Tomas has been treated for a cancer on his kidney, and after surgery, radiotherapy and chemotherapy will be returning to his home high in the mountains above the town of Dili.

Surgeons in hospitals in major cities in New Zealand and Australia usually donate their time and skill to assist these young people, but other forms of treatment, medicines, hospital beds and living accommodation for the carer and child, has to be paid for by ROMAC

ROMAC is a not for profit organisation funded solely by donations and all of the "Staff" are volunteer Rotarians like yourselves.


The Rotary Club of Encounter Bay

As a young child, Leng Touch survived the Pol Pot Regime massacres (Cambodia 1975-1979) but his mother and sister disappeared, and he saw his father murdered by soldiers. He was taken in and cared for by his Uncle and Aunt, who raised him as their son. Leng knows without his Uncle and Aunt he would have been one of the orphans he now works to support and educate. He has turned his harrowing beginning into a lifetime project of protection & education for orphaned, disabled and disadvantaged children. Today there are 32 children in his care. They attend school 6 days each week and are amongst the 9% Cambodians able to receive a secondary education. All Leng's income goes to support this 'family'.

Time for Rotary - Journalism Competition

This is an opportunity to turn the conversation into an action

"Rotary District 9500 and District 9520 initiated a proposal to UniSA to encourage emerging Journalists and communications students to write or produce news stories (suitable for all media types) about Rotary projects within South Australia, Alice Springs and Broken Hill.

This Project - funded by the two Rotary Districts for three years, will provide Prizes of \$700 for each of the best stories awarded for each of the three media streams – Broadcast (TV/Radio); Press; and Online/Social Media. This is an ideal opportunity for career-focused students to pro-actively gain experience in researching, interviewing, writing and creating digital or social media pieces based on real life projects undertaken by Rotary Clubs. Of course, before submitting for publication, all media pieces need the final approval of content by the Rotary Club featured in the story, this means the Rotary Club will take the role of the sub-editor.

How will it work? Students will need to show initiative to contact Rotary Clubs (contact books have been supplied to UniSA) to gather information to write an article, media release or news item. Accompanying photos or other material (including social media vision suitable for websites or posted as YouTube segments) may also be accepted. All the submissions become the property of Rotary, who will have first publication rights, but authors will be acknowledged by Rotary to whatever extent is possible.

Students are encouraged to submit EVERY piece of ROTARY CLUB-APPROVED media produced (media releases, radio segments, social media pieces etc) to appropriate news outlets (press, radio, websites, social media) to get their work published and to promote the work and projects of Rotary."



This is a web based events / registration program endorsed by RDU and is used by District 9520.

For a once off cost of \$275 clubs can effectively reduce the work impost of the Treasurer and events manager.

What can it do?

Send out invoices to members and they can pay their subs on line, provides an audit trail and reports. For that annual art show, artists can go on line, register, pay the registration fee and no one has the task entering in all the data. It is a secure site, with personal information and credit / bank details cannot be passed on or hacked into.

Changeovers - send out an email to members and guest, they go on line, register their details, dietary needs and pay... Having a special event. Well this will prove invaluable.


