Sally, Sara, Sue & Sweeney slip away to Sri Lanka for some Serious Service



4 Rotarians from our District 9520 have joined a RAWCS team to Sri Lanka to fit prosthetic hands to amputees, many who lost their limbs in the recent conflict in Sri Lanka. A number of clubs within our district have been involved in making these hands and it is a wonderful thing to be able to take the final journey with these hands and fit them to these deserving Sri Lankan people.

The stories we hear as we fit the hands and train the amputees are both heart wrenching and inspiring and the smiles on the recipients faces as they start to imagine what they will now be able to do with their hands is awesome.

The double amputees are especially amazing - they have already learned how to do so much with their 2 stumps, but once they have these hands fitted, they are immediately testing them out and managing to work the fingers on each hand.

The volunteer team are rotating around the various tasks of registration, fitting, training and photography and getting skilled up so we can fit in wherever needed. At each town that we are fitting hands, a team of locals are also skilled up and trained in making and repairing the hands so that there is ongoing support for the recipients - this is an important part of the ongoing success of the program.



An added bonus of this trip is the fellowship and camaraderie we are enjoyed with other Rotarians from Queensland and with the local crew helping us at each location.

I'm sure we have all returned with even more passion for this wonderful project that is truly changing people's



lives for the better. Sally and Linda will be keen to facilitate a hand-building workshop with any Rotary Club or corporate group interested in getting involved.

Late breaking news is that Rotarian Sally Charlton, from the Rotary Club of Tailem Bend will take over the RAWCS national management of the Helping Hands Project 1st July 2016.

The present manager, PDG Terry Daley, has developed this humanitarian project over many years, and over the last 3 years 800 hands have been fitted to the many victims of landmine explosions and other traumatic events in SE Asia, and 1400 hands will have been manufactured by the end of June 2016.

Congratulations Sally, and we wish you well in your new management role, as you continue the work of Terry Daley.



"Operation Cleft" Story. by PP Phil Westover.

As a Past President of the Rotary Club of Murray Bridge I had the opportunity to allocate a discretionary fund amount of \$1200 to a project of my choice. My choice was the Rotary Project "Operation Cleft".

I attended a District Conference a couple of years ago and heard a most impressive presentation by an advocate for Operation Cleft, Judy Shipp, widow of past DG Peter Shipp. After the District Conference our club was fortunate to have Judy as a guest speaker.

I was greatly moved by both of these presentations, so much so that I even donated some of my own money and that's not something that happens easily.

The Rotary Club of Box Hill Central started "Operation Cleft" back in 2005 and after a pilot program, launched "Operation Cleft" as an International Rotary Project. The project funds a plastic surgery team to repair cleft palates of underprivileged children in Bangladesh.

A cleft palate in an underprivileged child in Bangladesh can mean that the child faces an extremely difficult life. As well as having difficulty with breathing and eating and talking and other ordinary functions, a child with a cleft palate may well be shunned by the community which has disastrous consequences in an under-developed country such as Bangladesh.

For the cost of A\$300 a cleft palate can be repaired and so enable a child to thrive and proceed to an education and, hopefully, to a full and rewarding life. This means the discretionary fund will allow 4 children in Bangladesh to enjoy life. This is a small price to make such a big change to a young person whose circumstances would never have anticipated such a wonderful gift.



Peter Carey visits Rotary Club of Holdfast Bay.

Chief Executive of Youth Opportunities, Peter Carey spoke to the club last Monday night. Peter had just come from a graduation ceremony for 16 children that had been attending their program. As Peter said "the change in these children over the course of the 10 weeks they are in the program, is incredible."

There are terrible issues in our community with children who are struggling to fit into society and function normally. "These kids come from dysfunctional families (with dual incomes of as little as \$40,000 per year), often have disabilities and learning difficulties. A lot of them are bullied at school, Peter explained, and find themselves in a never ending downward spiral, unless the cycle is broken.

"What we do is quite simple, Peter said" "We give these kids a chance to succeed." They go through a 10 week program in which they are given positive reinforcement of their self worth and capabilities. NEW CHALLENGES FOR ROTARIANS.

More than a million refugees from Syria, Iraq, and Afghanistan streamed into the European Union last year.

Most entered via Greece after a harrowing raft trip across the Aegean Sea from Turkey. Once there, they made their way north, often on foot, travelling more than 1,000 miles through the rugged mountains of the Balkan countries toward Germany.

A vital role being undertaken by the Rotary Club of Felsbach in Austria extends beyond providing material goods and services to trying to inform the general population, according to Rotarian Manfred Krasnitzer. "Rotary members are the town's opinion-makers," he says. "When people here have a more realistic idea of what is happening, they can correct their impressions."

In sketching out a role for the Feldbach club, Krasnitzer says members need to start thinking further ahead. "This means, first of all, helping the refugees to learn German," he says. "Then we need to identify skills within the refugee population and to help them to make contacts so that they can find meaningful work.

A leading high school in Feldbach is providing classes in German and other subjects to students who are waiting for legal status in Austria.
