Recycling saves lives!

The simple fruit box in our lunches at the District Conference has been recycled and the money sent to Disaster Aid. Over 600 drink boxes have provided sufficient funds for a Sawyer water filter. Just 4 inches long and less than 8 ounces, this water filter can deliver 1 litre of clean water in 60 seconds. The filter removes 99.99% of all bacteria such as salmonella, E coli, vibrio cholerae and salmonella typhi (which cause Cholera and Typhoid). The assembly kit includes everything to attach the filter to any plastic bucket or container, is totally portable and will last for up to 10+ years.

Stephanie was the recipient of the Neville and Jeanette York PhD Scholarship awarded to her by **Australian Rotary Health** in 2013. Stephanie completed her thesis in 2015 and was awarded her Doctorate in April, 2016.

Her research was in the field of Motor Neuron Disease, also known as Lou Gehrig's Disease, named after a very famous American baseballer who played 17 seasons for the New York Yankees. He had to retire at the age of 36 years and died two years later of the disease which bears his name.

Stephanie's project has identified a protein in the urine which could be used as an indicator of the disease itself, of disease progression and even treatment development.



Connect. Collaborate. Communicate. As a presenter at District Assembly I am heartened to learn that a number of incoming Secretaries are persevering with their entry into ClubRunner. The first steps with a new program are always the hardest, and this does apply to ClubRunner. ClubRunner has been purchased by District for you, and you the club members are the beneficiaries through the saving of time in managing important records such as Membership, and communicating with your club membership in an efficient manner.

As an experienced club secretary I can see the value of learning to use this program, and I do recognise there are spin off benefits for District and RI through having the same advantages with more accurate membership records and more efficient communication tools.

As a current President, Secretary, or Treasurer you can make valuable preparation for the Incoming Officers by using your access to set up the Integration of RI with ClubRunner. This process only has to be done once. Carry out your entry to the new website http://www.rotary9520.org, click on "New and Existing Users Retrieve Login Password" and then follow the instructions. Once you have gained entry to the Home Page, find the Home Page Download files on the left hand side, choose "RI Integration Help File 2016 (pdf)" download and print. Follow the instructions and you will have linked ClubRunner to My Rotary. My advice is for you to carry out this process with a friend, and together you will find your way through the unfamiliar territory, without tears. Leave the strong drinking until after the procedure has been achieved!

Here is a brief biography of Geraldine.

In 1993 Geraldine Cox helped to establish the Australia Cambodia Foundation which operates Sunrise Cambodia. She moved to Cambodia permanently in 1996, to live with the orphaned children. The organization is now called Sunrise Villages. She is known as "Madal Tom" (Big Mum).

Sunrise Villages have expanded their facilities across Cambodia. One Village is in Phnom Penh, which includes a nursery school. They built a HIV centre for 200 children with HIV in Sihanoukville. There is a Village in Siem Reap, which has just opened a Restaurant to train children in Hospitality. They have numerous projects in the surrounding areas including building wells, housing, renovating schools & bridges. Not only is Sunrise opening their hearts to orphaned children but also to the surrounding communities.

In January 2001 Geraldine was made a Member of the Order of Australia, "for services to the welfare of children through the establishment, financing & administration of an orphanage in Cambodia". She has also received the Centenary Medal, "for services to the welfare of children in Cambodia".
