# Vale Rotarian Barry Barratt.

It is with great sadness that we learn of the passing of Barry Barratt, a Rotarian well known throughout Districts 9520 and 9500 through his many years as the spokesman for the Rotary Native Bird Nestbox Project, more commonly known simply as ROBIN.

We must go back to 1992----22 years---to get some idea of this amazing man's Rotary story.

In that year Professor Rob Morrison formulated the first nest box project when he invited all of the Primary Schools in South Australia to monitor breeding and nesting habits of native birds. The first school to be involved was St. Agnes Primary School where a group of parents encouraged by their children made several boxes which developed into a series of working bees which in the first year made 610 boxes.


At the same time Barry, a successful farmer and businessman with extensive interests in the South East, was becoming more and more concerned about the decline of native birds and mammals as land was cleared. He knew that old, dead, or dying eucalypts and mallee still had a vital role to play in a balanced environment and provided breeding and shelter hollows for many species of native birds, mammals and reptiles.

Rotarian Barry, Professor Morrison and Rotarian PDG Don Sarah from District 9500, joined forces to form the ROBIN committee with the aim of developing Rotary Club based teams to make boxes, and to install them in areas of need. The rest is history. Close to 5000 nesting boxes have been made and supplied to organizations all around South Australia, and over 1000 were sent to the fire ravaged areas of Victoria. A major success was the supply of specially designed nesting boxes to Kangaroo Island, which made a big contribution to saving the endangered Glossy Black Cockatoo. None of this would have happened without the continued enthusiasm and commitment of Barry Barratt. HE WAS ROBIN.



A week ago, it could have been noted that the Founding Fathers of ROBIN, Barry Barratt, Rob Morrison and Don Sarah were all still working on the ROBIN Committee.

Twenty two years of continuous service. A remarkable record that resulted because of the persistence of one man. This is a testimony to the Rotary Ideal of "Service Above Self", and Barry will be honoured and remembered by the ROBIN Committee. Eulogy courtesy Bob Arnold.

## REDUCING THE EFFECTS OF PROSTATE CANCER

Dr Peter Sutherland, an experienced urologist, recently addressed the Rotary Club of Hyde Park on the topic of prostate cancer. He spoke about the incidence of prostate cancer increasing with age, and the importance of taking positive steps to ensure early detection. The actual causes of prostate cancer are not known however there is some evidence that diet and general fitness are significant factors.

What is known however is that early detection and treatment of prostate cancer significantly increases the chances of a return to a healthy life. This is the central message to convey to men in our community. The target group of men especially is those over 40 years of age arranging to have regular annual medical checks for any signs of the cancer.



Digital rectal examination and Prostate Specific Antigen blood tests should both be considered. There are other more invasive tests available to confirm any suspicions, and we are most fortunate to have expert medical treatments to address removal of the cancer.

The sober message is that advanced prostate cancer very often results in death.




#### AGFAIR PROJECT BROKEN HILL

## **YOUTH SERVICE**

Youth Service recognizes the positive change implemented by youth and young adults involved in leadership development activities, community and international service projects, and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding.

Many Rotary Projects will be expressed across more than one Avenues of Service and there is no strict delineation of Rotary Projects to fit the above categories.
