

ROTARY CLUB OF TOKYO



I invariably try and visit a Club when I am here visiting Tom and his family. This is my second visit to this Club of around 370 members.

They meet in the very famous Imperial Hotel - the meeting lasts exactly one hour and yesterday there were 15 Rotarian guests from Japan plus 32 International guests. In order to overcome the language difficulty, there is an instantaneous translation into English available via a hearing loop.

The Imperial Hotel was designed by Wanitabe and opened in 1890. It was destroyed by fire on 16 APR 1922 while the Prince of Wales was in residence, and then reopened in 1923 with Frank Lloyd Wright as the architect.

The Great Kanto Earthquake on 01 SEP 1923 caused further destruction to some of the old remaining structures but the new building survived, due in no small part to the architectural design.

Much damage was inflicted on Tokyo during World War 11 and eventually the hotel was demolished and rebuilt in 1967.

Some of Frank Lloyd Wright's original work has been preserved.

Many famous people have stayed there including Marilyn Monroe with one of her husbands Joe DiMaggio in 1954. When asked by a cheeky press interviewer what she wore in bed, MM replied "Chanel No.5".

That comment did the perfumery business no harm at all!

Rotarians Kerry Miller and Wayne Sachs from the Rotary club of Glenelg have just returned from Tanna Island Vanuatu after successfully completing a literacy project funded by a matching grant from District 9520.

This involved staying at the remote "Day Springs Primary School" for four days and delivering over four hundred PM graded reading books covering readability ages from Reception year to years 3 and 4. During their time at the school they inducted the teaching staff on ways to make the most effective use of the readers as well as introducing students to the books.

The school is still recovering from the devastation suffered following Cyclone Pam in April last year. One classroom block is still undergoing repairs so students occupy a large tent supplied by UNICEF as their classroom.

Given the almost complete lack of reading resources the staff, students and community were overwhelmed by the new readers supplied.

Kerry stated, "To see the smiles on the young faces as they explored the colourful pages and the confidence as they began to read the text, is something that will remain with me forever."

Having the opportunity to live with a remote community, share their way of life, and provide the books that will allow students to improve their literacy levels, increase their understanding and use of English as their second language and add excitement and joy to their learning gave true insight to RI President Ravi Ravindran's theme, "Be a Gift to the World."
