GOOLWA WHARF AND PORT ELLIOT ROTARY MARKETS

The Rotary Club of Encounter Bay began managing the Goolwa Wharf and Pt Elliot Markets in January 2014. Since then they have progressively improved many aspects of these markets and this is reflected in the financial figures. In 2015/16 they managed 59 markets over the 2 sites and 18 members from this club contributed 1947 hours of volunteer work. The amount raised to date (Jan 2014-June 2016) from this project = **\$187,780.** These markets have given the club a great opportunity to demonstrate the work of Rotary with local and overseas fund distribution.

Indigenous Health Scholarships



It was in 1999 that the late **Geoff Bailey** OAM from RC **of** Mitcham, floated with his fellow club members, the idea of creating a Scholarship that would support Indigenous Medical Students through their medical studies to become doctors and then be able support and improve the health outcomes of their own people. Geoff had worked around indigenous people as a pharmacist in Pt Augusta and was acutely aware that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders do not benefit from mainstream health services to the same extent as other Australians.

Geoff also approached the **Minister for Human Services** - the **Honorable Dean Brown** and proposed that if Rotary contributed \$2,500 toward an Indigenous Health Scholarship would the SA Government match that contribution. The Government agreed and the Indigenous Health Scholarship Program began in 2000 with 2 students growing to 14 within 2 years.

In 2003, Australian Rotary Health took over the administration of the Project, expanded it nationally and widened the range of health degrees. To date, almost **200** scholars have graduated into the workforce - 1/4 of these have been from SA.

On Tuesday 5th July, eight Indigenous Health Scholarships were awarded to selected indigenous students at an Induction ceremony held at the Department of Health. Students and their respective sponsors who support the scholarship to the amount of \$2,500pa are:

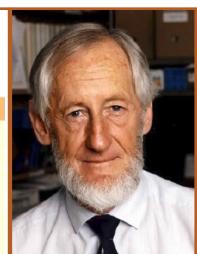

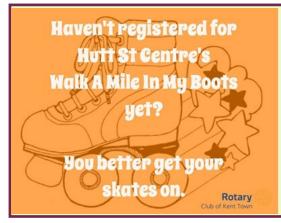
