The Application Process

- Open, read and review the District Grant Guidelines 2017-2018
- 2. Download and complete the District Grant Application 2017-2018.
- 3. Open, read and review the Club Qualification MOU Worksheet Guidelines.
- 4. Download and complete the Club Qualification MOU.
- 5. Submit the application and MOU to the District Grants Chair.

Time table

- 31st July 2017 Submissions to be made.
- 31st August 2017 District submit grants for approval from Rotary International in Evanston.
- **30**th **September 2017** Approval Given and Clubs advised.

Criteria

- 1. The project must fall within one of the Foundation's Areas of Focus.
- 2. The club is expected to match the contribution made by District.
- 3. The project and final reports will need to be completed by April 31st 2018.







Excerpt from RI President John Germ's March Presidential Message

Forty years ago, the Rotary Club of Duarte, Calif., admitted three women members, in violation of the Rotary International Constitution. As a result, the club's charter was terminated by RI.

Undeterred, the club's members continued to meet. They put an X over their Rotary insignia, made themselves new pins, and dubbed themselves the Ex-Rotary Club of Duarte as they continued to fight for the right of women to serve as Rotarians. Ten years later, a restored Rotary Club of Duarte sent Sylvia Whitlock, Rotary's first female club president, to a presidents-elect training seminar. Not long after that, in 1989, Rotary's Council on Legislation permanently ended Rotary's status as a men-only organization.

Today, with more than 240,000 women in our clubs, Rotary is stronger than ever. We are women and men from nearly every country of the world, serving our communities in more than 35,000 clubs. At the club level, we need men and women of all backgrounds, ages, cultures, and professions; internationally, we need clubs in every city, country, and region of the world. The better our clubs reflect their communities, the better we can serve them. Our diversity is our strength.

It is difficult for most of us to imagine today why anyone argued so strongly against the idea of women in Rotary. Looking back, I think that opposition came from a simple resistance to change. Rotarians loved Rotary the way it was and couldn't imagine it any other way.

We still love Rotary as much as we ever did. We love the friendships and connections we make there, and the ability Rotary provides us to serve humanity. We believe Rotary has tremendous value in our own lives and in the world at large. And we recognize, more than ever, that for Rotary to continue to grow, it needs to embrace the world it serves – in all of its diversity, all of its variety, and all of its evolving needs for service.

Changes to Standard Rotary Club Constitution HOUSEKEEPING

As most Clubs would be aware it is a requirement that each Club must adopt the revised Standard Rotary Club Constitution as issued by Rotary International following the most recent Council On Legislation. This Standard Constitution is available online from My Rotary at https://my.rotary.org/en/learning-reference/policies-procedures/governance-documents

A Club must not change <u>ANY</u> provisions in the Standard Rotary Club Constitution. The only exception is the compliance with the State and Commonwealth Laws. Where changes are needed, these must be added at the end of the constitution as an additional section.



From a South Australian perspective, the following additional Clauses (or similar) are required by State law to be included in the Constitution.

Article nn – Compliance with the Laws of the State of South Australia and the Laws of the Commonwealth of Australia

Section n - Powers

This Association shall have all the powers conferred by Section 25 of the Associations Incorporation Act 1985 (as amended)

Section n - Winding Up

This Association may be wound up in the manner provided by the Associations Incorporations Act 1985. On winding up, the funds and property of this Association shall not be distributed to members, but shall be donated to one or more charitable organizations which prohibit distribution of funds to their members.

Once a club has drafted or amended its constitution, it needs to adopt the constitution at the AGM or a Special General Meeting. Following the adoption it needs to register its constitution with the Office for Consumer and Business Services https://www.cbs.sa.gov.au/associations-and-cooperatives/. You will need to fill in forms 1 and 2, and the Associations Checklist.

Once this is complete Club's Public Officer must sign all forms and every page of the constitution before a JP and send all this to CBS along with the appropriate fee.



is the year Rotary hopes to finish providing everyone with safe water, sanitation, and hygiene A ShelterBox Response Team is deploying to Madagascar after Tropical Cyclone Enawo made landfall on Tuesday, with winds up to 170 mph and heavy rains. Five people have died and over 10,000 people have been left homeless and this number is expected to climb. Cyclone Enawo, a Category 4 storm, is the strongest cyclone to hit Madagascar in 13 years.

The gale force winds and heavy rain are expected to cause flash flooding and mudslides throughout the rest of the week. As most of Madagascar's roads are dirt and are being washed out, reaching the hardest hit areas of the northeast will be difficult.

According to the Malagasy Red Cross Society, an estimated 720,000 people have been affected by this intense tropical

cyclone. Meteo Madagascar has issued a Red Alert for the northeast coastal areas of Madagascar, advising residents to abandon houses on water edges, store drinking water and seek safe shelter as the dangerous weather continues.



• Communications in many areas are severed as a result of the storm so the full extent of damage is not yet known. ShelterBox has available its extensive supply of shelter and emergency aid that can be mobilized as soon as response teams have assessed what is most needed.

You may need to go to a manual for a little more detail on some items but now you know what you are looking for, it should be much easier. In the future it is our aim to simplify and reorganise the manuals and give each one a comprehensive index so items will be even easier and quicker to find.

Rotary Club of Seaford helps create a Community Garden

Approximately 12 months ago Lauren Jew, Community Development Coordinator at Aldinga Beach Children's Centre recognised that many children were arriving at the centre and adjoining Aldinga Beach Primary School without fruit.

She had an idea that an adjacent underutilised reserve could be transformed into a community garden. Lauren successfully applied for a **City of Onkaparinga Street Scaping Grant** to get the project under way, and then called for help to make this dream a reality.

The **Rotary Club of Seaford** answered the call for help, and has provided members for working bees on a regular basis. The Rotary Club of Seaford places a high value on volunteering opportunities for its members, who really enjoy getting out in the fresh air, rolling up their sleeves and participating in hands on work. The club also installed a rainwater tank which was generously donated by Bunnings Seaford.

The official opening for the Garden was held on March 15, where the club provided a free sausage sizzle and drinks as a gift to the community. **DG Sam, DGE Bob & Marilyn and DGN Kim** were all in attendance. This project has played a vital role in bringing the club and the community together, and even gained us a few members, including Lauren, her partner Dougie and mother Judi, who all became charter members at the club's charter in November.

ROTARY BUSHFIRE APPEAL ENTERS THIRD WEEK WITH URGENT CALLS FOR MORE SUPPORT

Cost of devastation is staggering and mounting daily says campaign co-ordinator

Despite great success in its early weeks in attracting community support and donations, The Rotary fundraising campaign to help farmers, businesses and families suffering devastation from the recent bushfires faces fresh new challenges as the campaign enters its fourth week.

"We are starting to see true cases of desperate hardship, with farmers and communities trying to rebuild from nothing. Some have farm insurance but, even so, they are not fully covered. Without even basic infrastructure, it is impossible to earn a livelihood farming; at the moment there is no way you can keep stock in or protect or water your crops", says Margaret Barnes, Rotary Central West Bushfire Appeal Co-ordinator.

With more than 6,000 km of fencing and dozens of homes and farm buildings destroyed or damaged, and the loss of more than 12,000 head of cattle and sheep, the cost is expected to run into tens of millions of dollars. While the farmers and local residents in the bushfire areas are most affected, many businesses in our community also risk being hit as the affected farmers and residents are no longer in a position to make their normal purchases from local shops and farm suppliers.

"The Sir Ivan fire was the largest recorded grassfire in Australia's history and caused huge devastation, so our priority this past week has been to maintain our fundraising efforts while releasing money to meet the urgent needs of those affected on the ground. Late last week we made an initial distribution of \$25,000 to help buy urgently needed fencing materials so that the BlazeAid volunteers can get on with the task of erecting replacement fencing on affected farms", said Marg.

Rotary's fundraising efforts received a boost last week with a \$15,000 donation from Moolarben Coal to the bushfire relief fund, along with many generous donations from residents, businesses and other Rotary Clubs. In addition, more than \$2,500 in proceeds from the Rotary-run monthly Movies at Mudgee Town Hall last weekend have been allocated to the bushfire relief fund.

One other noteworthy donation was from **7 year old budding Mudgee "entrepreneur" Cooper Callaghan,** who sold to family and friends the rock crystals he had collected and donated the proceeds to our campaign.

So much has been achieved in these early weeks, but Rotary representatives say there is still a long way to go if their efforts are to make a real difference to those who have been devastated by these fires.

"We have completed the sprint by getting the Mudgee community behind our efforts, but we are in this for the

long haul" said Margaret. "This will need a marathon fundraising effort, especially given the scale of damage

these fires caused and the reality that it will take many months or perhaps even longer for those affected to rebuild their lives and their livelihoods.

"There is a very great risk is that over the coming weeks memories of the fire and its impact will fade from people's minds and the continuing plight of the victims will be overlooked. However we intend to do all we can to keep our community aware of their desperate needs and to redouble our fundraising efforts so that Rotary's campaign does make a real difference to the task of rebuilding."

"There are many areas in which urgent support is needed, and those affected are currently being assessed by the Rural Financial Counselling Service. Based on their guidance, we will continue to release monies raised to those who most urgently need help as quickly as possible. As we are a voluntary organisation, donors can be assured Rotary will distribute <u>all</u> the funds it receives to the bushfire victims, other than a small transactional charge on credit card donations,", Marg added.


