- Primary health care clinics to rural and remote areas for speech pathologists, physiotherapists, occupational therapists, diabetic educators and mental health workers to remote communities in SA and the lower half of the NT.
- State wide inter-hospital transfer service (in South Australia). RFDS Central Operations conducts around 20 aeromedical transfers every day of patients from a country hospital to a major metropolitan hospital for a higher level of care. Often inter-hospital transfers occur in the middle of the night for patients requiring life-saving organ transplant or a newborn in need of emergency heart surgery at an interstate hospital.
- Facilitation of allied health services such as physiotherapy, podiatry, occupational therapy etc.
- Radio and telephone medical consultations; Radio and telephone medical consultations with a Doctor or Remote Area Nurse for isolated patients. A rostered, on-call doctor is available to take calls 24/7. We also administer Medical Chests to more than 150 remote communities and stations throughout South Australia.
- Provision of Medical Chests; and, The Aboriginal Health Coordinator focuses on providing a service specific to



Aboriginal communities in South Australia. The position operates from the Port Augusta Base to liaise with Aboriginal patients of all ages, RFDS staff and health professionals.

- Health promotion and education services through the Healthy Living Program. The Healthy Living Program is aimed at helping individuals and communities to adopt exercise and diet principles which support well-being and reductions in illness related to the onset of diabetes and cardiovascular disease. Medical Practitioners, Pilots and Flight Nurses work on a rotating roster which operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Next week we will discuss the involvement of Rotary Clubs in supporting the Royal Flying Doctor Service.
