I'm happy to announce my new Rotary Club Central award!



LONG TERM YOUTH EXCHANGE

Rotary clubs exist in more than 200 countries and geographical areas, and Youth Exchanges take place in nearly all of them.

Rotary Youth Exchanges are administered locally, and all applicants must be sponsored by a local Rotary Club.

Long Term Youth Exchange usually last one year, during which the student attend school and live with families in the host country. To gain a greater understanding of the culture, students will live with at least two, preferably three, host families during their stay.

The current Bowelscan program

Bowelscan is essentially a public awareness program seeking to increase community knowledge of bowel cancer and its symptoms and to distribute a simple FOBT test kit to detect the presence of blood in the bowel motion. It is a basic screening test only, not a diagnostic test, and people with a positive result are asked to consult their doctor for further examination.

The program's success is due largely to the support of shopping centres, CBDs and hundreds of pharmacies which distribute the kits as a service to the community, and pathology laboratories which test the kits at little or no cost. The program is conducted as a cost neutral project to minimise the price of the kits. Any excess funds are devoted to research projects.

About 150,000 kits are distributed annually across Australia and over the years more than 1,500 people with bowel cancer and over 5,000 people with polyps (possible precursors to cancer) have been detected.

Many Rotarians already know about the importance of undergoing regular tests to indicate possible presence of bowel polyps and bowel cancer, as part of their personal health management. The age profile of Rotarians also underscores the fact that many will undertake regular tests that are provided free within the National Health scheme. What Rotary BowelScan is aiming to do is provide a service to at least some members of our local communities whose health considerations are not fully covered within a National Health scheme, and they may not have adequate personal health insurance arrangements, and may not be aware of the high incidence of bowel problems in our population.

Presently all we are doing is asking individual Rotary Clubs to let me know they would like our District to be part of a national bowel scan program by supporting the notion that Rotary Bowelscan Australia is accorded multidistrict status. There are no strings attached for individual Rotary Clubs, and if what looks to me like political positioning for the organisation is successful, you may like to consider being more actively involved in the project at a later stage.

Your endorsement will allow Rotary Australia to have a greater voice through the national committee. I need 36 Clubs in agreement by 21st December before we can be part of this project as a District. Regards Sam Cozens. District Secretary. d9520.secretary@gmail.com



All these questions were positively answered by a club in England when they took on two corporate memberships. An executive of the local TAFE college was inducted as the corporate member at a slightly higher rate than normal membership to allow 3 other employees to be inducted as honorary members. These 4 members attend meetings on a roster basis, assist at service projects and promote Rotary at the TAFE. They help promote youth projects, nominating young people for RYLA and Youth Exchange and display Rotary promotional material. They can provide use of their premises on occasions and even some equipment. In return, Rotary provides a community outlet for their employees, a social occasion, a networking opportunity, a supportive framework for their students and volunteers for college projects. This has proved to be very successful to both parties and has also resulted in an additional full membership.

They have experienced a similar success rate with a local school and are looking at other businesses in the area with which they already have a contact. The club was vibrant, active, social, welcoming and successful. Why would local businesses not want to be associated with them and share in their success?
